nce again the annual tour of Ewhurst's Secret Gardens allows visitors to enjoy gardens that are usually hidden behind fences or hedges. The first tour took place in 1995 and we have endeavoured to feature several new gardens each year within the area that we have chosen.

This year our gardens are on the southern end of the village benefitting from fantastic rural views, in a variety of sizes and styles with a huge assortment of flowers, trees and shrubs to admire. The hardworking owners will be only too happy to welcome you and have a chat.

There are two wonderful tea venues where you can enjoy refreshments and

delicious cakes. Maps displayed in the village will show you which gardens are open.

Proceeds are shared between the village school, and village charities benefitting the youth of the village.

Church In The Woods

A POEM INSPIRED BY OKEWOOD CHURCH - ERNEST SHEPPARD 1991

Set on its grassy knoll above a vale that forms a channel for a peaty brook, the Church stands hidden from the beaten trail, as if it had withdrawn when men forsook the ways of God whose house their forbears built to serve them as a shrine and prayer book.

Surrounding it, the lichened headstones tilt above the graves of yeoman, cotter, serf; long, long at rest beneath the flowered quilt of mossy patches in a sheep-cropped turf screened all around by coppices of beech, of oak and hazel. Wind-moved, they too serve to tell of hope, as eloquent as speech at open graves once; that all those may rise from death to whom the trumpet's call will reach.

The rodent tooth of time, which ever tries the fabric of men's lives and works, had cracked the ancient walls and roof. Grace fortifies in man both skill and will to keep intact the house of God, and hope, that he will stave off ruin from a sacred artefact.





It was a chapel first, with but a nave and chancel. Many centuries have passed before it was a parish church which gave its rural fold of worshippers at last an altar tending to their spirits' needs; and a more lively reason to hold fast to faith that bears good fruit in thoughts and deeds in St Augustine's England, since the day he sowed in Saxon soil the Gospel seeds.

Strangers may come to see, and some to pray; and of the former, some perhaps will find an unseen hand has led them on this way to fill with beauty eyes that have been blind; to open ears, to comfort seldom heard; to make a sanctuary of heart and mind, that they may house the power of the word.

Majestic memories

MARIAN HEATHCOTE BRINGS US HER CHILDHOOD MEMORIES OF THE CORONATION AND EARLY YEARS OF OUR QUEEN'S REIGN.

7 ou have to be of a certain age to remember those schooldays when your classroom contained rows of wooden desks, each one with its attached seat, lift up lid and inkwell. I have a clear memory of one day at my school in Alfold where I sat at such a desk. It was a typical Winter's Day and the lights were on. Our teacher gave us the sad news that King George VI had died peacefully in his sleep and that we had a new Queen. Few households had a television at that time but, having returned home, I remember listening to sombre music being played on our radio. It was February 6th 1952.

Preparations for the Queen's Coronation began in April and the sadness at the death of her father was replaced with great excitement as everyone looked forward to the events that were to take place 14 months later on June 2nd 1953. The Queen had insisted that her Coronation should take place before the television cameras and purchases of TV sets escalated.

My Auntie Ethel had bought one and we were invited to join the family at her house in Cranleigh to watch this momentous event. The screen was very small and the images, although



→ described as black and white were, in fact, rather grey and grainy but we didn't care because, for us, this was a first and we were able to witness the processions and the whole ceremony. The service lasted almost 3 hours and although I didn't want to miss a moment of it, as a child I have to confess, that I found some of it rather boring. I remember feeling sorry for the young Queen as she

looked so
uncomfortable with
the heavy crown on
her head. After sitting
still for so long we
were ready for a
change of scenery and
my father drove us to
Ewhurst, the village
where he had been
born and brought up.
News of the roasting
of an Ox on the

Recreation Ground had reached us. The weather was not typical of a summer's day and we all gathered as close to the dying embers of the fire as possible. I was looking forward to tasting something as exotic as Ox but remember being very disappointed that there was very little left on the carcass. It had been served exclusively to Parishioners following the official carving in the morning.

