Funding For Church Repairs

In the Churchwardens' article in March, we explained that there is a lot of weather damage to the outside of the church.

The damage to the roof is due to using a wrong mortar during the last major repairs in the 1930's. Inflexible Porchester cement was put in as mortar for the Horsham slabs which make up the roof. The slabs are very heavy and slight movements over the years have made the cement crack and crumble away, leaving gaps around the slabs which let in rain. This is how the water gained access and damaged the Chancel ceiling. It is also causing problems to the ceilings of the South Transept and the Nave. Water entering here has the added problem that it could re-activate the death watch beetle which was found in these areas of the roof in the 1980's

Damage to the stone work has resulted from a combination of the natural weathering of the soft sandstone blocks and the installation of inadequate guttering in the 1930's. The guttering is not deep or wide enough, so water splashes out and runs down the walls accelerating the weathering process. The bell tower and south facing buttresses are badly damaged and are probably also letting in water to the Nave and South Transept.

The cost of repairing the whole church will be between £500,000 and £700,000. The PCC realises that this could not be done all at once so have prioritised what is most urgent.

This will be repairing the roofs and guttering of the Chancel, South Transept and north side of the Nave. The stonework to be repaired will be the west, east and south sides of the bell tower plus the two south buttresses. Internally, the ceiling of the South Transept will be investigated, damaged plaster removed and death watch beetle treated if necessary. These works will cost between £200,000 and £300,000, even though the ceilings will not be repaired, just stabilised, as in the Chancel. An application has been submitted to the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) but even if we are successful, the church will need to raise over £50,000 for this part of the work. As part of any HLF application, we have to show that we can use this opportunity to increase the number of people visiting and appreciating our church. It has been decided that this will be approached in two ways. Firstly, we plan to develop child-friendly information about the church for children from 3years up to 11years by working with local schools and Sayers Croft. Secondly, we will liaise with Ewhurst History Society to record information about the roof and ceiling structure as it is revealed during the work, along with any other interesting finds. This information will be made available to visiting groups, both adults and children.

Even if we are awarded an HLF grant, we will need support from the whole village for the fundraising needed as well as individuals who can help with the two community projects. The Gift Day in June and the Big Day and Night Out in July will be your first chances to give us your support – we are sure it will be there - and bring your friends!

Ewhurst Bell Restoration Fund

We are pleased to announce that we have reached the target amount of £54,300 needed to replace the 2 oldest bells and refurbish the other 6 bells. The Heritage Lottery Fund has approved a grant for the project and they will fund 48% of the cost up to an amount of £26,300. With the money from other grants, sponsorship, donations and fund raising, we have now raised the full amount and can proceed with the work.We will be running a



program of education and events for the parish to explain the work being undertaken and to promote the ancient craft of bell ringing. The work will be carried out in February and March 2018.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting at the end of April was an opportunity to bring to those attending an up to date report of the discussions which are taking place on the future of ministry in this parish. What follows is an expanded version of my report to that meeting so that, hopefully, there is a clearer understanding of what is happening.

When our previous rector, David, was here we paid for 80% of his time the other 20% was paid by the diocese as he was also the Diocesan Link Officer for Nigeria. The diocesan role is not being replaced for reasons that are both practical and political. In conjunction with the bishop and archdeacon, we therefore need to consider a number of choices for the future:

- Do we appoint a part-time (80%) priest to this parish? The likelihood is that there would be few suitable candidates for a part-time post.
- Do we appoint and pay for a full-time priest? This would cost approximately an additional £9000 per annum which with our present income we cannot afford.
- Do we find an alternative role for part of a priest's time? It is this scenario we have been pursuing with the encouragement of the bishop and archdeacons.

Discussions are taking place with the churches of St John the Baptist, Okewood and Holy Trinity, Forest Green who are presently part of Ockley, Okewood and Forest Green parish whose rector has just retired. The churchwardens and parochial church council of our parish feel that a proposal to link with Okewood and Forest Green is the way forward. Following the annual meeting, we had a day-long meeting with the churchwardens and PCC members of Okewood and Forest Green churches to try and agree a way forward and to agree a job description for a priest who would live at Ewhurst Rectory and take responsibility for the three churches. It is also proposed that Ockley church would join Newdigate, Capel and South Holmwood parishes in an expanded Surrey Weald team ministry.

