

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ST PETER AND ST PAUL'S CHURCH



I am very much enjoying this time of year as I approach my last Christmas season in Ewhurst before I leave in January. Since I announced my impending move earlier this Autumn people have been so kind with their expressions of sadness that Laura and I are leaving, but positive about our time here and wishing us well for the future in our new Gloucester Diocese benefice.

Often people have asked what brought us to make the decision to go – and it's a fair question. After all we have been very happy in our time in Ewhurst and have enjoyed life very much in what we have found to be a friendly and caring community. So why go? Well first I can say that there is no single reason to leave, just a growing sense that the time is right for a change for Ewhurst and a new challenge for me and Laura. Above all, a ministry as a priest is about a call to serve God, and all priests must constantly ask themselves 'Am I the right person in the right place at the right time? Am I serving God and this community as effectively as God would wish? Do I have a fresh vision for what God wants to do here – and am I the person to deliver that vision?

For almost 13 years I have been quite clear that the answer to all those questions was 'yes' and so I have been happy to continue serving God in a setting that has given me much pleasure. However after all that time it may be that I am no longer the best person for the parish; there is someone out there (who doesn't know yet that they are the one) whom God is raising up as the right person to move forward with the parish into the next few years.

Equally I believe that it is God who calls me to use the skills and insights that I have learned (through both success and mistakes) at Ewhurst as I move to the Churn Valley Benefice. They have been waiting for more than a year for the right person to come along who will challenge them and take their parish forward.

God is not a God who stands still; the Bible speaks of a creative, dynamic God who is involved with the lives of his people. In those fine Advent readings God speaks through his prophet Isaiah "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." (Isaiah 43:18) And the Christmas story itself is a creative act of God, something startling, new, unexpected and life changing.

We shouldn't be surprised to discover that the God who is prepared to break into human existence, choosing to be vulnerable as a baby, to share in our condition, is the same God who calls us to grow daily, and to follow new challenges in our own lives.

I'm looking forward to Christmas this year, do join us if you can at some point over the season to hear the story, familiar to us from thousands of years of telling, and yet shockingly innovative. God is doing a new thing! Merry Christmas and a very happy New Year.

THE TIMES THEY ARE A-CHANGING

Bob Dylan's lyrics are as true today are they were when penned 50 years ago. Change is in the air! The last few weeks have proved the old adage that a week in politics is a long time. Change is in the air not just at a national level but also at international and local levels. There is change afoot in America and there is change afoot in our relationship with Europe. Of more concern to us locally there is change afoot in Ewhurst as David and Laura (not forgetting Scruffy) leave us in January.

We live in a period of constant change and it has always been so – although changes now happen with greater rapidity. Today's world of instant communication, overseas holidays, political correctness and million pound houses would have been unthinkable a generation ago but it's here and we live with it even if we don't like it. The world hasn't come to an end as some predicted before the recent referendum.

More importantly for us, David's departure will not spell the end of our worshipping community as we know it. I counted 51 dating back to 1292 on the panels in the parish church and we're still here worshipping God. I have personally known five of those Rectors. Yes, of course things have changed in the 35 years since I first set foot in the parish church. Within the lives of many of us, women were not allowed to read the lesson, to lead prayers or assist at communion, let alone carry out a priestly role, and the great majority of our services were from a Prayer Book written three and a half centuries earlier.

How times have changed – for the better. Women now have the same rights and opportunities as men within the church – we even have a woman bishop. Every Rector here has sought changes and brought new

ideas – some have worked, others haven't. Just think of the changes since David arrived 13 years ago. The formation of a ministry team, the start of the popular 20/20 service, the building of the Wilson Room and now the new Memorial Wall. But it's not David on his own. It's a collaborative effort by many people – giving their time, their talents and their financial gifts.

