REMEMBER CHRIST AT CHRISTMAS

This time last year I wrote about changes referring in particular the departure of David and Laura; as most of you know, more changes were to follow. Almost a year has passed since they went to Gloucester Diocese and we still have no Rector. But worship has continued at Ewhurst as it has for the past 800 years and more. We have said goodbye to Tim and Jennie Seller (although at the time of writing their move had not happened) and we are saying "welcome" to our fellow Christians in Okewood and Forest Green. You can read more about the merger that is taking place with those two churches elsewhere in this magazine and by the time you read this, formal notice of the new expanded parish will have been published. The necessary legal procedures are taking much longer than we would wish but, this being the Church of England, changing boundaries is complex and long-winded involving everyone from the Lord Chancellor (acting on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen) to ourselves as parishioners. We'll get there eventually.

We are certainly living in interesting and challenging times. Just about every generation can say that and it was no less so 2000 years ago. The changes heralded by the birth of Jesus were significant and long-lasting. The power of the Jewish hierarchy was severely dented as people began to realise that they did not have to pay money to the priests to obtain God's forgiveness. Just as significantly, those who were not Jews could also obtain forgiveness. This Son of God, Jesus, was there for everyone - regardless of gender, race, creed, colour or indeed any other background. In 1517 a reminder was needed that God's forgiveness is free. In that year, 500 years ago, Martin Luther posted 95 theses complaining about the church's insistence that forgiveness and salvation and, consequently, eternal life are not earned solely by good deeds or donations but are received as the free gift of God's grace through the believer's faith in Jesus Christ. Thus started the "protesting" movement which is the foundation of Protestant denominations and, therefore, of the Church of England, now part of the Anglican Communion. Although the various Christian denominations may differ in some of their beliefs, all Christians are followers of Christ and will celebrate His birth at Christmas time.

Those celebrations, in case you hadn't noticed, have already started. We are being persuaded to part with our hard-earned cash – and money we have not yet earned – on the latest "must have" presents. In the midst of all the shopping, wrapping, posting and all the myriad of preparations, we need to pause and remember that the birth of a little baby boy over 2000 years ago and about 2000 miles from here is the reason we celebrate.

I hope you enjoy this season of goodwill but in doing so we should ensure that we don't leave Christ out of Christmas. I hope you can find time to come to one of our services during Advent and Christmas; you can find details on our website and in this magazine. We may not have a Rector but Christmas will still go ahead as it has done every year since the church was built. May God bless you this Christmas and may He bring us peace and good health in the coming year.

Our New Parish Ewhurst with Okewood and Forest Green

The Church Commissioners have now returned the first draft for the new Parish Scheme, following the approval of the Bishop and all the relevant PCC's. The plans for the new parish are now put to the whole parish for approval.

The Scheme suggests the breakup of the current joint parish of Ockley, Okewood and Forest Green and for these parishes to join with other parishes. Copies of the new Parish Scheme are available to view in the church and the Wilson Room and the church website.

The reasons for approval of the new Parish Scheme are:

- To allow vibrant ministry to continue in Ewhurst, Okewood and Forest Green. Ockley would move to Capel as these villages look towards Dorking. The new parish will then be able to support a full time Rector.
- Okewood and Forest Green look towards Ewhurst and Cranleigh, rather than Dorking and the enlarged parish will be viable to support a full time Rector.
- The new Rector of Ewhurst with Okewood and Forest Green will reside at the Rectory in Ewhurst.
- The new parish will increase the catchment area of Ewhurst CofE Infant School.

• The minister, Rev John Marsh, currently a part-time Minister with Ockley, Okewood and Forest Green, will be part of our Ministry Team, as well as the Ministry Team of Ockley and Capel.

After the deadline:

The church Commissioners will consider any objections, in consultation with the Bishop and Objectors.

When consultations are finished and the new parish has been approved by the Church Commissioners, the Bishop will appoint a new Rector for the new parish of Ewhurst with Okewood and Forest Green.

The time plan for advertising and appointing for this post will take up to three months from receiving approval for the new parish.

Good News on the Roof Repair Funding

Following the award of up to £26,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund for half the costs of the restoration of our church bells, we have been awarded a further grant for the repair of the roof.