Personally, I was encouraged by the positive nature of our conversations at our meeting; the profiles of the three churches are similar and where there are differences we can learn from each other to enhance our joint ministry. For instance, our puppet team has been invited to Okewood and their active house groups can be a model for us. Additionally there are areas of ministry that become viable with a larger population - such as youth ministry where there are proposals in the existing parish of Ockley, Okewood and Forest Green to appoint a youth minster.

The Church of England is the Established Church of this country and as such there are complex legal processes which have to be completed to put any proposals into practice. The procedures are laid down in the Mission and Pastoral Measure 2011; a Church of England Measure is one passed by the church's General Synod and it has the same authority as an Act of Parliament.

We are still in the discussion stage but assuming this link is agreed by all those representing the three churches, a "Pastoral Scheme" has to be drawn up by the diocese and agreed with the Church Commissioners. The proposals were agreed in principle by those present at the annual meeting. However, there is still a long way to go and any final agreement - which must cover both administrative and financial matters - has to be formally accepted by all the parishes involved as well as by a long list of interested parties representing each of those parishes. Unsurprisingly, the diocesan bishop also has to consent before a "Pastoral Scheme" can come into operation.

In the meantime, we will shortly be looking to advertise, interview and, God willing, appoint a new priest for the three churches. The priest would formally be titled 'priest-in-charge' but would almost certainly still be known by us as 'Rector'.

Please pray for all those involved in this new future for our parish. A lot of hard work has already been carried out - but there is a lot more to do.




Planned Giving and Ewhurst Parish Church

Ewhurst Baptist Church

By now you may have heard that I will be stepping down from being Minister of Ewhurst Baptist Church as of the end of June this year. I know this comes hot on the heels of David Minns moving on from the Parish Church in January but I do assure you this is only coincidental, not some subterfuge on behalf of clergy in the village.

I have been with the Baptist Church for the last seven years and have thoroughly enjoyed my time in service there. In the first three years I commuted from Godalming but then about four years ago the church were able to afford for Jackie and I to move into the village and take up residence in The Manse in Mapledrakes Rd. This allowed us to have the benefit of being much more available and part of village life which I now realise actually makes the process of departing that much harder. So why go you might ask?

As a man of faith, seeking to serve a church community, a key pre-requisite is to prayerfully discern where I feel I should live and serve. For most of us this does not mean epiphany moment. Instead it is often just a sense of inner peace that one is in the right place for that time. I have been very blessed in my years at Ewhurst and I felt I was in the "right place". When people asked me occasionally how long I was planning to be here I would reply with something like; "I am here for a season yet I do not know how long the season is". But then about six months ago that sense of belonging has diminished, a bit like the sun warming the morning mist, it has slowly slipped away, not I assure you through difficult times with the church, my faith or with folks in the village – it just isn't there anymore and my time of belonging here seems to have come to an end.

So after much deliberation I informed our church in early March that I would leave at the end of June this year. Although there is some sadness both for Jackie and I, as well as the Church, we press on knowing that with God where one door closes another invariably opens.

So I have placed my name on a list that the Baptist Union of Great Britain manage called the "Settlement List". This is basically a list of ministers looking for churches and churches looking for ministers – a sort of church dating agency! In the meantime while we wait to see what comes next Jackie and I have decided to move out of the village and back to Godalming, thereby freeing the church to start the process of looking for a new minister.

In my absence the Church will seek to appoint a Moderator, typically another local Baptist minister who will seek to support the Deacons of the Church as they manage the day to day affairs.

So this is another farewell, but also an opportunity to say thank you to many. To my Church congregation and its Deacons of course but also to our brothers and sisters at the Parish Church with whom I have worked closely over the years. Last but not least, to many in the village who have made Jackie and I feel very welcome here in Ewhurst.

