
It is my understanding that the will of God is simply loving community. I believe, as we bring ourselves to God, that is the direction in which He will lead us together.

#### BOB FOLEY PAUSES FOR A BREW TO TELL US ABOUT HIS. AND HIS WIFE LIZ'S. PASSION FOR THE GOBLIN TEASMADE

This may sound sad for a grown man but I am a dedicated fan of the original Goblin Teasmade. DON'T laugh!.. OK, I'll allow a small snigger.

Back in the 60s I bought my parents a Goblin Teasmade as a Christmas gift. I don't really know how much they used

it but I thought in their autumn years it would be something that might make life a bit more comfortable in the mornings. At the time I thought it was a rather neat invention - but that was for 'old folks'!

Spool on about 20

of tea to bring back to a warm bed.

My dear wife must have appreciated my efforts because a few days later she presented me with our very first Goblin Teasmade (a D25B), which she had purchased at a charity shop. (It was just like the one featured in Queen's video

years and my wife, Liz, and I were renovating an old Victorian cottage. We were in the middle of a very cold winter with no heating, no glass in the new upstairs bathroom window and bare boards everywhere. Making a morning cuppa involved dragging oneself out of bed, wrapping up in a thick dressing gown and slippers and clomping down to a cold kitchen to make a nice hot cup

become a bit of a collector of these devices as we have moved on from the basic first model we owned. (more of that later).

A bit of history. In the early 1900s domestic service was in decline and with the gradual advent of a domestic supply of electricity, many laboursaving devices were marketed to householders who no longer had

domestic servants to carry out chores like delivering refreshment to one's bedchamber. For over a century tea had been the hot beverage of choice for all classes in Britain and a Teasmade was often given as a wedding present. By the end of the 1930s, with two-thirds of British homes having electricity, The Teasmade became so successful that its name became generic for automatic

tea-making machines. It is said that at the height of its popularity no seaside British B&B was complete without a Teasmade!

Used next to the bed, the Teasmade was intended to produce a hot cup of tea for the tea drinker who did not have to leave the

comfort of their bed in the morning. The machine includes an alarm clock, which wakes the sleeper and activates the mechanism, turning on an electric element to heat water in the kettle. Boiling water passes from the kettle through a tube into the teapot and when this occurs the power to the element is cut off, the alarm sounds and the tea is made. Genius!

Goblin, part of the British Vacuum Cleaner & Engineering Company (the domestic appliance company founded by Hubert Cecil Booth, inventor of the vacuum cleaner) became the most

established name in the market. Initially the Teasmade was manufactured in Leatherhead until 1967 when all production was transferred to Castlereagh in Northern Ireland. Most people might assume that Goblin made around 4 or 5 different models. In fact they actually produced over 34 variants over a period of 40 years!

> Anyway, back to my own slightly sad case! Our first machine eventually developed a fault so I looked to purchase a more modern replacement and I guess that's when I started to become what's known as a 'Teasmaniac' (look it

up, it's a thing!). I

managed to purchase a D855 model on Ebay which became our pride and joy! This came complete with a teapot and a tray, which made the transport of teapot and cups to the bedroom much easier!

Occasionally I have had to replace the odd one for, say, a noisy clock but we have enjoyed our morning tea in bed for the last 45 years. In that time, for no particular reason other than possibly having a spare, I have acquired six of these clever devices. I just like them! Don't ask!

### The Wasp Bus


Robin Gates updates us on this amazing community resource

## **The Dazzling Francs**

JULIE FRANCIS TELLS US ABOUT SHINDIGS IN THE BANK OF ENGLAND VAULT

I t was Autumn. I was 17 and worked in the Balance of Payment office (as it was then called) in the Bank of England, City of London. I had not long left school.

I don't recall being on the Office Party Committee but what I do know is that I was chosen together with two colleagues to dance the Can-Can at the office party the following January.

We were trained in the sub-vaults of the Bank - can you just imagine amongst all that bullion - and there we were with a professional dancer teaching us in our lunch hours, including how to do the fake splits. It was great fun. I do not recall who had the brainwave to call us The Dazzling Francs: a wonderful name.

Real Can-Can dresses were hired and with great anticipation on the night we waited in the wings to be cheered and clapped when we appeared. It was a great success. Lots of applause and acclaim afterwards too.

One of my memories is that when we joined the party after our performance, all the food had been eaten. But my most abiding and fondest memory is that I can lay claim to having danced in the vaults of The Bank of England in my lunch hours!





# A Marble Jar


#### IZZY MCLEAN INTRODUCES A TECHNIQUE TO HELP US FIND AND GROW OUR SUPERPOWERS



Ronnie Barker said his favourite task for the Two Ronnies was writing comedy songs. He described it as "linguistic chess".

O ver the years, Ronnie Barker wrote hundreds of sketches, gags and monologues for The Two Ronnies, but his favourite task was writing the comic songs that closed each show. He once described writing funny lyrics to existing tunes as "linguistic chess"; the new lyrics had to fit the tune, rhyme and scan, but most importantly, the punchline of each joke had to wait until the last word of the last line. For a writer, it's a delightful challenge (up there with cryptic crosswords), but you have to be prepared to "murder your darlings". All too often, you'll come up with the perfect couplet, save for the final rhyme. And if you do find one, it isn't funny. Or it doesn't make sense. So, you either have to scrap the whole thing and start again, or flip the words around and try different constructions. You have to play with it until it clicks into place. → In recent years, I've re-written the lyrics to the songs for the Ewhurst Players' pantomimes and produced songs or poems for our last-night parties. Alas, the pandemic has put paid to all that for a while, but we'll be back in action in the autumn with The Lady in the Van.


