



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

A large part of my ministry in Ewhurst is spent working with children – and it's a part I love! During the summer term I was invited into 2 classes at Ewhurst Infant School to answer questions – any questions were welcomed and I certainly got a variety.

Some of them were predictably about Scruffy the Dog – the children are fascinated by him; 'how old is he?', 'where does he live?' etc. Scruffy has a long and fascinating 'back story' if you are interested!

But then we had a lot of questions based around creation and the natural world; 'how many fish are there?' was one. 'Why are there giraffes?' was also difficult, and 'Why is there the R.N.L.I.?' was another tricky one for me to answer – but I did my best.

There were lots of questions about God too; 'how old is he and where does he live?' cropped up again. Then there were questions about heaven and indirectly, what happens when we die.

The children at this age of 6 & 7 are beginning to work their way through some big questions of life, and seeing life through the lens of faith is a very helpful tool in their understanding. I or one of my team visit the school most weeks to take assemblies (Scruffy is very welcome there too!) and find that the scope of topics provided for us by the school is both wide and challenging, but with a bit of imagination we can provide a point of view from faith that helps the children to grow in their understanding of the world around them.

The amount children grow and change at this age is astonishing and is most evident to me when I help Mrs Dyer with the End of Year Assembly and service in Church. At the end of the summer term we are saying goodbye to the oldest class as they move on to new schools after 3 years at Ewhurst. They receive an outstanding start to their school life at Ewhurst and I can't tell you what a pleasure it is to see those children who entered the school

The Outbreak of the First World War

The dominant event of the late summer was the extended commemoration of the start of the First World War. There were moving ceremonies in this country and France. These were and are important because we must not forget the great sacrifices and terrible events of one hundred years ago. It was surprising to me to discover that in August 1914 there was optimism and positive expectation among many people. Volunteers went to recruiting offices in their thousands and by early September the Government announced that more than 250,000 men had answered Lord Kitchener's call to arms. In Britain and Germany a short conflict was anticipated. August headlines in UK newspapers predicted the conflict would be over by Christmas and the German Kaiser promised that his soldiers would be back home before the leaves fell from the trees. This proved to be a terrible misjudgement of the situation. The war escalated as David Lloyd George, then Chancellor of the Exchequer, warned: "once blood is shed in a national guarrel, reason and right are swept aside by the rage of angry men". By Christmas Day 1914, when English and German soldiers played a game of football, there had been extensive fighting at sea as well as on land. Some of the battles took place in areas that have remained notorious down the century: Flanders, Mons, Arras, Loos, Reims and Ypres. At the end of October (after just 3 months of fighting), British casualties exceeded 57,000.

Some people ask: Why does God allow war? The answer is to be found in the fact that God gave us free will. This means that we can ignore Him and the way He wants us to behave. As a result some people make decisions and act in ways that lead to conflict and war, in the most extreme circumstances. Everything written in the Old Testament about God, everything that Jesus taught us is as far removed from war as it is possible to imagine. When asked which Commandment was the most important; Jesus answered to love God and our neighbour. In a parable, he made it clear that our neighbour meant everyone, not just those we call friends. The problems start when love is absent, because then fear takes hold. Fear breeds a lack of trust and without trust disputes develop and escalate. War is the result.

When we leave God out of our lives and ignore his commands, we are plunged into spiritual darkness. On his arrest, Jesus told his accusers: "this is your hour when darkness reigns". When we experience periods of serious trouble, the world can seem dark even when the sun is shining. Darkness produces fear and misery, but even in the worst situations we can find



shafts of light. In war shafts of light are seen in many ways such as individual acts of bravery, of selfless service, even personal sacrifice. It is there we find God because the truth is we are never abandoned. During the First World War 626 Victoria Crosses were awarded. Here is one example of many outstandingly brave deeds: in November 1914 a bands man was acting as stretcher bearer, he attended wounded under heavy shell and rifle fire, and subsequently rescued several men buried in a trench by howitzer shells. This is only the tip of the very large iceberg of bravery and sacrifice that were the shafts of light that shone out in the darkness. The darkness remains as long as conflict continues. Unfortunately, it continues today in so many parts of the world where conflict can be justified by warped attitudes to religion.