The ministry team, churchwardens and church council will be trying to keep our pattern of worship and our pastoral care as near as possible to what might be regarded as normal during the interregnum (the period from David's departure until we have a new priest). But it is also an opportunity for all of us to help out and "do our bit" according to our individual abilities. Maybe there's something you have been thinking about doing but somehow haven't got round to volunteering. Our churchwardens, Jane and Jackie, would be glad to hear from you. The church is not just the building or David – or indeed the ministry team – it is all of us. In the words of St Paul "We are one body in Christ".

It occurred to me when writing this that the first time I led a service in church was during the time of Colin Aspell's illness and the long interregnum after his death in the mid 80s. Little did I realise that I would be doing it on a regular basis for so long! So beware - if you volunteer, God has a way of getting you more involved if, of course, you want to. You never know – you might even enjoy the challenge.

However, we and the church will need as much support and help as possible from not only the PCC but also the congregation and the village community as we try to keep the church moving forward in both the spiritual and the community life of Ewhurst.

Understandably, John and Tim will not be able to cover all the worship that our church community needs, so we will be welcoming new as well as familiar faces to lead us in our worship. We will endeavour to provide all the worship opportunities that were available when David was here and we hope that you will support the church in what is offered.

However, changes that will happen after David leaves will be:

- The third Sunday Evening Worship at 6.30pm in the Wilson Room will also include Bible Study with the music element. The Bible Study on the First and Third Thursday evenings will stop.
- Wednesday Morning Worship at 10am in the church will not always have a minister present but people coming will be encouraged to use the service sheets left out to read the service themselves.

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Ewhurst Baptist Church

One of my hobbies is photography. A hobby that sits well with my more active pursuits of sailing and walking. I regularly find myself out enjoying the natural world of which we are part and yet from which we can get so detached these days.

Only the other day Jackie and I spent some hours walking the hills above Ewhurst. Over to Holmbury St Mary for a refreshment stop and then back again. It was a glorious autumnal day, the sun bright, the wind light and cool, and not too cold. It was a day that reminded me how privileged and blessed we are in Ewhurst to be surrounded by such natural beauty.

I find walking and photography natural companions so that rather than just walking through the countryside for exercise it becomes more a journey of observation and appreciation both of the large vistas from hilltops to the small and less significant rotting leaves, mosses and fungi.

Yet it is strange for I know how easy it is to be surrounded by God's blessings and beauty and yet to see none of it. I suppose that is true not just of nature but also of our lives in general. Sometimes we can see only the troubles and trials before us and fail to appreciate what is still good and beautiful.

The other real benefit I find in taking time to really observe nature is that it can take us out of ourselves, out of the smallness of our own lives into the brilliance and beauty of the divine. You may, or may not subscribe to the world view of a God who is good and who reveals something of His own nature through the created order but I know that for those of faith and those of none, seeing something beautiful can lift any one of us up to a brighter place.

I hear many people complain about the Winter, about the short days, the cold weather, the rain and snow. But I can't help but wonder if those same people would not benefit from taking some time to observe what is still beautiful around them, though for now resting.

When I am not sailing, walking or taking pictures I do actually, believe it or not,, spend the majority of my time pastoring the Baptist Church here in Ewhurst. Part of that role is to provide pastoral care, not just for our own congregation, but for any in need that I meet as I wander around the village. Now some people might think this is not an easy thing to do and they would be right – some situations, especially where there is much suffering and where hope seems absent, are hard and costly places to be with others. But what keeps me there is

that beneath the external signs of old age there remains a beauty in the human soul which is created in the image of God and when we glimpse that beauty the way we see the person changes fundamentally.

In the Book of Beginnings (Genesis) as God created the universe the text tells us that he repeatedly said that "he saw that it was good". This act of creative exuberance surprisingly reaches its climax in the creation of humankind and the text says that "he saw that it was very good". The Christian perspective on the natural order is that humankind, although very much part of creation are also God's greatest work within it a humbling and perplexing thought when we consider the way we have treated this world and each other.