May God bless you and continue to encourage you all in your own walk of faith and may you know His many riches in your own life and all those you love and care for.

Our all new fibre optic communications network by *David Nye*

When BT's *Fibre To The Cabinet* upgrades of 2012 let so many of us down, I resolved to use my Ewhurst Broadband website to publicise our plight, and to share information on other options. For the next few years, attention was on County Council BDUK contract negotiation and implementation. Surrey County Council's 2015 statement that their Superfast Surrey programme review could include "commercial rollout" areas like Ewhurst provided hope of some limited further improvement. But it was soon clear that the funds available were not nearly adequate to bring all premises up to their modest target of 15 Mbps, let alone achieve parity with those properties close to a BT cabinet.

In 2016, BT made their *Community Fibre Programme* more widely available. Whilst many were strongly opposed to the "gap funding" model, it seemed the only available option. So in September I invited everyone in the Parish to register for inclusion in our application. Whilst still collecting the entries in October, Chris Box from Boxcom Synergy Ltd contacted me with a proposal to build a pure Fibre To The Premises phone and broadband communications network; my ideal but previously unattainable solution! Once persuaded that his concept had potential, I helped Chris to organise a public meeting in January this year, allowing residents to hear and judge the Box Broadband plan for themselves. The response was extremely enthusiastic, so I was encouraged to spend a lot more time working with Box staff on fibre routes, funding and publicity. The project was set back when, first the expected government loan, and then the "city money" turned out not to be available for smaller schemes. Whilst most of us with poor service are very keen, it was clearly going to be a struggle to achieve the level of take-up needed for a viable service in the long term. When planning routes, we found that most landowners are only too pleased to cooperate, but there are some in key locations with little incentive to do so. Meanwhile Chris was busy working on projects and proposals elsewhere which he hoped might prove less problematic.

Fortunately Chris and his management team eventually decided that they really want to focus on building rural community networks like ours, in spite of all the difficulties. They enjoy the rewards of close community engagement, see the real need of struggling rural businesses, and have faith that once the first network is up and running, building into surrounding areas will become very much easier. So the calculators came out again, to determine if a much more modest "bridgehead" project could be made to work, funded mainly by Box themselves.

Thus, on 24th April 2017, the first trench was dug and the Ewhurst/Ellens Green/ Walliswood Phase 1 Network construction commenced. The aim now is to make the first 50+ connections over the summer, and to extend coverage as required to meet demand.

We also hope to have a public exhibition with questions and answers as soon as practically possible after the consultants have verified all the data.





In Our Midst - Marian and Barrie Heathcote Their secret is team work

Taking part, being committed and rising to the challenge are the watch words of this team Heathcote. From the moment they moved to the village together and built their first home in Gadbridge Lane, Barrie and Marian have joined existing clubs or set about founding new ones. They have then, almost always it seems, been part of the committee and helped in its organisation to



keep it going. And all this whilst bringing up their two daughters and with work commitments which took Barrie to Staines and Reading and often overseas and Marian to her teaching post in Cranleigh. Now, in retirement they claim to be slowing down, but have added world travel to the list of interests which keep them busy. I managed to catch them after they had recently returned from watching tigers in India and before they set off to Croatia early in the Summer.

Although Barrie was the first to live in Ewhurst with his family as a teenager, Marian's links here go much deeper. Her grandfather farmed for the Dalton family at Woolpits, now the Duke of Kent school, and her father was born at Woolpits Farm. Marian's mother had been in service at High Wykhurst but once married, her parents moved to Alfold Crossways as her father was working at Dunsfold aerodrome. One of Marian's earliest memories during wartime was counting the planes as they took off and again when they returned. Life was very different then. They would cycle to Cranleigh for most of the shopping but there were also two shops in Alfold run by the same family. The nearest one baked bread by burning faggots. The ashes were then brushed out and the bread put in. It was a real treat to be able to eat it straight from the oven; there were also hot cross buns every Good Friday. After the village school, she passed to Guildford County, the girls' grammar school. The journey by bus along the A281 was much easier than it is today but she remembers a period during a bus strike when they had to cycle to Cranleigh and catch the train. At school she discovered the love of sport which has stayed with her; tennis, cricket, netball, athletics and a Surrey Schools trial for hockey were all fitted in with her studies and continued at Whitelands College, Putney, where she trained as a junior school teacher. After college, she describes her first teaching jobs in Hackney and Stoke Newington as "in at the deep end".