We have now have funds (£20,200) and full approval from the Heritage Lottery Fund to appoint an architect and to get detailed costs and specifications for the work needed on the roof. Hopefully contractors will be on site early in 2018 to start on this important phase. Once their findings have been analysed and detailed plans drawn up, we can then apply to the Diocese for permission to do the work. This should happen during the late spring/early summer. We then have to re-apply to the Heritage Lottery Fund for them to release the rest of our promised grant (£175,300) to do the work.

Although this is a very generous grant, it will not cover the full costs of the building work – we will have a shortfall of about £50,000 – £60,000. We will be applying for grants from other organisations but fundraising in the village and the wider community will be crucial. We plan to start the actual repair work during autumn 2018 so we have a lot to do. We are sure that the village will be there to support us in preserving our beautiful village church for future generations.

They have both been pillars of our church and the wider community since they joined our congregation in 1996. We will miss them, both for their fellowship and all the work they have quietly done around the village.

We are very fortunate that Rev^{d.} Rosemary Mason, who is part of the Shere and Peaslake Ministry Team, has offered to help to support us during the Vacancy. Rosemary has already taken several of our services but now she will do as many as she can. Thanks to her and our Lay Minister John White, we can cover all our services with the help of Val Henry and the Cranleigh clergy team. We are very grateful to all these people for giving their time and commitment to keep our church alive.

The PCC has recently had a meeting with Archdeacon, Paul Bryer and the Area Dean, Debbie Sellin updating us on setting up the new parish and appointing a new Rector. The new parish of Ewhurst with Okewood and Forest Green has gone to the Church Commissioners in Westminster for initial approval. After their first analysis, there will be a formal consultation period after which any objections will be considered. Hopefully we will get final approval early in 2018.

We will not be able to advertise for a new priest until we have this approval. However, we and the churchwardens from Okewood and Forest Green have everything ready to start the appointment process as soon as approval is given. This does mean that we are unlikely to have a new priest before Easter so again, we are very grateful for the commitment of John, Rosemary and Val in giving much needed continuity to our church services and to the many other people, doing that bit extra, to make sure that our work in the community continues.

Since Fair Trade goods have been available in supermarkets, the income from Traidcraft sales has declined as people do not realise the difference. This means the most vulnerable workers are suffering.

Traidcraft runs projects developing people's potential to trade their way out of poverty in their own countries. Traidcraft also lobbies big business and government for fundamental changes to the way trade works so that it benefits the poor. Traidcraft believe that this is the "Best of Fair".

As another year draws to a close, we may well find ourselves looking back and reflecting over 2017. I don't know what this year has been like for you, but probably like many of us, mine has been a mixture of numerous highs and lows, a combination of some positive things to celebrate alongside some significant challenges, including for me some serious family illnesses.

On a wider scale, while there have been many good things happening all around the world during 2017, our news tends to focus primarily on the negative side of life. All of us have no doubt at some point watched the news with heavy hearts, in response to some of the things which have been happening around our world during the year.

I was recently reminded of song 'From a Distance,' made famous in the 90s by Bette Midler and subsequently Cliff Richard. The song reflects about how from afar the world looks wonderful with an apparent sense of hope and peace, a place of harmony with no war, hunger or disease. I have to say you don't need to watch the news for five minutes for this illusion to be shattered! The song then contrasts this idealistic image with the harsh reality of the state of the world, describing how God is watching on from a distance. While being a pleasant enough tune, the lyrics do not for me capture the Christmas message as I understand it.

As we approach the Advent season I am reminded how the good news of Christmas is that God came to be with us, that he did not leave the messed-up world to its own devices, but instead chose to come down to earth as a defenceless baby, to be with us in the fragility, brokenness and pain of human life — as well as being with us in all the good times and



celebrations. This is quite the opposite of watching on remotely from a distance.

I love the Message version of the Bible, which describes Jesus's birth as being how God "became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighbourhood." The

birth of this baby was the arrival of God himself, choosing not to watch in despair from a distance as if he was watching the TV news, but to enter the mess of the world, to be here with us and get his hands dirty, initiating a restoration project for the world – one which continues today and to which we are all invited to join.

During the Advent season, in our church services at Ewhurst Baptist we will light Advent candles representing HOPE, LOVE, JOY and PEACE. As we do so we celebrate God being with us, bringing the possibility of genuine hope, love, joy and peace - not merely an illusion of these things as described in that song.