Although today the image of God in humanity is marred by so much by our sin, the image remains there yet to be observed and that image even just glimpsed remains beautiful and soul moving because I believe that humanity is in a unique position before God. Let me give you an example of this:

A few years ago on one of my sailing trips I was moored up along side another boat for the evening and had fallen into conversation with the owner. This gentleman was at best an agnostic, someone who acknowledges the divine but in a very nebulous way, but he said to me a very profound thing. As someone who was virtually dismissive of any idea of a God of intentional love for His creation ... he said "the only thing I can't explain is beauty itself — why is the human psyche so profoundly moved by beauty?" He had no answer for his very honest question whereas for me the glimpse of something or someone beautiful is a reflection of the divine artist, our creator God. My fellow mariner was left with an unresolved question — I wonder how you might answer?

So to conclude, this Winter might we take time to observe what is beautiful around us and might that beauty once observed prompt us to wonder, if not to bow down, and give thanks as the Wise Men did in days of old when they met God revealed in the face of a human child born in Bethlehem.

Wishing you and yours a "beauty-filled" Christmas.



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Update, November 2016

Since September, when I took on the task of chairing the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, two consultants have been engaged to evaluate the work of the Housing Working Group and help us move the NP process forward quickly. The consultants are also looking at the pros and cons of site assessment and exclusion criteria to reduce the number of potential development sites available for the Neighbourhood Plan. The aim is to try and protect large areas of the village from development. And we need your help with ideas for site assessment and exclusion criteria.

We will consider your suggestions and, with our consultants' help, ensure the criteria are sound, relevant and appropriate and so acceptable to Waverley Borough Council. For example, some obvious site exclusion/assessment criteria might be: unsatisfactory access for emergency and service vehicles; adverse impact on an AONB (Area of Outstanding National Beauty); adverse effect on the setting of a listed building, or on the character and appearance of a conservation area.

Of course, there will be some areas that realistic, unbiased criteria cannot exclude. But policies or criteria applying to such areas can nevertheless provide some level of protection against development that is not in keeping with the character of this rural Parish, or the needs of the community. A policy/criterion on housing density, for example, could influence the layout of a development on any chosen site. Housing numbers per hectare that are no more dense than the current average for the surrounding area might be one such density criterion. The number of bedrooms in any house being built might also be a relevant policy criterion to restrict the size of new homes.

There will be a survey event for the whole Parish to ensure you have your say on the final exclusion criteria to be included in our NP.

Until we have that final Draft NP, we hope that the existence of Waverley-approved site assessment and exclusion criteria will help reduce the number of development applications here.

But it's also important that until we have our Draft Plan, the community exercises its right to comment on planning applications - supporting or objecting as you see fit. Watch what's happening on the planning pages of the Waverley website and send in your comments using technical, planning reasons rather than personal emotions.

News from Ewhurst CE Infant School

We have had a busy start to the Autumn term at Ewhurst CE Infant School. Our new 28 pupils in Reception class have settled in very happily, and are enjoying getting to know the school and its routines. Our Year 1 and 2 classes have already enjoyed a joint trip to the Weald and Downland Open Air Museum at Singleton. Year 1 explored how Victorian food was prepared by making and eating some drop scones, discussing where the ingredients came from, and also talking about Victorian table manners; Year 2 took part in a 'Getting to Grips' workshop where they learnt about traditional building materials and methods by trying out practical exercises in teams.

The autumn weather provides plenty of inspiration for our Forest Schools activities. Year 2 visits Sayers Croft Field Centre to undertake activities that link with the class topic – among other activities so far this term they have made wattle and daub walls, explored the woods to find natural musical instruments, made sculptures using different textures, colours and shapes, and woven crowns from twigs, leaves and feathers. Our Reception and Year 1 children enjoy their Forest Schools sessions in our Jubilee Garden.