Fast forward to 1957 and I am at school in Guildford. Our Class Teacher announces that Queen Elizabeth and The Duke of Edinburgh will be visiting the town on June 27th and that they will be driving past our school in Farnham Road. This was, however, a day when we were due to take one of our O Level Exams. Our initial disappointment that we would miss seeing her was soon turned to relief when we were told that we had been given very special permission for the exam to start early so

that we could be out on the pavement to watch her pass by. Guildford was celebrating 700 years since the granting of its Charter and the Queen was to receive the traditional gift of a Plum Pudding on the balcony of the Guildhall in the High Street and then be

driven to view progress at the site of Guildford Cathedral which was still under construction. The Royal couple were going to sign bricks, something that we had been urged to do as a way of fund raising. I doubt if they bought theirs for 2s 6d as we had! The exam was over and with mounting anticipation we stood, flags in hands awaiting the drive past. Was her Majesty behind schedule? Her car drove past all too quickly so my sighting was brief but my teenage self was very excited that I had caught a glimpse of our Queen.



Putting the grand into grandparent

REVEREND DAVID HOWLING GAVE A TALK ON THIS SUBJECT AT A RECENT MEN'S BREAKFAST. SO WE ASKED IF HE'D WRITE A FEW WORDS FOR US. HE SAID YES!

O f all the titles and honours bestowed upon Queen Elizabeth II, I would not be surprised if that of 'grandmother' was Her Majesty's favourite. Having 8 grandchildren and 8 great-grandchildren I think that it is safe to say that Her Majesty knows a

thing or two about being a grandmother. The impact that Her Majesty has had on her grandchildren is well known as they themselves often testify.


Her Majesty's role as a grandmother reminds us that our potential to be used by God

increases with age. Grandparents have a grander wisdom that comes simply from having lived much longer than their grandchildren. Being a Christian grandparent is the highest office in the world

My first memory of my grandfather is sitting on his lap holding the steering wheel as he drove his car round to his garage. I remember it so well because it made me feel like I was doing something really grown up and that

made me feel special.

I can just imagine young Timothy sitting on his grandmother's lap as she taught him the stories of the Old Testament. What an impact that must have had on his childhood faith and his ministry as an adult.



when you cultivate the fruits of the Spirit, when you perform even the smallest of tasks with great love, your grandchildren will experience God through you before they experience God for themselves.

At the beginning of the book of Proverbs we are taught to; "Listen to your father's instruction and do not forsake your mother's teaching." (Proverbs 1:8) As children get older and start to do more for themselves,

→ they begin to look to sources other than their parents for wisdom.

The younger generation are extremely adept at using the internet. Fortunately they know better than to trust everything they come across online. Grandparents on the other hand are overwhelmingly respected as a trustworthy source of wisdom and knowledge.


Chapter 3 of James' letter warns us to be careful where we get our wisdom from because there are two types of wisdom. There is a heavenly wisdom that comes from God and there is a man-made wisdom that comes from

an entirely different place. Your grandchildren will pick up on your wisdom! So make sure that what you pass on to them is heavenly wisdom!

Proverbs 13:22a is a commandment aimed squarely at grandparents. "Good people leave an inheritance to their grandchildren." This verse is not about saving up money that you can pass on to your grandchildren, it's about the spiritual legacy that you leave behind.

When my own children were young Christmas dinner was always at grandma and grandads. The whole family would be there and extra tables and chairs would be pressed into service from where ever they could be gleaned. Once the turkey had settled in our stomachs and a blizzard of wrapping paper had settled on the lounge carpet, my father-in-law would reach for the family photo albums and tell stories from there days as missionaries in Bolivia. My own son has followed in the steps of his grandparents and is now working for the gospel in Bolivia.

It is also important to understand that your legacy is more to do with the patterns and relationships that you established during your lifetime than your achievements. The best legacy that you can leave is a good character.



There's a line in an old country and western song about a small town preacher. As the singer recalls her father's life the line goes like this; "We never had a lot but we got by, I guess the Lord was on my daddy's side!"