It was the extraordinary arrival of this baby, the arrival of God himself coming to live amongst us on earth, which brought the possibility of **HOPE** in the midst of despair and which demonstrated his **LOVE** which is stronger than hatred, a love we can both receive and also share with others. It was the arrival of God in a humble stable, which enabled us to experience a sense of **JOY** in the midst of the inevitable anguish which human life involves. This baby brought the possibility of **PEACE** with God, within ourselves and with other people, despite the turmoil of this world. This is surely something worth celebrating together!

Consequently we will be exploring each of these themes more fully during our services in December. Everyone is very welcome to attend any of our Christmas services, just as they are with our friends up the road at the Parish Church. You can find more information about our services in the separate advert.





CENTENARY GARDEN

A group of passionate gardeners, designers, accountants and a film producer, along with Parish Councillors have got together to create a Centenary Garden. Cranleigh Parish Council, who own the land, have given the go-ahead for the group to raise sponsorship. The designed garden is being created in association with the national body 'Fields in Trust' who are leading a campaign to commemorate the centenary of the signing of the Armistice next year.

The theme of planting is "Keeping the Home Fires Burning' and is designed to be an area of calm and beauty, with multi-stemmed silver birches and cornus with a paved area and benches and a small interactive area where people can listen to voices from the past letters from and to the Front, village gossip, local news and for more recent conflicts the audio content will copy the style of 'The Listening Project'.

The project will use content from all the villages in the Cranleigh area- Ewhurst, Alfold, Dunsfold and Shamley Green/Wonersh and the long term ambitions are to create a hub of oral history, combining the physical presence of the garden with the connection to the virtual world of a website.

By tapping into age-old oral traditions, says Cllr Brian Freeston, this garden it will help to renew our area's sense of history and deepen our sense of identity, especially important when the villages are facing a significant and sharp increase in population in a time when much is being lost.

News from Ewhurst CE Infant School

We have had a busy start to the Autumn term at Ewhurst CE Infant School. Our new 28 pupils in Reception class have settled in very happily, and are enjoying getting to know the school and its routines, with the older children acting as excellent role models. Year 1 have already had a highly enjoyable and exciting trip to Painshill Park, where they took part in a quest to find a dragon's egg, and Year 2 will be attending the Advent Workshop at Guildford Cathedral at the end of November.

In Our Midst - Sylvia McClintock Wright A Family of History

When Sylvia was very young and living in Nigeria, her father inherited a large country house in Ireland from his uncle, Major Harry McClintock. As a result, the family were able to enjoy magical holidays in the 18 bedroomed home, left virtually untouched for two hundred years and crammed full of invaluable historical artifacts of the McClintock family. It was here that Sylvia discovered first-hand the famous history of her ancestors and here began her lifelong interest in them. Throughout her childhood



she listened with her father, to the stories and memories told by her grandfather, Colonel Robert McClintock, who had researched extensively and written about the McClintock family. Sylvia easily describes in fascinating detail, the characters and events of her family history and their role in Irish society; these are kept alive by the considerable collection of original paintings, photographs and so much more which she has collected from the family and gathered around her and husband Malcolm in their cottage on The Green.

The McClintocks of Argyll were a minor clan of the Colquhouns. Early in the seventeenth century they had to escape Scotland in a hurry after losing what was to be the last ever inter-clan battle supporting the Colquhouns against the McCleods at Glen Fruin. The exact date of their arrival in Ireland is not known but an Alexander McClintock of Trintaugh is recorded in the muster roles of County Donegal in 1630 and for the next two hundred years, generations of the family lived there. They married well, inherited other large estates and became very much part of the Irish landowning establishment many taking high ranking positions in the forces and the church. Some years ago Sylvia set out to discover what remains of this original family house at Trintaugh. Knowing that it was near St Johnston, south of Derry Londonderry, an increasingly frustrating search was finally ended by a local farmer who knew exactly where it was and Sylvia describes how the hairs on the back of her neck stood up when, although the house was no longer there, she recognised the stable buildings, still standing, and looking exactly as they had been described. The local man was named McClintock - maybe a coincidence, but he did look the image of her brother!

