A Life in Cars

THE EDITOR MET DAVE BIGGINS AT EWHURST PLAYERS. THEY GOT CHATTING AND AN INCREDIBLE LIFE STORY UNFOLDED

N&V: Is that a Northern accent I detect? **DB:** I grew up in Norton on the edge of Sheffield. We had no money but my parents were enlightened enough to allow me and my brother to go to grammar school - High Storrs - and stay on to get our A -levels. The school had a fabulous metalworking shop. I learned how to use a lathe, forge, braze: normal skills for Sheffield folk.

I followed in my brother's footsteps, going to London University. I hadn't a clue what subject to take. My brother said: 'Geologists! They're always on field trips". I was a rock climber, mountaineer and loved my cycling, so I thought: where do I sign up! I finished my degree in 1962 and did a PhD in

Geology, conducting a paleoecological study of the Derbyshire dome.

I was then lucky enough to get a job with an embryonic oil company. I finished up as managing director. We sold the business in 1992 for £92 million. I was 52.

N&V: When did a passion for cars start?

DB: By the time I was nineteen, I was driving Austin 7s. I found I had this ability to make them go. At uni I used to buy one for a fiver, restore and sell it for twenty five quid. I probably traded over twenty Austin 7s. I even had a weekend job at an Austin restorer. I got so good, I remember replacing a whole engine overnight under a streetlight.

come on the scene? **DB:** At university around 1959. We used to run these fabulous jazz hops at Chelsea College on the Kings Road. We got all the best bands: Ken Collier, Chris Barber and The Temperance Seven. One night I saw Jane arrive and thought wow. I did something you don't do at

a jazz dance. I did an "excuse me" and cut in. She agreed. It was the start of a lifelong love affair. She changed my life in so many ways. We complimented each other. She was very artistic. It was Jane who got me into the Ewhurst Players. And she loved children. She had this dream of lots of kids - even wanted an orphanage. We didn't do



that, but she ran playgroups in Forest Green and Holmbury. The latter till just before she died. She was 76, still teaching and caring for children.

N&V: When did the more elaborate cars appear?

DB: Around 1962 when I got a bit more money. The job I had while doing my PhD wasn't lucrative. I remember the employment letter: "Nine till five, £12 a week and we don't work Saturdays". But it meant I could move beyond Austin 7s - for example, an original Beetle, a Porsche 356A, a Steyr-Daimler-Puch. I still had some doer-uppers on the side: a Flatnose Morris Oxford and Austin 7 Chummy.

But when gas was discovered in the North Sea and the industry really got going, I got headhunted and tripled my salary overnight. I could afford to live. We had three kids by then. And of

course, it meant I could afford a better class of car. So then came along the 1965 Alfa Romeo Giulia Sprint GT, the Ferrari 250 I bought for £1300 (cheap because of the petrol crisis), a Lotus 7,

Lotus Elan, Porsche 924, Porsche 928 and others.

My restoring went up a level too. A few come to mind. There's the 1924
Bullnose Morris Oxford I found in a terrible state; a 1934 Lagonda Tourer (I picked up my OBE for supporting British business from the palace in that); a Rolls Royce 20 (never again!); a rebuild of a Vauxhall 30/98 (done over 100k+ miles in that); a 1914 Saxon Roadster (the suffragette's choice); the 1913 grand-prix-winning Mercedes (over 100mph with ease); a 1913
Nazzaro Tipo 3, a sister car to the one that won the famous Targa Floria 606-mile perimeter race of Sicily. They're

the cars that stand out for me.

N&V: What are the stand-out memories? **DB:** My most impressive drive was the Prescott Hill Climb in the Vauxhall Rowley Special. I did it in 49.5 seconds which for a 1927 Vauxhall is stupendous. The next fastest was 51 seconds.

Touring-wise my first trip from London to Cape Town in 1998 was the most challenging. I did that in the Vauxhall 30/98. We were often doing 500 miles a day. I broke down in Turkey with a clogged radiator. Didn't stop me though. I bought a Ford Explorer and carried on. I caught up within 2 days! After 12,000 miles in 6 weeks I made it to Cape Town.

Besides competitive touring I do cherish the fantastic holiday we had with Jane and the kids in 1976. We spent several weeks in the Bavarian Alps driving the Bullnose Oxford - a truly wonderful time with the family.


N&V: Beyond the cars, you've made a film as well?