Book Week was, as always, a very exciting and enjoyable time for the children. The highlight this year was a visit by children's author and illustrator Petr Horacek, who talked to the children about how creates his books, and also gave a book-making workshop for Years 1 and 2. The most popular activity for the children was Dressing Up Day, when they came to school as a favourite character from a traditional tale or rhyme, with some very original and interesting props!

Our new learning space, the Dove Centre, is now being well used, not only for curricular activities during the day, but also for a Breakfast Club from 8.00am each morning and for Explorers, our own after school club, which is highly popular, and open until 6.00pm.

The Parent Teacher Association continues to be very active. They are particularly involved in providing resources that support the national curriculum requirements, and last year raised over £12000. The next event is the traditional Christmas Fair which is being held this year on Saturday 26th November from 2 - 4pm. There will be plenty of Christmas presents to purchase and Father Christmas is in residence for the afternoon. Please do come and support this village event.

Christmas is always a special time in an Infant School, as the delight and excitement of the children and their families is very evident. 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In Our Midst - Daphne Enticknap MBE A Full Life of Voluntary Work

Churchill said that Sunday 15 September 1940 was "the crux of the Battle of Britain". Daphne remembers that day well, in the air -raid shelter at her family home not three miles from Biggin Hill aerodrome. The bombing had been heavy all summer but on that day, the damage was particularly bad, much of the local area was devastated and their own house had suffered too. Fortunately, help was at hand. One of her mother's sisters was working for the Parker family at Lowerhouse Farm off the Lower Breache Road in Ewhurst and Mrs Parker very kindly invited them



all to come and live with her there. So it was that the Smith family, Daphne, her mother, grandmother, a second aunt and her younger brother and sister all moved to Ewhurst. Her father stayed behind with his work in Bromley but joined them later to be employed as the gardener at Lowerhouse.

The Parker family were absolutely marvellous she says. The tension of the war had left them all in a frightened state and to come to the countryside and to be shown so many new and delightful things, changed their lives completely. Walks in the fields, blackberry picking, the wild flowers and animals; it was a totally different world. On the first Sunday, Mrs Parker said "Come along, we'll go to church" and they were driven in the family car for their first visit to Ewhurst church. Daphne remembers after the service Mrs Parker proudly introduced them as "her evacuees". Little was done about schooling for several weeks as they were not expecting to stay long but eventually, with the County School full, Daphne took a place on a two year secretarial course at Clark's College in Guildford. After qualifying in 1942, she joined the Trustees Department of Lloyds Bank which had been evacuated to Ewhurst Place and every day she cycled up the hill from home, having to dodge the lorries carrying away Ewhurst stone to build Dunsfold Aerodrome. She loved working in the office with the other girls, many of whom were from London and lived in the big house. There was a good social life there too. The effects of war were not far away however. A land mine caused huge devastation in Gadbridge Lane and the surrounding area and in the Summer of 1944 she remembers seeing, and hearing, the Doodlebug flying bombs chugging along their regular alleyway to London.

One day a package arrived in the office which was to change Daphne's life forever. It contained new caps for a cub scout pack, led by Dreeda, one of her colleagues. The girls were fascinated and when Dreeda asked if anyone would like to help her that Saturday, Daphne says, for some reason she volunteered. The small pack had been restarted by Dreeda at the request of the Rector of St Nicholas' Church and so Daphne cycled from home into Cranleigh to help her there. This is how her life and commitment to the Cub Scout Movement began. She found that she very much enjoyed working with the boys

of this age, their interest and willingness to learn was so good to be part of. After eight years in Cranleigh she was asked to lead the pack at St Saviours Church in Guildford and she remained there as Akele until she had to retire in 1991.

