

If you wear an NHS hearing aid(s) and have problems using it or keeping it working I may be able to help you. I have had training from two Royal Surrey Hospital audiologists to learn how to clean and maintain hearing aids. I have a supply of batteries and can also clean or replace the tubes. I wear hearing aids myself so can offer some simple advice for getting used to them and wearing them regularly.

This service is provided by Guildford Diocese to relieve pressure on the clinic at the hospital and to save you a journey to the Royal Surrey. My clinic will be open on the first Wednesday of each month at The Glebe Community Centre from 11.00am – 12 noon, or I can call on you at home. You can contact me on 276655.

ST PETER AND ST PAUL'S CHURCH



At our recent Annual Church meeting I found myself reflecting on what has become, almost without noticing, a positive and healthy time for our church.

The Rector's report at the Annual meeting reflects on the activity and life of the church. It is a legal requirement for us to do this as part of our annual report as a charity, and so must be an honest appraisal. As I spoke I gradually realised I was telling a truly positive story in what was my eleventh annual report.

For me the church is about sharing the good news that God cares for his world and has made that clear in the person of Jesus Christ. We show and celebrate God's love in our worship and community life, and by serving, caring for and praying for our neighbours.

For our size I can't think of any church that I know that has a more varied pattern of worship. We have Book of Common Prayer services with beautiful, poetic language; Common Worship Communion services with organ and choir which are opportunities for anyone to take part in reading, welcoming, serving or interceding – or any of the background tasks that go into a service of worship.

We also run 'Treasure Seekers' offering fun and learning for our children, and our 20/20 puppet service and 9.15 breakfast service both cater for younger families.

We have a 'Morning Prayer' service, and are re-introducing All Age worship – on the 5th Sunday of the month – which will feature contributions from the flourishing Junior choir and new Youth Group. We have started a homegroup in the Wilson Room (all welcome), and the Women's Fellowship is a blessing to many.

None of this breadth would be possible without the support of our ministry team of Tim and John, and until this year Tricia. Of course

we miss Tricia – who has returned to Cranleigh, but we still benefit from Roy's support of Sonny's café; and the Toddler group that Tricia set up with Pam Childs has gone from strength to strength.

One area of our church life that I was keen to highlight is Ewhurst Church of England Infant School. It is a blessing to our village, bringing life and vitality right into the heart of Ewhurst. As a church we appoint much of the Governing body, and have a responsibility towards and a special relationship with those children and staff. The school also is the source of youngsters for our annual Holiday Club which we hold in their hall. This year will be an undersea adventure and we will resist the temptation to flood the place.

An enormous amount of energy, imagination and hard work goes into getting our finances to balance, along with a lot of generous and sacrificial giving by our church members and friends. It is pleasing to see recent years of deficit turned into a small surplus due to good housekeeping and good fundraising. Each year we begin with a huge hole in our finances – and then our excellent fundraising team finds imaginative ways to raise that missing money; we are grateful for a generous donation received last year that has provided a steady income to help make the difference between deficit and surplus.

With our friends at Ewhurst Baptist church we shared three services over Easter, including Easter Sunday at Sunrise on Pitch Hill. During the summer we will join together for a barbecue and worship on the Recreation Ground. The two churches run the Glebe drop-in on Wednesday mornings which is a visible sign of Christians working together.

Our churchyard is receiving many positive comments – especially since Geoff Harry has added his considerable energy. Geoff has also given his time and talent in the office and along with PCC Secretary Joanna Cadman keeps on top of the church admin.

There are many aspects of church life I have not covered but I hope this gives a glimpse into the life of a small but healthy village church! You would be most welcome to join us at one of our many worship services.

COMMEMORATIONS – AND DECISIONS

This year seems to be one of both commemorations and decisions. As far as commemorations are concerned, the years ending '15' seem to have particular significance to this nation of ours. It will not have escaped your notice that the first version of one of the most significant constitutional and legal documents in our history was signed 800 years ago not many miles from where we live. The Magna Carta not only defined the relationship between the monarch, barons and church, it also established the first vestiges of freedom under the law. Those freedoms were later much extended – originally they only applied to men of a certain social status – but it was a significant departure from the absolute rule of the monarch. Three clauses of that document are still part of our law today. It was the beginning of not only our British constitution and legal system but also that of many countries throughout the world. Who then would have thought that agreements made between the King, the barons and the church would still be relevant 800 years later?