DB: Well that started with me discovering that Felice Nazarro had won the Targa Florio (the 606-mile race around Sicily). My friend was teaching English in Turin and one of her pupils was selling cars. She gave me the list and I saw the name "Nazarro". I only knew of the racing driver, an Italian Stirling Moss of his day. But Nazzaro made about 23 cars before WW1, only

most were sacrificed to make arms for the war. The owner tried to sell it as the actual winning car of the 1913 Targa Florio but I showed them some pictures that proved it was the sister car. So I got it for half the price. It's been fantastic. Hardly had to repair it. Anyway, I thought: I've got this historic and original car. So in 2006 I took it to the centenary of the Targa Florio.

That trip gave me the nub of the film


idea. The car was going to be 100 years old in 2013. It was also the year that Nazarro won the Targa Florio race, so I felt I had to celebrate those two events. Initially it was going to be just a camcorder affair with a few friends. But it finished

up being a full-blown documentary called "The Sicilian Dream" about the history of the race from 1906 to 1977. It was presented by BBC documentary-maker Francesco da Mosto (BBC 2 series Francesco's Venice and Francesco's Italy) and had a Leicester Square premiere with Nick Mason. We never got it onto the telly but today we're selling DVDs and it's doing very well on a US streaming service.

Malthus and more

BARRY THOMSON CONCLUDES THE HISTORY OF OKEWOOD CHURCH

Okewood church has international significance due to its world famous Curate in the 18th century.

Those of you with a background in economics or history will be aware of the significance of Thomas Robert Malthus who was a Curate at Okewood Church in the 1790's.

The importance of Malthus was brought home to us in 1985 when we were contacted by the BBC who were doing a programme on the Domesday Book asking for permission to film in the church and churchyard as part of their programme.

Malthus, who was born in Dorking, noticed during his curacy at Okewood that he was baptising far more people than he was burying, and in 1798 he wrote his world famous work *Essay On The Principle Of Population*, predicting a failure to provide sufficient food for an ever expanding population leading to chaos and famine.

His essay was a counterblast against the enlightenment theories expounded by William Godwin and Jean-Jacques Rousseau whose notions centred on the innate goodness of man. Malthus became hugely influential in economic, political, social and scientific thought

and his work had a significant impact upon the scientists who became known as Evolutionary Biologists such as Charles Darwin.

Just think, Thomas Malthus preached from the pulpit of St John the Baptist, and baptised in the font here!

A final story from Okewood church is provided by our archivist Dr Briony Thomas. The world famous baptist Preacher Charles Spurgeon whose tireless travels all over the country included him preaching a sermon on Ockley Green just a couple of miles away. Apparently in his sermon here he used the analogy between the many

footpaths which approach Okewood Chapel with the statement that "there are many ways of coming to Christ".

Okewood Church is indeed a very special and important place. Although being first and foremost a house of God it is an ancient building of real significance a highly valued part of our heritage.



JOHN WHITE DISCOVERS NEW SHOOTS ON DORMANT BRANCHES

▼ admit it, I am not fond of gardening. ▲ Instead I like to carry out research into my own family; it is a project I started nearly 30 years ago after I was made redundant. When I returned to employment, it was put on the back-

burner until retirement but even then other things kept getting in the way. Over the last few years I have managed to visit several history centres to trace my roots and to carry out research on documents that are not available through websites. A change of direction was necessitated

by lock-down and it gave me the opportunity to use the internet to trace little-known living relatives. It turns out I was not the only family history buff to adopt this tactic. I knew that I had a cousin called Cheryl Ann living in California. We share great grandparents (which makes her my 2nd cousin) and the only information I had comes from a name on the back of a photo taken in the mid 1950s of a little girl standing outside a house in Los Angeles. I always

wished I had asked questions of my parents whilst they were still around. I did know however that her grandparents had emigrated to Canada from the UK in the 1920s and then moved to California in the 1930s. Not

much to go on, but it is surprising what is available online: their immigration papers into the US and later their naturalization papers in which they had to declare, amongst other things, that they were neither anarchists nor polygamists.

Adventure on our doorstep

MANAGER ROB SQUIRRELL GIVES US THE LOWDOWN ON SAYERS CROFT

N&V: What is Sayers Croft?

RS: We're an outdoor activity centre in Ewhurst with 60 acres of woodland and meadows with ponds and rivers. There's space for 200 kids to come residentially. We draw mainly from primary schools to do activities up to five days. Then we have the Sayers Croft Trust which is the charity focused on engaging the local community, especially young people, in the enjoyment and care of the environment.