In the OT David was known as a friend of God. Moses was one to whom God spoke face to face. When things started getting a bit tricky for Isaiah, God said 'I'm on your side'. What better way to be remembered than as a friend of God, one who spoke to God and had God on your side.

The best legacy that you can leave your grandchildren is a legacy that points them to God and encourages them to know God for themselves.



SOME REASONS FOR OUR HAVING A PARISH MAGAZINE.

We live in an age when every one can read, and when printing is cheap, people will read and will talk; we propose to give them something to read, something to think over, something to talk about. The children can read everything in our Parish Magazine without burt.

The penny local newspaper gives us the news of the neighbourhood, but it cannot afford space in its columns for details of our parish news that interest only the village people, but that interest them more than a great deal that they read in their weekly print; details, not only about ourselves, but about our ancestors who lived in the village of old times.

A fairly well ordered parish is a family, and the members of it care for one another. We like to know what is going on in the churches, the schools, the societies formed for mutual improvement and amusement. We like to know a little about one another, our joys and sorrows, we record therefore each baptism, marriage, and funeral; and we like to know what they are doing next door, that is, in the next parish; perhaps we can take a hint, or they have something in their own history that concerns our own parish.

The Parish Magazine is more than a newspaper. It is a record of parish events, a collection of annals, it is worth preserving. Formerly a record of local events was preserved in the parish books, but great changes have taken place in the management of parochial affairs, and no parish records beyond bare entries of names are now made, yet our local events excite more interest and attention every day, and the Parish Magazine of 1890, say, will, as years roll on, become more and more valuable and interesting, for here people, by and bye, will see us as we are to-day.

We may hope that those who come after us, and who may read our Magazine, will be bold enough to preserve and to enlarge what we have received, and are handing on to them; and that they may even recover some things that we or our forefathers have lost.

The above article appeared in the 1890 edition of the Capel, Ockley, Okewood and Newdigate parish magazine. The editor feels it couldn't better sum up the ideals of a parish magazine.





CORONATION is a nation's birthday. It is the day on which its people celebrate the union that makes them one. Of that union the Crown is the symbol. The legal and spiritual association of men of different races, creeds and classes which we call a nation, though often taken for granted, is a more wonderful miracle than the greatest achievement of science. It enables millions who have never set eyes on one another to act together in peaceful and mutual co-operation and makes them glad and proud to do so. There can be no truer

service to humanity than to preserve such a union, and prevent those millions from dissolving into antagonistic and destructive groups. A nation, like a garden, is a creation of constant love and labour. If that love and labour cease, the weeds and the wild that threaten it will break in and destroy it.

In this ancient nation—one in which deep-rooted patriotism has again and again saved both us and others—the Crown has played the chief part in keeping us one. We have long divested it of political responsibility and have evolved other institutions to resolve political contests and express our political will. But of all our institutions the monarchy serves best to unite us: to remind us that the political and economic differences that divide us are less real than the ties of history that unite us.

For a nation is a union in both space and time. We are not compatriots only of those who live a long way away, but of those who lived before us and of those who will live after us. We are as much the countrymen of Nelson, Wesley and Shakespeare as of our own contemporaries. Our Queen who is crowned today is the symbol of that union in time. She is descended from a long line of those who have represented the unity of our country through every hour of her history. She is the descendant of Alfred—the lonely King who saved England by his courage and Christendom by his example, and, single-handed, re-created civilization in a ruined land. She is the descendant of the great Norman who, though he conquered England, made her the first national kingdom of Europe. She is the descendant of the Angevin genius who established the Common Law; of Edward I, father of our Parliament; of his heroic adversary, Robert Bruce, who preserved in the teeth of all odds the separate nationhood of his country and, by preventing an enforced union of the crowns of England and Scotland, made possible that fruitful and





Ewhurst in 1952

JANET BALCHIN, OF EWHURST HISTORY SOCIETY, LOOKS BACK AT THE FIRST YEAR OF THE QUEEN'S REIGN.