The Battle of Agincourt in 1415 and the Battle of Waterloo in 1815 both played a significant part in the history of this country and of Europe and, although not a year ending in '15', the effects of the Second World War which ended 70 years ago led to the formation of modern Europe and the world we know today. This year, we also remember the centenaries of the Gallipoli landings, the first meeting of the Women's Institute (at that village in Anglesey with the long name, if you don't already know), the sinking of RMS Lusitania and the requirement to have a photograph in your passport.

Decisions made by national leaders 800, 600 and 200 years ago led to the events which we now commemorate. Those in the 15th and 19th centuries led to actual conflict whilst the Magna Carta avoided civil war – at least at the time. Decisions and actions by national and political leaders at those times had a lasting effect for many years and centuries afterwards. This year, it has been our turn to make important – and sometimes difficult – decisions.

By the time you read this, we will have made those important decisions – at both national and local elections. Whether the choices we made will have the same long-lasting effect as some decisions made in previous centuries is something we will never know. That will be up to our

descendants to judge. But one thing is for sure. The results of past elections have shaped the country in which we live. The government elected after the last world war created the NHS and in the 1970s, we voted to join what was then called the EEC. These are but two of the events which have a profound effect on our lives today.

The decisions and choices we make this year will affect our lives over the years to come. We have been bombarded with promises from all shades of the political spectrum. But what of those promises from the politicians who wish to serve us? How many will be kept? Time will tell. Some 2000 years ago, we were made promises by someone else who came to serve us - Jesus. His promises to us are still being kept. Will we be able to say the same of our newly elected representatives whether at national or local level? I certainly hope so. But there is one thing of which we can be sure – that the promises made to us by Jesus when he laid down His life for us all those years ago are still being kept. All we have to do is accept what He has to offer and follow His teachings. I trust and pray that those who are elected to represent us also accept and follow His teaching as they form and implement their policies. If they do, then we will have made the right choices.

Why the Parish Church has a Gift Day

You will have received a leaflet about the Parish Church Gift Day in this magazine. The £56,000 required this year to maintain a church ministry in Ewhurst is donated by just 140 people.

However, after that is paid, the church **still** has to find the money to pay for all the running costs such as utility bills, church and churchyard maintenance, stationery, music and office expenses. This makes the total cost to run the church just over £95,000 a year. These other expenses are the costs we are **unable** to fully cover and why we ask the village for help. Last year, we started with a deficit of just over £20,000. This is similar to the previous year but then, with your generosity on the Gift Day, our Fund Raising events which you supported and careful management, we actually managed a profit of £300 in the last financial year, the first time in over 6 years. We hope that you will be as generous and supportive again this year.

Your generosity meant that, for once, we have not had to use our capital investments, which were down to just a couple of thousand pounds. We were given a generous capital donation last year and careful investment gave us £10,000 to help cover our deficit. However, we still need the income from your Gifts and support of Fund Raising Events, to prevent us having to take from our still small reserves this year.

We again have a predicted deficit of about £20,000 this year. Hopefully our investments will help this but there will still be a deficit to meet. Taking from our reserves is not good and we cannot continue to do this. Eventually, we could lose our own Rector and **not** get anyone in his place. The people in the Church feel very strongly that they do not want this to happen, but without enough money coming in, it could. Losing our own Rector could also impact on this community as the church becomes less able to deliver what Ewhurst expects of it and what we want to give.

Please be aware of this when it comes to our Gift Day and also, perhaps, consider making a regular monthly donation towards the running of our lovely church.

The Sabbath, traditionally a day of rest from work, exists in one form or another in most world faiths. For the Jew the Sabbath is from sunset on Friday until the same time on Saturday. The Buddhist celebrates *Uposatha* every seven or eight days, depending on the lunar cycle, as a time that Gautama Buddha taught was for "the cleansing of the defiled mind" resulting in inner calm and joy. For the Moslem *jumu'ah*, a time of congregational prayer is held just after midday on Friday and for the Christian, Sunday, the day that commemorates the rising of Jesus from death marks the <u>beginning</u> (not the end) of the new week. These are just some examples from major world faiths but the principle of a Sabbath time can be found in many others.