Jesus challenged us by asking "if you love those who love you, what reward will you get?" We must try to love others irrespective of their attitude to us – not an easy thing to do for any of us. There is a lack of trust and love in the Middle East at the moment. The events of 100 years ago are an extreme example of how badly things can go wrong when the love of God is rejected. As Christians we must always pray for peace and understanding.

Strengthen our hearts, and hands, and minds, O Lord, to work together for peace;

to see you in one another; and to seek your kingdom above all things; that your will may be seen to be done and your kingdom come,

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Ewhurst Baptist Church

Here at the Baptist Church over recent weeks we have been exploring what the bible teaches about the age old subject of suffering in this world and the resources it provides to help us cope with the very real and personal nature of pain, so that our suffering need not consume our sense of identity.

The Book of Job in the Old Testament is one of the bible's most ancient and profound books which explores the enigma of suffering in our lives and in the wider world. The Philosopher Peter Kreeft said "Job is a mystery. A mystery that satisfies something in us but not our reason". And the author Tim Keller wrote "The rationalist is repelled by Job, as were Job's three rationalist friends but the Book of Job speaks to something deeper within each one of us".

Primarily the Book of Job deals with the issue of innocent suffering — why do so many good people have a disproportionate number of afflictions and tragedies while others who are dishonest, selfish and greedy have comfortable lives? Job challenges both the religious rejoiner to suffering of "you must have done something wrong", and the secular of "there is no good reason — a good God would not allow this so he either doesn't exist or he doesn't care". Both it teaches, are ultimately wrong just too simplistic in the face of mystery.

The book explores through a series of conversations between God and Satan, between Job and his friends and ultimately between Job and God Himself the different perspectives, understanding and explanations of each party. Different perspectives and arguments which all diminish in the last four chapters when God comes on the scene in person and fires a whole list of questions at Job that serve to demonstrate just how little we as human beings understand of God and His ways.

Job is very much a book of conversation and although Job rages against his situation and pleads his innocence he continues to talk to God – he continues to pray even when he is in despair. Giving us these words that are often read at funerals.

Job 1:20 Job fell to the ground in worship 21 and said: "Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked I shall depart. The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; may the name of the LORD be praised."

Despite how he feels he still acknowledges God's sovereignty and bows down in worship. These are the words of a man of faith who has lost everything bar his life. He has lost his wealth, his family, his health, his position in society and the respect of his friends. Giving thanks to God when we receive good things in our lives is one thing, but Job helps us recognise that because God is over all, it is right to give thanks whether he is giving to us or taking from us.

This might seem a very strange response to our modern minds, but it is one that despite its age continues to have validity today. When we are faced with situations that have the potential to destroy us, whether matters of health, wealth or self-esteem we can either rail against them though ultimately we will be overcome. Or we can bring all such matters to God in prayer seeking to see them in a different perspective.

I know personally that it is often in our times of trial that prayer, that continuous conversation with God, very quickly seems to get forgotten or put to one side. By contrast Job shows us an example not just of prayer that continues, but one that becomes more honest and faithful as he accepts and give thanks for God's oversight of all of his life, his joys as well as his sorrows.

By the end of the book, Job is none the wiser as to why he suffered but what has changed is his perspective. If you know the book you will be familiar with the real high point that comes in Ch 38 where we see the ardour of Job's prayers, his cries for help and justice answered by God Himself, an encounter that is life changing and allows him to cry out the words famously used by Handel in his *Messiah* when they sing "I know that my redeemer lives ...".

A cry of faith that is life changing allowing us to see the same world but with different eyes as millions of Christians over the millennia and all over the world today can testify.

If you would like to know more of such faith, we are running our regular Christianity Explored course this Autumn, further details of which are posted elsewhere in this magazine. You would be very welcome to come and learn more as you seek to put suffering, both yours and others, into a different perspective.