At the same time her career at Lloyds had moved ahead successfully. When the office in Ewhurst closed she was made permanent and moved to the new office in Guildford as section leader. From there, a further promotion moved her to the head office in Threadneedle Street as secretary to the manager. When her father died in 1956, the family clubbed together and brother Alan, now in the building trade, built the family house for them all, in the Cranleigh Road; its name, Extra Cover, reflecting Alan's love for Ewhurst cricket. Life was becoming very hectic. Every day Daphne had to cycle to Cranleigh then on to Guildford and London with the return trip in the evening. Most weeks were taken up planning weekend activities for the cubs at St Saviours and Sundays were given to helping at the Sunday School in Ewhurst. Naturally she became more involved with St Saviours Church and gained new friends and contacts at the St Saviours pack. The District Cub Scout Organisation was developing quickly and Daphne worked with them too, becoming a District Cub Leader and finally Assistant Commissioner for cub scouts, responsible for all thirty seven cub packs in the Guildford area.

I had worked for many years with Bob, Daphne says. His wife, Majorie, had first helped her in the cubs and he had joined to help with the scouts when their two sons were older. Sadly Majorie died, but Bob continued his work with the scouts and eventually he and Daphne were married. The family house was extended in order that Daphne and Bob could live there with her mother and brother. Daphne also finished her work in London. During the war she had helped her mother in the WVS offering support to local servicemen when they met in a hut next to the Crown pub. Tea was served and the men's clothing was repaired. Wanting to keep busy during the day, she joined the WRVS beginning in the travelling library but soon joining their Meals-on-Wheels service. It was very needed in those days. Meals would be collected from Roland House, Cranleigh, and delivered to many people in the area. Amazingly Daphne continued this work alongside all her scouting, organising the rota and driving for forty years until she had to give up in 2008. Daphne and Bob's work for the Scout and Cub Movements carried on apace. About ten years after they were married. Bob was appointed District Commissioner for all scouting in Surrey and for many years Daphne edited the District News Letter. On retirement from the cub pack she became secretary of the Guildford East District. She also helped Bob with his work in the new Scout and Guide shop which he had set up in Guildford. Of course over the years there had been many camps away with the boys. To Bentley Copse and into Sussex were the norm but there were also trips to Denmark and once to Switzerland. Marvellous experiences for everyone.

1998 was a year of great emotional turmoil for Daphne and her family. She describes how, in the November, she was in her kitchen with Bob and Alan when the letter arrived to tell her that she was to be awarded in the New Year's Honours list an MBE for her

services to the Surrey Scouting movement. They had to keep it a complete secret until it was formally announced on 30 December. It made it so tragic that Bob died in December, before the day of the announcement. They had already quietly begun to arrange the day but now everything had changed. People were so kind with their condolences and dealing with Christmas but then, just a short time later, they had to congratulate her for the award. It felt absolutely terrible to have these things coming together as they did and it was such a help at the time to be able to share it with Alan. The medal presentation took place in Buckingham Palace in February and Daphne was accompanied by brother Alan, step-son Andrew and granddaughter Amy. It was an incredible, special day and an amazing honour but naturally sad without Bob there too. At least he had known that it was going to take place.

A few years ago she had to give up driving and was disappointed to have to finish her voluntary work in Guildford and with Meals-on-Wheels. In spite of her failing sight, she now attends services and activities at the village church when she can and enjoys the company of village friends around her. After sixty years at Extra Cover, she is on the move, not too far, to a smaller home and the lifetime of memories she will take with her are as clear and detailed as ever. One day I must return and persuade her to write the book.

LOCAL HISTORY CORNER, by Janet Balchin The Silvertown Explosion

In January 2017 it will be the 100th anniversary of the Silvertown Explosion. This explosion of 50 tons of TNT at a munitions factory in the East End was the biggest explosion ever to have taken place in London and shock waves were felt as far away as Southampton and Norwich.