The importance of the Sabbath is not a late addition but its origin, for the Jew and the Christian, can be traced back to the very beginning of their scriptures – namely the *Book of Beginnings* - Genesis.

The Sabbath, in whatever form it takes, is not an absence of activity but a time to refocus on the *why* rather than the *what* of life. A day where instead of just being active in the world we take time to reflect upon our place within it. Whereas science dissects life in order to understand the components and their function, faith seeks to provide meaning and purpose in living – we do actually need both.

Despite this witness of ancient wisdom from our forebears we do seem to be living in a society where we put aside less and less time for genuine rest. As a Christian minister I believe the Sabbath is God given for a purpose; for our well-being as a time to move from always *doing* to a time of reflection on *being*.

Alongside the lack of Sabbath time, silence is not something we seem to get much of in our modern world either. In fact we are often such strangers to silence these days that when it does come along we shy away and quickly try to fill the perceived gap with something else. Most of us have an endless arsenal of gap fillers from social activities, clubs and activities to television, internet and computer games.

In contrast the Bible tells us that it often through the quiet and still moments in our lives that we can become aware of a deeper meaning and purpose — of the

numinous and the divine. The counsel of Scripture is that regardless how busy our lives are, we should consciously take time out to reflect on who we fully are before our creator God. Too much busyness may keep silence at bay but it also is a pretty effective may of avoiding ourselves and God, at least for a while. It is the counsel of God to say "Be still, and know that I am God". Psalms 46:10

Many of us hide in noise and busyness and then ironically it is only when inactivity is thrust upon us either through illness or accident that we start to take stock and deal with some of the bigger questions of life. It seems strange and sad to me that some leave it that late and miss out on so much blessing within all the years of life.

God who desires to bless all of humanity, knows that to receive that blessing we need a willingness to step aside, to listen and put our lives into a bigger perspective – God's view, not our view. We listen to our doctors about matters pertaining to our physical well-being yet we are often so much slower to listen to our creator about matters of our whole being, all we are; body, mind and spirit.

We can look for meaning in life in many things that centre on ourselves, yet I have found that meaning in life can only be found in communion with others, including the creator and sustainer of all life. Meaning will never be found in things: however attractive their appeal is fleeting.

So to close I pray this Summer we may all find some *Sabbath* time for our souls as we live amongst one another in this community of Ewhurst.

Knowing that prayer changes things, we meet on the fourth Thursday evening of every month in order to pray for the village of Ewhurst.


We start at 8.00pm but tend to gather about 7.45pm for tea and coffee.

News from Ewhurst Parish Council



The first meeting of the new Parish Council took place on 18th May, a meeting dictated by the Parish Council's Standing Orders which sets out the procedure for the first meeting of the Council after an election. The procedure involves reviewing all of the policy documents that the Parish Council adhere to. Fortunately most of these were up to date and the policies set out were still current. The newly elected Council was required in the first instance to elect a Chairman. Richard Cleaves was elected for the forthcoming year with Vice Chairman Mike Turner. Chairman of Planning will remain Val Henry with new Vice Chairman of Planning Ian Davis. Tom Fawcett and Elaine Benson were elected but, sadly, Ruth Reed was not and the Chairman thanked Ruth for all her hard work in relation to her responsibility for the allotments and burial ground over the last four years. The minutes of this meeting set out what was agreed for the portfolios and responsibility areas for all Councillors and details of this will also be put up on the website and notice board. It is a good thing for the Parish to have had a Parish Councillor election, something that has not happened for guite some time. It is reassuring that the Parish contains so many community minded people to put themselves forward for a task which is by no means easy and which can be very time consuming.