In the early fifties, Barrie's father relocated with his firm from London to Surbiton and found the family home at Lilyshaw in Ewhurst. Barrie lodged in North Harrow to

finish his schooling at the Merchant Taylors' School, and then did National Service, taking a Navigating Officer's commission on fast patrol boats out of Portsmouth. That was great fun he says. He and Marian had already met before he went away and eventually, in 1965, they were married in Marian's home parish church at Alfold. After two years in Guildford they moved to Gadbridge Lane with newborn daughter Catherine. Julia was born two years later. Barrie joined the village football club but rugby was always his first game and he was keen to carry on after playing in the Navy. After a three year spell with Chichester he joined the newly formed Cranleigh Rugby Club. They changed in the cricket pavilion and used a field in Knowle Lane (after clearing the cow pats!). Afterwards, tea and biscuits were served in the Boy and Donkey pub opposite. He enjoyed being part of the team, captaining one of the sides and being the first to score one hundred points for the club. There was success too with the Ewhurst table tennis and cricket clubs. In table tennis, the club won the Horsham & District league three years running. Unfortunately the league then folded. It was during his time as player-chairman of Ewhurst Cricket Club that the new pavilion was built. It was a big club then, able to put out two teams on both Saturdays and Sundays and a mid-week game. They would travel to games in luxury on a coach from Lazell's garage, although once, on the way home in his car after a game at Dunsfold aerodrome, he was stopped by security for driving down the main runway. Perhaps the result of post-match hospitality? Later in the 1980s Barrie joined Ewhurst Bowls Club and, as chairman, saw the membership increase hugely. He was also chairman of the Short Mat Bowling Club when it was formed. In addition, both Marian and Barrie had enjoyed playing badminton with the Ewhurst Badminton Club in the old EYSC building.

They had come to Ewhurst when there were a number of young families who were looking for things to do and to be involved in village life. As a mother at home with two young daughters, Marian willingly took part. She had done some work at the playgroup in Cranleigh so she was asked by health visitor, Alison Few, if she would start a group in Ewhurst. They began in a beautiful barn at Wykehurst Farm. The group later moved to the cricket pavilion on the Green where it continued successfully for many years. In the early 70s she helped start the Ewhurst Stoolball Club and was the first chairman. After 45 years, the club still play on the cricket green. The existing W.I. group met in the afternoons, not possible for those with young children or who were out at work, so in 1974 they started the Ewhurst Evening W.I. with Marian as the first president. In this same year she started some part-time teaching at, what was then, Cranleigh Middle School and over the years gradually increased this time to eventually lead a year group team. As this was usually the first year, a four class entry then, she particularly enjoyed liaising with the feeder schools in order to settle the children into their new classes.

Over the years both Marian and Barrie have been on the committee in several positions and both have been chairman. From small beginnings, the group have staged three, sometimes four productions a year amounting to a staggering one hundred and twenty plus over forty two years. With only a few breaks, Barrie and Marian have been involved with them all in some way. For many of those years we all looked forward to that pantomime Dame who we knew would be Barrie under an outrageous hairpiece and heavy rouge. Nowadays it's more of a family affair with daughters, grand-daughters and sons-in law taking part. Although Marian did produce the 2017 pantomime, they are hoping to take a step back in the future and are looking forward to watching the next production for the first time from the audience.

Membership of NADFAS, the Horticultural and History Societies and Cranleigh U3A complete the list. Marian also chairs the Ewhurst Charity and they both drive for EwCare. When the family was young, camping holidays were usually taken in Europe and were naturally child-centred, but now they are able to go further afield and with more diversity without being cautious about committing too much. Marian and Barrie have had the interest, energy and dedication to do all these things in so many different ways. They have certainly enjoyed a full and active life proving that it can be done.