¬he population of Ewhurst had L changed during the war, with people away on war service, and an influx of both child and adult evacuees. Afterwards, as things slowly recovered, many people moved on to make new lives elsewhere, whilst some of the people who had come to Ewhurst during the war stayed on.

The village was still quite small. New council houses had been built in Downhurst Road after the war, but there were only a few houses in Mapledrakes Road and work had not started on the development of The Glebe.

There were no supermarkets and, as few people had cars, they relied on local shops for their everyday needs. There were three general stores - Hamshire's Gadbridge Stores in Gadbridge Lane, Forrest Stores (now Eden Hair Spa), and

Hydes Stores at Hazelbank (the sign for which was found to be still in-situ, during recent renovations); two butchers - Lades at Hazelbank and Bailey's dairy and butchers at Milk Hill; a bakery, a sweet shop and chemists. The village had its own post office, doctor, district nurse and policeman. There were also two pubs on opposite sides of the green at the north end of the village, The Bull's Head and The Crown (which closed in 1960).

In 1952, Ewhurst School was still an 'allage' school. With the raising of the school leaving age from 14 to 15 in 1947, and the post-war 'baby-boom', the number on roll increased from 87 children in 1946, to 124 by 1951. To ease overcrowding, Sir Eric Miller, of Oldhouse, donated a hut classroom, which was officially opened by Lord Macmillan, of Moon Hall, in 1952.

Ready for the vote

JOANNA CADMAN REPORTS THAT THE PARISH NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN IS READY FOR A REFERENDUM ON THURSDAY 30^{TH} JUNE

After nearly 8 years and many iterations, the Ewhurst and Ellens Green Neighbourhood Plan is now finally ready to be voted on by you, the parishioners, in a referendum.

We had decided to carry out the Regulation 14 consultation a second time to get the backing of the Parish to our decision that we should make no allowance for any further housing sites. According to the latest Waverley figures, in 2022 there were already over 180 dwellings consented and completed since 2014 when we were allocated just 100 in the Local Plan. We received overwhelming support

to that consultation in April 2021 and, following the most recent consultation with the Parish, Regulation 16 just before Christmas, our Neighbourhood Plan, together with all your comments, was submitted by Waverley to an Independent Examiner for review.

Upon the conclusion of his review, the Independent Examiner observed as follows:

I congratulate Ewhurst and Ellens

Green Parish Council on reaching this important stage in the preparation of the Neighbourhood Plan. I appreciate that a lot of hard work has gone into its production and the Parish Council should be commended for its perseverance in seeing the plan to this stage. It certainly has been a marathon.

The Plan has sought to protect the character of the settlements and to ensure that development that does take place meets local

housing needs. I believe the document and its policies will form a sound basis for determining planning applications in the parish into the future.

To conclude, I can confirm that my overall conclusions are that the Plan, if amended in line with my →

A picture into the past

AFTER RECOGNISING A PORTRAIT DURING A RECENT HISTORY LECTURE. SYLVIA WRIGHT DOES SOME TOP SLEUTHING TO REVEAL HER ANCESTRY.

Last week, I attended a History Society talk about Lonesome Lodge.

The man who was giving the talk mentioned a lady, Mary Elizabeth Freshfield who married three times. first to a Gurney Barclay, who died two

vears later, then she remarried to a Col. Delancev Barclay, who also died, then she remarried a third time to a Rev. Henry Augustus Steuart, who was the Rector of Ewhurst.

Col. Delancey Barclay lived at Lonesome Lodge which was a Palladian villa near Wootton (in fact, he was buried at Wootton).

He used a picture of Mary Elizabeth and I thought "I've seen that picture before!"

Knowing, from previous research, that my 3rd great grandfather was a David Barclay Chapman and that the Barclays (a Quaker family) had intermarried with the Gurneys, I was intrigued and

decided that it might be an interesting exercise to see if a) Gurney & Delancey Barclay were related and b) how I fitted in. It was really difficult!