The Parish Council held its Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 22nd April and there were a variety of speakers who spoke eloquently on subjects from Right of Ways (Chris Lyth) to The Village Carnival (Catherine Van't Reit). Bob Arnold talked us through the Neighbourhood Plan and George Yates spoke about being a Parish Councillor with reference to Victoria Helstrip who retired this month after 22 years. Victoria was presented with a book with quotes from Parishioners, articles, memorabilia and photographs covering her Parish Councillor years, contributed from across the community. Of course her most outstanding achievement being awarded the British Empire Medal in 2014, but other more general achievements for the community, too many to mention here, fill the book. Alyson Persson previously O'Connor, a previous clerk, returned for the occasion and the audience was filled with many of Victoria's friends. We are reliably informed that she will be pursuing her funding raising for the community under a different guise.

At the Annual Parish Meeting the new kitchen and bar area at the Village Hall were opened fittingly by Victoria who played a great part in fundraising and project managing the refitted kitchen.

The PC is well aware of the problems concerning the new bus stop and has taken the first steps in resolving them. The plan is to widen the inside road of Bulls Head Green on the village side, enough for the bus to get round without having to back into its bus stop from the roundabout. Any material removed will be replaced on the Shere Road side of the Green. Passengers will then be able to remain on the bus until it moves off to the Glebe rather than having to disembark and get on again. We are also looking at enlarging the bus stop at the Glebe entrance with a view to the fare stage being

moved to this point – however, Aviva are not keen on this idea at present. We need to obtain permission from the Secretary of State to change the Bulls Head Green which will take time; until then some chevrons will be placed on the current pinch point in the hope that vehicles will not park there, thus allowing the bus to get round more easily. Residents should not be affected.

Councillor Tim Bloomfield has put together a proposal for a different system for charging for use of the Ewhurst Tennis Courts. Currently relying on an honesty box, it is perceived that not all who should do actually pay for the use. The tennis court surface will need re doing in the not too distant future and whilst the Parish Council do save annually for this expense it is only fitting that those who use the courts should also contribute. The charge for the courts will not increase but it will be necessary to collect a key from the Village Shop and to pay for the court together with a deposit received back on return of the key. We will see how the new system works which is due to start from 1st June.

The path down to the Village Green from the last driveway after Larkfield is to be relaid this summer and there will be a period, probably not longer than a day, when work will be being carried out on the path which may make it difficult to pass. I am sure everyone who uses the path will be prepared to put up with this for a mud-free path to be available thereafter.

New laws relating to dog behaviour and control now apply:

Dangerous Dog Act 1991(amended)

- The act now covers incidents on private property in addition to PUBLIC spaces.
- Police or an appointed authority now have the power to seize a dog dangerously out of control in a PRIVATE place.
- It will be an offence for a dog to attack an assistance dog.
- There are also rules regarding the fencing of property where a dog is kept and conduct of your dog towards visitors.
- Microchips will be compulsory for all dogs over 8 weeks in England from 6 April 2016.

All dogs are required to wear a collar and identity tag when in a public place. For more information please look at the police website www.surreypolice.uk.

News from Ewhurst CE Infant School

Election fever took over Ewhurst CE Infant School at the beginning of May. Six members of the governing body stood for School Prime Minister, with Paula Elms of The Sunshine Party being the eventual winner. The candidates canvassed for votes during school assembly, with such policies as Forest School Fridays (the whole school day being given over to outdoor Forest School activities) and bouncy castles in the playground being particular favourites, although the children were aware that it was all pretend! The children then voted for their chosen candidate on the ballot papers, posted their paper in the ballot box, and the result was tallied on the interactive whiteboard in the hall. It was lovely to see how excited and engaged the children were in the process, even at such a young age. Please do take a look at the school website where there are plenty of photos of the event.

After many years of applications from the governing body, the Diocese has awarded the school a grant of approximately £100,000 to contribute towards replacing the 'Miller Hut'. Many of you who attended Ewhurst School may remember this building as a classroom which was opened by Sir Eric Miller in 1952. The project will cost over £200,000, so the governing body have the huge task of raising more than £100,000 in the next two years. Please look out for opportunities to be involved in supporting this project, or contact the school directly.

The summer term is now well underway, and the children are getting excited about starting to use the swimming pool after half term. We are as usual extremely grateful to the parish council for their generous donation towards keeping our swimming pool in use.