N&V: There's a bit of confusion about who can come here. Why is that? **RS:** I think that's from its history.

Originally Sayers Croft was built as a WW2 evacuee site. With those links, it became a residential centre for children from Westminster. We still have a lot of groups from there. But we're available to any school or youth group.

The trust set up in 1996 is focused on engaging the local community. We run a free monthly club for 0-5 year olds, an afternoon Really Wild Club (subsidised at £4 per child) for 7-12 year olds, and we do Action Stations days for children with additional needs - for example

autism or wheelchair users - which are just £8 a day.

N&V: What do the kids love most about coming here?

RS: Well first of all the choice. We have around 60-70 activities to choose from. There's adventure that features high ropes, rock climbing, bouldering, caving, raft-building and archery. Then there's exploration that includes orienteering, nature trails, pond-dipping, river studies. There's History too. We've got a replica Iron Age roundhouse where we learn about the Romans and Celts. Not forgetting the WW2 link, so the site itself becomes a history lesson.

N&V: Can customers tailor a day out? **RS:** Yes, we can create packages to suit you. For example we developed a Dads & Daughters camping weekend for a local school. We do a lot of birthday parties, usually for children, but recently for an 80-year old lady. It's all possible.

N&V: What are the costs like? **RS:** A birthday party of up to 16 would be £125 for an hour and a half, which includes activities and the use of the

dining hall. Day visits for exploration activities would be £200 a day for a class of 30. Adventure activities are £385 a day. Local schools can enjoy small subsidies. Get in touch to find out.

N&V: Has Covid affected you? **RS:** Very tough at the start but as of July 20 we're open and have run holiday clubs for 1 to 14 children in their bubbles. We'll be open for school day visits from September and hopefully residentials from January 2021. For now, we keep it all outdoors, applying 1m+ social distancing and operating hand washing across the site. All kit gets sanitised after use. Again, if you're a teacher or youth leader, get in touch and see how we can offer you a fantastic day or afternoon this Autumn term.



The intriguing tale of the Ewhurst quail

ROBIN STRIDE REVEALS A PIONEERING BIRD FROM OUR PARISH

I've a passion for birds, as anyone who reads my monthly 'Crane Spotter' column in Cranleigh Magazine might have guessed.

Bella Matthews' article 'Having a quail of a time' in the News&Views' last issue reminded me of a unique and exciting find I had near Ewhurst some years ago. The 'quip-quip' call coming from a field of flax was a wild quail, a rare summer migrant to Surrey.

I had first heard of this tiny gamebird in Sunday school when we learnt about the Israelites complaining to Moses about the lack of food on their desert journey.

Numbers 11 records how a wind 'went out from the Lord' and drove migrating quail in from the sea. Huge numbers dropped on top of one another all around the camp 'as far as a day's walk in any direction'. The people ate well!

Quail numbers are not what they were but many thousands on migration have in more recent years been captured, ringed and released for research purposes in Sinai. Which brings me to another quail back in 1965 which was trapped and ringed by Mr Les Weller on his Ewhurst farm.

It was subsequently shot on migration four months later in September in north west Spain. This was the first foreign recovery of a British-ringed quail. Not a lot of people know that....

Simply Astronomical

BOB FOLEY ENTHUSES ABOUT THE STRASBOURG CATHEDRAL CLOCK

In 1955 I was given my late grandfather's fob watch for my twelfth birthday. I loved that watch. Sadly, I no longer have it but ever since I have had an interest in mechanical timepieces and, in particular, clocks. In my teens I read a fascinating story about the great

astronomical clock in Strasbourg Cathedral which, as a boy, captured my imagination. I decided that one day I would, somehow, get to see it for myself. In the austere, post-war years of my youth this was not possible at the time, and the idea was put "on hold".

So, sixty years later my wife and I stood. excitedly, outside the impressive façade

There have been three astronomical clocks in the cathedral. The first, known as the Three Kings Clock, was completed in 1354 by an unknown clockmaker. It was deemed to be one of the seven wonders of Germany and featured several automata, one being a

of Notre Dame Cathedral in Strasbourg.

fully jointed crowing cockerel. Apparently, the ingenious clock maker did such a wonderful job that the town Magistrate ordered his eyes be put out sot he could never build another magnificent clock elsewhere.