EWHURST SHORT MAT BOWLS CLUB CELEBRATES 25 SUCCESSFUL YEARS

Journalist and author Jack Low traces the rise and rise of the Club which hit the Lottery jackpot (an excerpt)

LIKE so many other successful ventures, it all began with a chance remark as Ewhurst bowlers celebrated their club's 50th anniversary back in 1986. Guests at their Open Day festivities included friend and local bowler John Squire who described how the new sport of short mat bowls was proving highly popular with his outdoor colleagues at nearby Bookham.

Instead of going into hibernation at the end of their summer season, members were now able to get together in the local village hall and bowl throughout the winter on a portable 45-foot mat, six feet wide, which stored away after use.

The first English bowlers to try their hand established a formal association in 1984, and its popularity was in turn picked up by the Bookham club where it was proving such a hit with players of all sexes, and of all ages and abilities.

The Ewhurst pioneers liked what they saw and instantly picked up the short mat bug, but the obvious problem was where to play in the village. Their own clubhouse was too small and badly in need of repair, so their attention turned to the nearby badminton hall run by Ewhurst Youth and Sports Club where permission was granted to share the premises on Wednesday evenings.

A deal was done with the Bookham club to buy one of their mats for a princely £10, and the intrepid Ewhurst players were soon up and running including Barrie Heathcote, David Triggs, Derek Mortimore, George Spiers, George Yates, Tony Riches, Dick Starbuck, Jan Michalski, John Boast, Chris Bullen and Dick Bradley.

club in 1989, and the inaugural Minutes Book of Ewhurst Indoor Bowls Club on August 23 of that year records their initial progress.

Members present at the convivial meeting were George Yates, George Spiers, David Triggs, Jan Michalski, Derek Mortimore, John Boast, Arthur Dore and Barrie Heathcote, who was formally appointed to the Chair. With just the one mat available, it was agreed membership should be restricted to 12, with overcrowding resolved by playing on a rotational basis. Joining fee was set at £10, with annual membership £15.

The Minutes concluded: 'After a reasonable consumption of alcohol and affable chat, the Meeting was declared closed, with George Yates free to return to the comfort of his armchair from which he had made a late and prompted ascent'.

In its first formal season, the Bookham link was further strengthened by a reciprocal visit to Ewhurst by a team led by John Squire who, in a show of compassion to the new bowlers, brought along one of Bookham's own blocks – the lump of wood so hated by all short mat players (and a few of the longer established) – to be presented as a consolation prize to the losers.

Parish Council agree to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan

Your Parish Council have now started work on a Neighbourhood Plan covering the whole of the Parish. This has to be led by the Parish Council, but must be a community project. Therefore a Steering Group has been set up comprising parish councillors Tim Bloomfield [Chair of the committee] and Val Henry, together with five local residents Allan Webber, David Allen, Bob Arnold, Paddy Geoghegan, and David Quoroll. However involvement of all the community is critical. A public meeting will be held in the autumn to start the process of involving the whole community in helping to prepare the plan.

Ewhurst's Neighbourhood Plan will sit below the new Local Plan for all of Waverley Borough. As many of you will know, that plan is being currently redrafted following its earlier rejection because it made insufficient provision for new housing. Our plan cannot be adopted until the Waverley Plan is, probably in the autumn of 2015. Our plan will have to provide for at least the same rate of growth as the new Waverley Borough Plan, otherwise it will not be adoptable. Ewhurst's plan will have to be supported by the Parish Council and a majority in a local Referendum and approved by an Independent Examiner.

Why have a Neighbourhood Plan? There are many reasons, but the most important concerns housing. Waverley will dictate numbers, but without our own plan we will have no say in where they go and we could be prey to any number of speculative proposals for housing development in the coming years. A Neighbourhood Plan will give the local community a say on which developments are acceptable and needed.