I couldn't find Mary Elizabeth, Gurney Barclay or Delancey Barclay in either

> geni.com or thepeerage com.

I knew that they existed, so they must be somewhere!

I asked Janet Balchin if she knew anything and she sent me a lot of useful information about Mary Elizabeth and her three husbands.

Then I got another breakthrough, I stumbled across a website called wyndhammarsh.co.uk

From these two sources and my own research, I established that we are all descended from David Barclay of Urie, Kincardineshire, 1610-1686 and his wife, Katherine Gordon of Gordonstoun, 1621-1663. →





→ They had, amongst others, two sons, Robert Barclay "The Apologist', 1648-1690 and John Barclay I, 1658-1731

Robert Barclay was an early Quaker, he wrote The Apologist and John Barclay I went to America (his great great grandson was Delancey Barclay, who fought at Waterloo.)

Robert's son David (of Cheapside) started Barclays Bank. He married twice, firstly to Anne Taylor, 1682-1720 and secondly to Patricia Freame,

1702-1769.


Gurney Barclay is descended from the first marriage. I am descended from the second marriage.

So, Gurney Barclay was a 2nd cousin of my 3rd great grandfather, David Barclay Chapman, 1799-1891 and was a 4th cousin of Delancev Barclay.

I've been unable to recall where and when I saw the portrait of Mary Elizabeth Freshfield, I understand it's now in America.

In 1963, there was technological breakthrough in flour production. The new process meant that bakers no longer needed to sift their flour. Spillers, one of the largest flour manufacturers in the UK, decided to

launch this
breakthrough
product under a
new brand Homepride complete with a
national
advertising
campaign. If
anyone
remembers it,
well done. I can't
find reference to
it anywhere.

However, a year later, presumably after having seen

Spillers' advertising and thought they could do better, two copywriters (Bob Geers and Bob Gross) approached the company with an idea for a new campaign.

At the heart of the idea was a little man,

dressed in black and wearing a bowler hat. This little man, who was subsequently named Fred, would be Homepride's Chief Flour Grader. For the voiceover on the TV ads, they chose the epitome of calm unflappable

> reassurance, John Le Mesurier. A few years later he was to put his effortless charm to brilliant use as Sergeant Wilson in Dad's Army.

In 1963, Bob Geers and Bob Gross approached Homepride with an idea for a new campaign. It featured a little character called Fred who would play the role of Chief Flour Grader.

And before long, some bright spark realised that Fred had real marketing potential. Why leave him on the TV screen when

he could be on the nation's dinner tables and kitchen worktops?

So, Fred began to appear as all manner of kitchen essentials. Some were made of plastic: salt and pepper pots, egg cups (Fred was given a yellow hat for these), flour sifters (of course) and herb

and spice pots (complete with a wooden rack).

Spillers then moved into ceramics. Fred became china cruet sets, including a version where the salt and pepper were contained in bags of plain and selfraising flour. He became pie funnels, money boxes and mustard pots, with a

chef's hat instead of his usual bowler

You could get a set of scales, with little brass Fred weights. There were bubble bath bottles, though what they have to do with flour is anyone's guess.

Peter Pan Playthings created a child's baking set, comprising a 14" high Fred. His head was a mixing bowl and his hat a flour sifter. There were cookie cutters hidden in his feet and he was holding a mixing spoon and a rolling pin. There were soft toys.

Over the years, Wade have created a

series of "limited edition" collectable mini Freds, each holding something different. Carrots, musical instruments, a Christmas cake, a "Little Blue Book", footballs, the list is endless, but not for me. Brand extension can only go so far. Admittedly, M&S's move from underwear to prawn sandwiches was

> initially met with a few raised eyebrows, and Virgin started as a recording label and is now offering space travel, so who am I to say brands can't spread their wings?

Anyway, back to Fred. As you'll see from the

pictures, I've got quite a few Freds - and as they sit on shelves in my home office, they've been a very welcome distraction on Zoom calls over the last couple of years. Nearly 50 years after Fred was born, he's still the face of Homepride and that's the sign of successful branding.