The first clock stopped working and a new one was started in the 16th century and completed in 1574 by Conrad Dasypodius and Isaac Harbrecht, This clock was remarkable for its complexity as an astronomical device. incorporating many dials and indicators - the calendar dial, the astrolabe and the indicators for planets, and eclipses. A popular feature of the new

clock was the original crowing cockerel, a relic of the first clock, which perched on the top of the cupola and entertained the onlookers at noon every day until 1640, when it was struck by lightning. Sadly, due to rust and dirt, the clock stopped and it is now preserved in the Museum of Decorative Art.

The second clock stopped working \rightarrow



around 1788 and stood still until 1838, when Jean-Baptiste Schwilgué started to build the current clock. He designed new mechanisms to replace the old ones which had been considered state of the art. Schwilgué had wanted to work on the clock since his boyhood, but he only got the contract fifty years later. In the meantime, he had become acquainted with clockmaking, mathematics, mechanics and cosmography. It had taken him more than thirty years to design a suitable mechanism for the clock which stands about sixty feet tall. It is the work of a genius and is one of the most complex timepieces ever built. As well as the animated figures of the Apostles parading past Christ and being

blessed every hour, it shows official time, weekdays and date on a huge calendar dial, including leap years! Also shown are the positions of the planets, sun and moon including dates and times of eclipses. The most ingenious section of the clock, however, is an ecclesiastical computus which automatically activates at midnight every 31st December. It then calculates, with great accuracy, the date of Easter, and many other holy days which are then displayed on the calendar dial.

There are far too many facets of this incredible mechanism to describe here and I thoroughly recommend a visit to see the real thing if you possibly can. You will not be disappointed.



The challenge of fell-walking in The Lakes was irresistible when I was younger. Following a meandering river, a sun-dappled forest path or meadow now calls me more. Walking and talking with friends also bring great benefits.

My latest walk was a bit different - Pitch Hill at night with my eldest grandson, watching the stars coming out under a moonlit sky and the comings and goings at Gatwick Airport. It was so atmospheric and peaceful under the cover of darkness.

I am so thankful that I am still able to enjoy walking, to be free to explore our amazing county and beyond, with all its wonders.



The Political Jesus

DOCTOR OF THEOLOGY, STEPHEN BACKHOUSE, REVEALS A JESUS WE NEVER KNEW

W hen hearing that I am a teacher and writer who works in the field of political theology, people will often say: "But Jesus was a religious teacher who had nothing to do with politics."

This is certainly a deeply rooted, oftclaimed, and highly popular belief. It

also just happens to be entirely incorrect.

The four Gospels are not the first words anyone wrote about Jesus. Mark, Matthew, Luke and John are accounts written down and stitched together a generation or two after the events they describe. The people who knew Jesus were dying, so the people who knew the

people who knew Jesus preserved their stories. The salient point here is that the church already existed in fine fettle before it had four biographical accounts of the words and life of its founder. For the best indication of what it felt like to be around Jesus we have to turn to earlier sources. Here we find the epistles and letters that make up the bulk of the New Testament, most of which are

ascribed to the Apostle Paul. Paul's letters, it is worth reminding ourselves, were written for and about people who had living memory of Jesus. And Paul, it is also worth noting, was not always writing new material. He often quotes sayings of Jesus or teachings of the first

disciples well known to his contemporaries. And, in one notable passage in his epistle to the congregation in the Roman city of Philippi, Paul incorporates a poem into his text that he did not originally pen. This hymn, found in Philippians 2 thus has a credible claim to being one of the earliest things ever written about Jesus.



theology of nations and nationalism. He'll be teaching in our Parish imminently.

It is worth quoting in full:

4 Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. 5 Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, 6 who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, 7 but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of humankind. 8 And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the

point of death, even death on a cross. 9 Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, 10 so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, 11 and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

(Philippians 2:4-11, ESV)

This earliest hymn has a socio-political aspect. Two thousand years of tin ears has led us to overlook how many overtly political slogans and symbols are being used – and subverted– in this hymn. The first is the Greek phrase isa theo ("equality with God"). Isa theo is not a "religious" statement, if, by that, you think that the religious and the political can be easily delineated. In the Greco-Roman imagination, the more powerful a human was, the more of a little god they were. It is the phrase Augustus used when he threw his hat into the ring to become Caesar. It is the phrase applicable to people gunning for the top job of Emperor, King, Prime Minister or President. And it is the phrase that the earliest Christians thought was most appropriate for describing what it felt like to be around Jesus as he pronounced the coming of a new Kingdom and formed a new movement of followers around him. Significantly, in this hymn, people being equal to God is not the problem. It is how they go about achieving this power that is being subverted.