Clearly the biggest challenge for us will be communication. Amongst other mediums, we will be using the EBulletin set up by the Parish Council for both council and other community news. Take up of this has been slow, and it is clear that some recipients who have subscribed do not necessarily open these emails. It is for all rubbish associated with the graves, for instance plastic wrappings as well as plant debris can be put in the bin. The bin will be transported to the road side when collection is imminent so there may be some days when it appears to disappear for a short while. The rubbish in the burial ground continues to be a problem through people simply not using the bin.

At last, with considerable help from Alan Young (our County Councillor) we have managed to get SCC to start rebuilding the footpath outside Drury/Pitch Hill House, Ride Way. Hopefully this will make it safer for walkers.

After a very busy and successful day at the Ewhurst Carnival where the Youth Club ran an array of stalls including the craze sweeping the nation of Loom Banding, the children took great advantage of the duck racing pond and the water zorb pool to cool off. It had been a great day the first time for many years that the Youth Club had taken part in the procession and the members helping with the stalls. It was wonderful to

see so many people having fun. EWHURST WAR MEMORIAL



The main focus of Remembrance in the village of Ewhurst takes the form of a Celtic cross of Cornish granite. The lower faces carry lead lettering, depicting the ranks, names and regiments of 51 men of the parish who died during, or as a result of the First World War. The memorial is sited in a very imposing position on The Mount in front of the church of St Peter and St Paul, overlooking the main road through the village. On the opposite side of the road is the village school and the cross itself is flanked by the Old Post Office, a public house at the time of the First World War and the three bay windows of Mount & Church Gate Cottages. At one time Mount Cottage was used as a recruiting village and it is poignant to reflect on how many post within the of the men named on the monument attended the church and school, frequented the public house, and signed up for service within the surrounds of the Memorial.

The memorial, which at the time cost £250, was funded by contributions within the village and unveiled by Mr Walter Webb (Chairman of the Ewhurst War Memorial Committee and father of the late Captain Evelyn M Webb Remembrance Sunday, 7th November 1920. On Remembrance Sunday each year, the villagers of Ewhurst and Ellen's Green recall the price paid by those names on the monument and others as they gather on the Mount, read the names of the Fallen and participate in the National Silence at 11am, which marks the Armistice of the First World War.

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In Our Midst ~ Brenda Roberts A Life of Fellowship and Outreach


Brenda came to Ewhurst from the Wirral in 1988, shortly after her husband had died. Wanting to be close but not too close to her daughters in Sevenoaks and son in Guildford, the bungalow in Cranleigh Road was perfect with a lovely garden and sunny lounge. She quickly became actively involved in the Baptist Church community, later becoming an elder with pastor Michael Foreman. She continues to worship there still.



Born in Streatham, Brenda was educated at St Martins in the Fields School in Tulse Hill. When war broke out she was evacuated with the school to Leatherhead. St Johns School was used for classes when the boys were safely on the games field and years later, three of her grandsons were amused to learn that their grandmother had also attended their school. This was a significant time in her life she says. It meant the break-up of her family with her brother joining up and her sister evacuated to Horsley Towers. Not able to follow a career in music as she had wanted, she applied to train as a nurse at St Bartholomew's Hospital. Wartime London was considered too dangerous and so the first year of the four year training was completed in St Albans. After that it was back to Barts for the second year and later to attend a midwifery course in Edinburgh. The training was thorough and very good she says. With none of the technical equipment available now, the work was labour intensive and you were expected to do everything - administer care, sterilise instruments. basic cleaning. It was a hard time but satisfying although there was never enough time to talk to and get to know the patients well.

Having been brought up in the Baptist Church, it was at this time that Brenda began to deepen her personal faith and to want to do more about it. She began to consider making a greater commitment to missionary work and with friends already working in Nigeria, she looked to join them there. With money saved, she attended the two year course at Ridgelands Bible College in Bexley to learn more about missionary work. Eventually however she did not go to Nigeria, choosing instead to stay at home and commit herself to spreading the gospel through her work as a nurse and then later as a wife and mother at home. She had met and married Victor, at that time a member of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve and they settled in Shirley, Croydon where their three children were to grow up.