The Jubilee Garden continues to be a wonderful learning environment for the children, and we are very excited that this year it is to be included in the Ewhurst Secret Gardens weekend on May 30th and 31st. The Garden is used by our Reception children for their Forest Schools activities (Years 1 and 2 visit Sayers Croft on a regular basis for their Forest Schools sessions), and the small woodland is used to make dens, set trails, and create woodland art. The vegetable garden is tended by children from our after-school club, Explorers, and


the pond is home to a range of wildlife, and is always the final home to the many froglets who have been observed growing from tadpoles in the classrooms.

In Our Midst ~ John Worsey Man of the Village - and Beyond



John came to Ewhurst from Pirbright when he was five years old and apart from his time in the Navy, he has never lived anywhere else. His parents worked for the Bennett family at Folly Hill, his father as groom and his mother as a cook. The oldest of five boys, he lived with his family at the North Lodge of Ewhurst Place, now called Robin's Wood. Every day, they walked from there to Ewhurst School which was a happy school he says, with a much simpler way of life - no mobile phones or computers, just marbles and milktops

for spinning and the occasional fight in the playground! The teachers were Miss Brockett and Miss English and the Headmistress was Miss Runicus.

John's father died when he was nine and because his mother was left with five boys to look after, he was sent with his brothers to board at King Edward's School in Hambledon as the main school building at Witley was occupied by the Admiralty during the war. Coming home for the holidays, John remembers standing on Pitch Hill, where there were no trees then, and watching the Mitchell bombers taking off from Dunsfold aerodrome and the fighter planes flying over the South Downs.

When he left school he worked at the Hildon Laboratories in Cranleigh making spectacles by hand but after a short time he was keen for a change so in 1948, he joined the Royal Navy. Much of his time was spent on fishery protection in the disputed Icelandic waters. It was frustrating work as they were not allowed to use their guns and the Algerine minesweepers were no size match for the 3,000 ton Icelandic tugs. Transfer of personnel and supplies from ship to trawler was done by rowing open whaler boats. Difficult and dangerous work, especially in heavy weather, but it did give John an interest and skill in rowing. Flotilla competitions were held in Mediterranean ports during the Summer months when the fleet came together and he rowed stroke in the Racing Whalers. He particularly remembers taking part in the "Hamilton Cup" racing out to sea from Grand Harbour in Valetta, Malta. It was good fun except that in training, their rum ration was suspended!

Qualified in anti-submarine ASDIC technology, in 1951 John took part in the search for the submarine, HMS Affray which had disappeared with all hands in the English Channel. In 1954 he was involved in looking for the remains of the Comet airliner which blew up over Elba. All the parts were located and recovered from the sea bed and some can still be seen in the Science

Museum today.

While on leave he had met Pat and they married in 1955. She moved from Cranleigh to live in the naval married quarters in Gosport where their first son was born. It had a wonderful view she says, and from there you could watch the Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth liners steaming down the Solent. John left the Navy in 1961 having served 12½ years. He would have stayed in longer but promotion was slow and although well-qualified in minesweeping and torpedo warfare, it would have taken another ten years to progress to a higher rank.

Back in Ewhurst, they lived first in Downhurst Road where their second son was born, then in 1963, they moved to Mapledrakes where they have been ever since. At that time Mapledrakes Road was simply an unmade cart track where a car could easily get stuck in wet weather. There were no houses in the middle section and they had a clear view to the church. Leaving the Navy on the Friday, John says he joined his brother Peter at the electricians, Brady & Renauld, on the Monday and worked there for thirty five years. The electrical installation work meant visiting properties anywhere in the area and the time he was seconded to Etherington's of Godalming to refurbish one of the hangars at Dunsfold aerodrome was particularly interesting.

John has played a major part in the community of Ewhurst. He was a member of the Parish Council for 15 years from 1973, five of which he served as vice-chairman. Care of footpaths and managing the allotments were his particular concern and much free time was spent caring for these. His meetings were always popular as his naval training meant he insisted people kept to the agenda and they always finished with enough time for a pint at the Crown. He helped to build the original EYSC building and years of fund raising resulted in the building of the school swimming pool. As an early member and helper at the Village Club, he now has life membership. He was also an active member of the Horticultural Society and helped at the very successful Boys Club which ran in the old Scout hut. Their minibus could take them to sailing weekends in Portsmouth Harbour and camping with the Army Training Cadets near East Grinstead.