The family spread further afield to Co. Cavan and Co. Tyrone and Sylvia is descended from the branch of the family who bought the Drumcar estate in County Louth and her great grandfather was born in Dundalk in 1819. As the second son of a fourth son, little inheritance was likely and Francis Leopold McClintock joined the Royal Navy aged 11 as a "gentleman volunteer". There was no indication then that he would become one of the most celebrated Arctic explorers of the nineteenth century. Although he had died nearly fifty years before Sylvia was born, it was the stories of his exploits and discoveries which so captured her imagination as a child. Leopold journeyed to South America, at one point meeting up with the Beagle expedition. Here his leadership qualities were recognised when, as Lieutenant McClintock, he led a group of men to salvage a beached naval ship and refloat it. As a result, in 1848, he was chosen to join one of the ships searching for the ill-fated expedition led by Sir John Franklin who had disappeared while looking for a NW Passage route in the Canadian Arctic. Learning from the native Inuit people, McClintock mastered travelling by dog and human hauled sledges and his techniques remained the status quo in Royal Navy Arctic and Antarctic overland travel until the death of Captain Scott in 1912. During a second expedition in 1852, McClintock travelled 1,400 miles by sled and charted 800 miles of previously unknown coastline. He is regarded as the father of modern sledging.

By 1853 the Royal Navy ships were being recalled to take forces to the Crimean War. Lady Franklin was desperate for more information of the fate of her husband and as a result in 1857, she chose McClintock, recommended by the Prince Consort himself, to lead her own self-financed ship, *The Fox*, to continue the search. After 6 months trapped in the ice he found evidence of Franklin's group when a cairn on King William Island was discovered to contain a standard naval form documenting what had happened. Notes indicated that Franklin had died and that in two years they had lost nearly thirty men. The men intended to leave the ships and walk back, but in doing so they must have all died. McClintock's ingenious sledging skills resulted in him finding skeletons, boats and much more. On his return home, public admiration was enormous and he was hailed as a hero. His book, The Voyage of the "Fox" in the Arctic Seas: A Narrative of the Fate of Sir John Franklin and His Companions, outsold Dickens in 1859 and the next year he was knighted. Mount McClintock and the McClintock Channel are named in his honour. His further naval career saw service in the Mediterranean, as governor of Portsmouth and finally as commander of the western approaches in Bermuda and Nova Scotia He was promoted to admiral the day before he retired to London where he died in 1907.

Sylvia's grandfather, Colonel Robert McClintock, was Sir Leopold's third son. He married Mary Howard Elphinstone, the daughter of Sir Howard Craufurd Elphinstone who received one of the first Victoria Crosses, for gallantry during the Crimean War. After the death of Prince Albert, Sir Howard became a close and valued confidant of Queen Victoria and governor to Prince Arthur. He was given permission to build a house on crown land in Bagshot Park, but died in a sailing accident in 1890. Lady Elphinstone, Sylvia's great-grandmother lived there for another forty years; as lady-in-waiting to the queen, she was well known in the area and was regularly visited by close members of the royal family.

In 1969, at the beginning of the Troubles, Sylvia's father sold the house in Ireland and much of its historic contents were brought back to England and left untouched in her parents' home in Dorset. (Her mother's family can be traced back to William the Conqueror but that's another story!) After several jobs in London, Sylvia worked in Hong Kong where she met Malcolm. They were married and their daughters were born and brought up there. In 1987, Malcolm's job was moved back to London and they chose Ewhurst as a good place to live and have been here ever since. With her deep family knowledge and history, Sylvia has been able to add detail to a number of references on the Internet and now, she says, she needs to decide what to do with the fantastic archive in her care.



LOCAL HISTORY CORNER, by Janet Balchin Ewhurst and the Red Cross in the First World War

The Ewhurst Red Cross Work Party pre-1915

Following the outbreak of war in August 1914, the British Red Cross and the Order of St. John formed the Joint War Committee and working parties were set up in villages and towns across the country. In Ewhurst, villagers rallied round to help in whatever way they could. The Surrey Advertiser reported on Monday 17th August 1914 "A largely well attended meeting was held at the Ewhurst Church Hall on Tuesday, [11th August] when nearly everyone present promised to assist in making garments for the troops. Working parties will meet twice a week at the Church Hall."

The Ewhurst Red Cross working party was organised by George Johnston, of Garlands, who soon received an appeal from Captain C. Bennett, of Westlands, Ockley Road, for assistance for his men of the 4th East Surrey Regt., who were very short of shirts and socks. The October 1914 Parish Magazine reported that "they been able to send the following garments: 56 shirts, 53 pairs of socks, 8 vests, and 8 pants, total 125 articles, through the kindness and generosity of the following donors: The Ewhurst Red Cross Working Party (per Mrs Creswell), Mrs Sartorius, Mrs Rigby, Mrs Gossage, Mrs Hume Williams, Mrs Mildmay, Miss Stewart, Miss Fraser-Tytler and Mr Walter Ede; to all of whom many thanks are due."