In hospitals at that time all the young nurses lived in, away from the family and friends they knew and Christian Fellowship meetings gave a place for these women to meet regularly for both social and spiritual fulfilment. The popular meetings were known as "squashes" where the Christian message could be





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delivered through a relaxed social occasion. Brenda had the vision to introduce these groups to more hospitals and by writing and obtaining permission from the matrons, the local group eventually involved twelve hospitals in the region. Later when the family was older and had moved to a bigger house in East Croydon, she was introduced to the Christian Lunch and Dinner Club, a new organisation which would invite friends to tea or supper and to listen to a speaker who's life had been changed by Christianity. The wife of a doctor was able to invite some of his patients who the hospital system could no longer help and it was here that Brenda says she began to learn the skill and value of listening to others.

With her children at senior schools, she successfully applied for the position of administrative assistant/assistant matron at the prestigious Hospital for Neurology and Neurosurgery in Queen's Square, London. A post-graduate establishment, it cares for patients with Parkinson's disease, motor neurone disease and other potentially terminal conditions. Driving from Croydon in her Mini, the work was very fulfilling and enjoyable and her experience and listening skills were put to good use.

After seven years, in 1977, her husband was transferred to the Lime Street office in Liverpool. With the children now away at university it was a straightforward move to the Wirral but a wrench from the work she loved. In Liverpool, as if it were a sign, she learned that someone had written from Canada to ask if there was a CLDC group in place as they were coming to the area. There not being one, Brenda saw the opportunity to begin her fellowship work again and set up a group as before. In addition, she was asked to join the committee of a 52 bed hostel for young men run by the Christian Alliance Housing Association, soon becoming its chairman. She recalls the 1984 visit of American evangelist Billy Graham. Speaking to thousands at the Anfield ground, he was so inspirational to all Christians.

Unfortunately life was made more difficult for Brenda with the onset of rheumatoid arthritis but it did not stop her from continuing with this work. Sadly her husband died in 1987 and so she came to the bungalow in which she lives today. Her reputation followed her and she was soon asked to chair the committee of a similar but much larger CAHA hostel in Waterloo. An interesting place she says, with 132 beds and 37 different nationalities all living in harmony. In 1990 Brenda and Julia Stearnes led their own fellowship groups to begin joint church social meetings in the Glebe Centre which continue as the Wednesday coffee mornings to this day. More recently she furthered her interest in listening skills at a Victim Support course run at Hazlemere police station. I learnt a lot she says, but after her lifetime's experiences I am sure that others on the course learnt a great deal from her too.

Ewhurst in the Great War

August 2014 marked the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War.

I am researching what happened in Ewhurst during those momentous years and how it affected local people and will be reporting these events chronologically in the form of a monthly 'Bulletin' which will be posted on the new Ewhurst History Society website -www.ewhursthistory.com I will also be placing a printed version in the parish church and the Glebe Centre so that those who do not have access to the internet can also read them.

My research is still ongoing and I would love to hear from anyone who may have family memories of Ewhurst from this time and be particularly interested if anyone has any photographs. Did you have a relative who fought in the war, or was a VAD? Did your ancestors farm in Ewhurst, or run a shop or business during the First World War? Has anyone got any old Parish Magazines or any other form of documentation? Many thousands of letters were written during this period, the Surrey Advertiser sometimes quoted from letters from the Front, but have any survived? Over the next four years many villages and communities will be holding exhibitions and publishing commemorative books. If we can collect enough information we could do something for Ewhurst too.

Tuesday, 16th September 2014 - The History of Leith Hill Place - Patrick Newberry

Leith Hill Place was the childhood home of one of England's greatest composers, Ralph Vaughan Williams, who gave it to the National Trust in 1944. His grandparents, Josiah Wedgwood III and Caroline (née Darwin) moved there in 1847 and his great uncle, the famous naturalist Charles Darwin, conducted experiments in the grounds. Despite their remarkable success, Surrey Hills Chamber Choir singers are amateurs who all combine their singing with a wide range of other professional and personal commitments.