LOCAL HISTORY CORNER, by Janet Balchin

Congregationalism in Ewhurst in the 19th Century

Ewhurst Baptist Church was originally a Congregational church. The Surrey Mission opened its first 'station' in Gomshall in 1820 with Josiah Widgery as minister. The following year he opened a Sunday school, and reported that 'The first Sabbath twenty three children were admitted, not one of whom could read in the New Testament. The people were generally very ignorant. Less than half could read their Bibles.' There was obviously work to be done and Mr Widgery went on to establish stations at Ewhurst, in 1821; Broadmoor, near Abinger, in 1824; and Felday at Holmbury St Mary, in 1825.

The chapel at Ewhurst was built on a small piece of land at the bottom of the Shere Road. It is marked on old maps as a *'Primitive Methodist Chapel'* although it never had any Methodist connections. Services were usually held every other week and there was also a Sunday school.

Mr Widgery served the area faithfully for 20 years and was followed by the The Rev. J Hedgecock, who was minister from 1841 - 1846.

Mr Alfred Turner became the Evangelist in 1846, and his diaries (held by the Surrey History Centre) give an insight into the problems he faced in being responsible for several stations spread over a large area. He makes frequent references to his lack of horse. His entry for February 1847 notes 'I held a service at Ewhurst on the 22^{nd.} There were 22 present which is the largest number. I have seen the friends there are very anxious for the society to make another attempt to raise a Sabbath Day Congregation but I scarcely know how it can be effected. I could not make the trial without some adjusting. If the Committee think it advisable, and would send me a supply for Gumshall for two or three Sabbaths, I can hold a Service at Ewehurst [sic] in the morning and from thence to Felday in the afternoon - if some friends would undertake this merely for their travelling expenses it would not involve a large outlay. Should this succeed, the difficulty will be in occupying it afterwards. This difficulty is indeed insurmountable without a horse. I have intimated this to them and they think they could engage to raise at least £5 towards the expense of its keep, but it would take 7 or 10 Pounds at least above this sum annually'. This was a considerable amount considering the average weekly wage for an agricultural labourer was 10 shillings per week.

He goes on to remark on the ignorance of the local populace on spiritual matters. 'Returning from Ewhurst I overtook an aged woman. In course of conversation I asked her if she knew how, as a sinner, she could be saved. Her reply was, "No Sir, I can't say I do. I laid 10 years under our clergyman [the Rector of Ewhurst]. He called on me sometimes and said "I never see you at the Sacraments." She replied, "No Sir, I am not fit to come". He said, "come, come". "So I went and I go to the church as often as I can". I asked her if she knew anything of the Lord Jesus Christ and explained to her the way of salvation, but in this matter she was entirely ignorant, her reply surprised me. She said, "I hear Sir, the world is by and by to be destroyed, first it is to be drowned with a flood and then it is to be blown up with gunpowder and they say it is certainly true." The above reasons and circumstances have induced me to submit the matter to the committee, though my present labours are a sufficient tax upon my physical and mental energies yet I am willing to abound for the Salvation of souls.'

In May he reported that the congregation had grown to 54. In July he commented again on the problems of getting between Gomshall, Felday, and Ewhurst, and also noted that there were no houses to rent in Ewhurst. 'I am willing to undertake it and do the best I can if the Committee will provide (or allowance the means of providing) a pony to keep for the purpose and sufficient to defray the annual expenses. I am convinced this will be the most efficient plan as there are no houses to let and it would prevent all uncertainty and disappointment and enable me to give Ewehurst greater attention than I otherwise do.'

A report of the Surrey Mission stated that 'Preaching has continued here ever since, with as much regularity as the Society's funds will allow. Sometimes it [Ewhurst] had its own minister, at other times it has been supplied by evangelists from neighbouring stations."

In 1878 the Surrey Mission built a new chapel at Forest Green and Mr J. Garner was appointed minister for the two stations.