The explosion took place at the Brunner Mond factory in the early evening of Friday 19^{th} January 1917. Before the war the factory had produced caustic soda, but had been adapted for war work for the highly dangerous process of purifying of TNT, despite being in a densely populated area. A fire had broken out, which spread to the stored TNT, causing a catastrophic explosion. The factory was destroyed instantly, along with the Silvertown Fire Station, which was opposite, and many nearby warehouses and homes. Around 900 houses were rendered uninhabitable and up to 70,000 sustained damage. Debris was strewn for miles around, causing more fires, and across the river, (now the site of the Millennium Dome / O_2) a gasholder blew up in a fireball. The effects were even felt in central London where glass was blown out of windows in the Savoy Hotel and the resulting fires could be seen from Maidstone and Guildford.

Despite the devastation, the death toll was not as high as might have been expected. Seventy-three people were killed (sixty-nine immediately and four died later), and more than 400 were injured. The relatively low death toll was partly due to the time of day, 6.52pm. The day shift had finished, but the night shift had not begun, and most people were indoors, but crucially downstairs, as it was the upper floors of houses that sustained the worse damage from raining debris.

Among the dead was Samuel Saunders, of Ewhurst, one of 16 workers at the plant to die. A policeman and two firemen who had raced to help put out the original fire were also killed, but most of the victims were local residents including children. Andrea Angel, the factory's chief chemist, and George Wenbourne, were both posthumously awarded the Edward Medal; and Police Constable Edward Greenoff was posthumously awarded the King's Police Medal.

Samuel Saunders was born in Cheshire in 1866. The 1901 Census shows him as living with his wife, Jessie, and two of their three children in Ilford and his occupation was given as Foreman Carpenter at the Brunner Mond Chemical Works.

Not long after, the Saunders family moved to Ewhurst, where Samuel took up the tenancy of the Windmill Inn. He also had a licence for quarrying stone on Pitch Hill and was running a building business. After the Windmill Inn burnt down in 1906, the family moved into a new house, which he had built in the Ockley Road, near the bridge over

Cobblers Brook and the 1911 census describes him as a builder.

In 1915 Samuel returned to the Brunner Mond Works and was there on the fateful night. The local connection to the blast was not reported in the Surrey Advertiser, but a note on 3rd February stated that "Mrs Saunders and family wish to thank all friends who have written and sympathised with them in their great loss. Owing to the large number of letters received it is impossible to answer each one individually."

In the 1920s Brunner Mond erected a memorial "To the memory of those who whilst serving their country by making TNT perished in the explosion in these works. January



19th 1917", followed by a list of the names of the 16 members of staff (15 men and one woman) who were killed in the blast. After the war Brunner Mond was one of the four companies that merged to form ICI. The factory site was cleared but remained a derelict open space and was never rebuilt. By the beginning of the 21st century the memorial was standing forlorn and neglected under the raised track of the Docklands Light Railway. Now for the first time in nearly 100 years the site is being redeveloped with houses and flats and the memorial has been moved to a new site closer to the river.

Samuel's name is also recorded on the Ewhurst War Memorial, where, at the age of 50, he is the oldest casualty listed.

If you are aged 14+, can catch and throw a ball with some accuracy and would like to enjoy some light exercise and meet some fellow friendly Ewhurstians(?) then please come along to learn the game.

Winter Training 2017 will run on Mondays in Glebelands Sports Hall, Cranleigh at 8pm. The first of our indoor trainings will be on Monday 9th January 2017.

Our opening night, on the Cricket Green in Ewhurst, will be in April (date tbc) at which point we start outdoor training, friendly matches and league matches on Mondays and Wednesdays. It really is a lovely way to enjoy the outdoors.

If you still haven't heard of Stoolball, it is an exciting team sport, similar to Twenty20 cricket. Two teams compete to score the most runs. There are two wickets standing at shoulder height, about 14 metres apart. The bats are willow, with a round face and a long, sprung handle. The ball, small and hard, is bowled underarm towards one wicket. Just like cricket, batsmen score by hitting the ball into the field and running between the two wickets. They can also hit the ball beyond a boundary line to score 4 or 6. Batsmen can be bowled, caught or run-out, or even body-before-wicket.

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
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EWHURST MONDAY CLUB

We look forward to seeing you!

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