After a fall down the stairs a couple of years ago, he now takes it more carefully and his gardening activities have had to stop although his heart condition has been helped by a fitted pace-maker. Anyone taking over my garden will benefit from the years of hard work and loads of manure put there he says. From what I saw it all still looks pretty ship-shape to me.

- The cost of this has been met by a grant from the Personal Spending Allowance for Local Initiatives of our ever supportive County Councillor Alan Young.

Sites for new housing

You, the residents, will be fundamental in deciding where new housing will be situated by completing the Village Questionnaire.

In preparation of this, the Housing Group are working with Waverley to:

- Identify possible sites.
- Conduct a preliminary screening process to eliminate those that are not deliverable and/or do not meet the necessary criteria to comply with the Local Plans Policies and National Planning Policies Framework.
- Draw up a shortlist which will be presented in the Village Questionnaire.

To complete our first step of identifying possible sites we have decided upon a 3-pronged process:

- Visiting different areas of the Parish to identify potential sites
- Reviewing information held by Waverley of all sites that have been offered for housing or seem likely to come forward.
- We also wish to hear from landowners who believe they may have a site suitable for a minimum of 5 houses – if you do please contact me, Tim Bloomfield, and we will include your site in our preliminary screening process.

LOCAL HISTORY CORNER, by Janet Balchin

New Discoveries in Ewhurst Churchyard

During the winter months Geoff Harry has been doing a splendid job of clearing the churchyard and it is wonderful to now be able to see the graves clearly.

Geoff has been working mostly on the north side of the church yard, which had become particularly overgrown. This part of the churchyard was an extension to the main churchyard and burials here date from 1860. Whereas the older memorials in the churchyard are mainly plain stone headstones and some tombs, the Victorian period saw an increase in the type and style of memorials and this part of the churchyard has a wide variety of decorative headstones. Many are in the form of crosses, some with Celtic decorations. On the west side are three traditional 'bed board' grave markers. These were once common, but few survive and they are in poor condition. Also of note are some cast iron markers.

Running along the eastern boundary Geoff has uncovered the remains of an old stone path. This once gave access to the church and is marked on old Ordnance Survey maps. Some residents remember that the path was still in use in the 1950s. The hinge of the original gate is still visible in the metal fencing in the north east corner, and the path continues as the public footpath which runs across The Glebe and Downhurst Road and on to Bramblehurst Farm and beyond.

Meanwhile, in the lower churchyard, Chris Hughes has started on clearing graves there. This part of the Churchyard has burials from the 1920s and by this time fashions in memorials had changed again. Marble and granite headstones became popular and many plots are surrounded by kerbs and covered in gravel, but the narrow space between makes maintenance difficult.

Recently Chris has got a team together to lift the headstone of Sir Dugald Clerk and his wife, who died in 1932 and 1930. The grave is in the North West corner of the lower churchyard and for many years the headstone has been face down, so it was not possible to read the inscription. Now it has been re erected it is very imposing and is made of white marble with Celtic patterns and intertwined roses.

The Clerks had lived in Ewhurst from about 1905, first at Little Woolpits and then at Lukyns, which they had commissioned from the architect Sir Ernest Newton in 1911. They took an interest in the village school, donating books, sand trays and gave football and cricket equipment at various times.

Sir Dugald Clerk was an engineer and inventor of the two stroke engine, which he patented in 1881. He worked as a consulting engineer, but during the First World War worked for the Trench Warfare Committee, designing ammunition-making machinery and then in 1916 became Director of Engineering Research for the Admiralty. He was elected Fellow of the Royal Society in 1908 and in 1917 was knighted in recognition of his wartime work. In 1922 he was awarded the Royal Society's Albert Medal. This was a terrific achievement as only one medal is awarded each year; other recipients have included Michael Faraday, Louis Pasteur, Sir Tim Berners Lee and also another Ewhurst resident, Sir Henry Doulton.