Jesus was equal to God, but he did not consider being equal to God a matter of "grasping" (or "exploiting for his own advantage"). The word in view here is another technical political term: *harpagmon*. This is the garnering of political resources and directing them towards getting what you want. If you have ever been asked to sign a petition or join a protest rally, you have been on the sharp end of *harpagmon*. When politicians gather together their "base"

or canvas support they are hoovering power in order to use it to their own advantage when the crunch time comes. This is the way politics works. You grasp at what power you can find in order to shape the world according to your vision and the vision of those who have pledged their support. *Harpagmon* is a matter of gathering, filling-up and focusing in order to dominate one's Will.

Yet Jesus, who is isa theo, does not consider is a theo a matter of harpagmon. Instead, insists the people who knew him, he "emptied himself": kenosis. And with this, we unravel most forms of politics. For to "empty oneself" is not to become a doormat or a cringing worm. It is to be like a servant rather than a dominating bully imposing his Will on the world. The prime mark of a servant is that they exist to enable other people. *Harpagmon* gathers and subsumes other wills in the service of ramming home one Will. Harpagmon suppresses dissent, conversation and divergence. Tyrants and bullies and most politicians fill the room with their ego. The kenotic person controls their self. They embody "emptiness" insofar as their egos do not flow to fill the space. Following priest and theologian Sarah Coakley, to

practice *kenosis* is to practice "gentle space-making". In the presence of *harpagmon* the world gets smaller and tamer. In the presence of *Kenosis* the world gets larger and more wild. And this, says the apostle Paul, is to be the mind we share among ourselves.

And, lest it be forgotten, using our individual and corporate power well, in service of the common good, is not a religious act. It is political. Before their movement was even called "Christian", followers of the way of Jesus cared much more about how they held themselves politically than how they imagined themselves religiously. And this was all because of their founder, the one they called a King.

My pride in my Dad

PETE BENNETT RECALLS A DEFINING DEED FROM HIS CHILDHOOD HERO

A s I get a bit older there are times when I reflect on aspects and people in my life. The Covid lockdown has given me the time to do this.

I am an only child and was by no means planned during the dark days of WW2. In

fact, my parents told me that in those difficult times having children was furthest from their thoughts. I was brought up in fairly poor circumstances. My parents' rented home was bombed and destroyed whilst my Mum was evacuated to St Albans to have me. Without doubt I was a spoilt only child, getting the best my parents could afford and there was plenty of love for

me. However, there was never a lot of money to go round.

We lived for a few years with various aunts and uncles until late 1947 when we finally moved into another rented terraced house in Walworth. Dad worked as a general foreman for a local building firm and only got one week off for holiday each year. In that week there were generally some days off to the coast in a

charabanc, if it could be afforded. However, Dad's big day out each year was his firms' beano trip to the coast. In May 1949 the day out was looming, and he somehow found the cash to buy himself a new outfit – jacket, trousers


and some sandals. A big spend for him. He was quite chuffed with his look and one weekend, before the trip, decided to walk around to Uncle Jim's, his younger brother, to show off his new purchases. It was a relatively short walk from where we lived in Walworth to Camberwell. I think it must have been a Sunday as we were not allowed to be at Uncle Jim's on a Saturday

when his racing pigeons were homing from a race.

With me on my three-wheeled bike, we (Dad & I) embarked on the walk to Uncle Jim's. This took us across Albany Road and up Wells Way and over the canal bridge. Dad was in his brand-new gear and thought he looked great. I can recall looking through the bridge railings and saying to Dad that there was a boy swimming in the canal. He looked and

realised the boy was not swimming but in some difficulty. In a flash he was gone and jumped off the bank into the canal, fully clothed, minus his precious sandals which he had kicked off. Having got the boy over his shoulder and wading back to the canalside he went to sweep some white-in-colour, underwater detritus out of his way only to realise it was another child that was fully submerged. He got both boys to the bank and gave them artificial respiration that he had learnt during his time in the Auxiliary Fire Service in the war. Both boys' lives were saved. Obviously, the Police and Ambulance service were called, and the

boys recovered in hospital.

My Dad's new clothes were ruined, much to his disgust. Later, he received the Royal Humane Society Award For Valour on vellum in honour of saving the boys' lives. The Mayor of Southwark also awarded him a life pass to the local swimming baths!

I have now the time to wonder if those two boys (Christopher Hobson and Kevin Henney who, if still alive, would be a similar age to myself) have the time to reflect that they owe their lives to Joseph Bennett.

It's certainly why I'm so proud of my Dad.