The Ewhurst War Hospital Supply Depot No. 1494

Working parties had been working hard since the beginning of the war, but in 1915 were reorganized to be more efficient. The Central Work Rooms were established at Burlington House, in the galleries of the Royal Academy and as well as being work rooms for London volunteers, organized the working parties across the country and abroad. Existing and new working parties were registered through the Central Work Rooms and on the 3rd November 1915 the Ewhurst working party became War Hospital Supply Depot 1494. The group met at Garlands, the home of George and Agnes Johnston and continued to send parcels until 26th February 1019. At the end of the war 16 of the volunteers qualified for a Government Voluntary Workers Badge.

Some materials were distributed through the Central Work Rooms, but most local groups funded and provided their own supplies. In May 1916 a fundraising jumble sale and fete was held at Garlands for the purpose of buying materials. The Surrey Advertiser noted, "The stall holders were all Red Cross Workers and wore their caps and aprons which gave quite a picturesque touch to the scene".

In January 1917 The Ewhurst Parish Magazine reported that the following had been made "Nightshirts, 149; Pyjamas and bed jackets, 32; abdominal and lint bandages, 511; roller bandages, 34; 'Treasure Bags' (toiletries, stationary and chocolates, for men in casualty clearing stations and POW's), 162; little pillows, 7; feather pillows (full size), 2; kettle holders, 4; ward slippers, 26 pairs; operations stockings, 29 pairs; pillow cases, 30 pairs; and old linen, 8 packages."

VADs

The local Red Cross volunteers were organised into Voluntary Aid Detachments and their members became known as VADs. The local group for Cranleigh and Ewhurst was Surrey Voluntary Aid Detachment 8. Most VADs were not qualified nurses, but had received training in first aid, hygiene and home nursing. They undertook tasks such as cleaning, bed making, laundry, helping with meals, and personal care for the patients including changing dressings and bathing.

The Surrey 8 Detachment took on responsibility for running Oaklands Hospital, in Knowle Lane, Cranleigh. The house had been lent to the Red Cross by Sir George Bonham, of Knowle, and it served as an auxiliary hospital for men who needed convalescence. The first batch of 20 patients arrived in January 1916, and by August numbers were up to 110 patients.

A number of Ewhurst women worked at Oaklands. Among the part-time Ewhurst volunteers were Elsie Cumber, of Hazelbank, Ewhurst; Catherine Russell, who regularly walked the five miles each way from her home on Pitch Hill, and Jessie Saunders, who had also taken on the running her husband's building business, after he died in the explosion at the Silvertown munitions factory. Girl Guides Eleanora and Marguerite Hamlyn, were the daughters of the Rector of Ewhurst, and helped with housework. Jeannie Topham, one of the daughters of artist Frank William Warwick Topham, worked full-time at Oaklands for two years and then did and then did a further eight months at Lady Dudley's Officers Hospital, Brighton. She married Lt Commander Graham Wragge RN, in 1922, and the Surrey Advertiser reported that a large number of former VADs were among the wedding guests.

Marguerita Fowler worked at Oaklands part-time from January 1916 until October 1917. She then worked part time at Torquay Hospital and full time at the Essex County Hospital, before returning to Surrey to work at Thorncombe Military Hospital near Bramley and Henley Park Military Hospital, near Guildford. In 1926 she trained as a missionary and went to live in an isolated part of Canada as a 'Bishop's Messenger' (similar to a 'lay reader'), where she established a community centre at 'St Faiths' in Swan River, Northern Manitoba. Before the war she had been the Girl Guide leader at Ewhurst and while in Canada she

founded the first company of Girl Guides at Swan River and became Division Commissioner for guides and brownies in Northern Manitoba. As the district covered 400sq miles and was sparsely populated she also established the 'Lone Guide' programme, which allowed a single girl to become a member. She was appointed OBE in 1931 for her work at St Faiths. She died in 1970 and her ashes were interred on her mother's grave in Ewhurst churchyard.

Mary Drinkwater Creswell, the eldest daughter of Col. Edmund Creswell of Copse Hill worked as a full time VAD at St Dunstan's Hostel for Blinded Soldiers in Regents Park in 1917. From January to August 1918 she was in France and then in October retuned to London to work at the United States Base Hospital Number 29, at Tottenham, which was run by the American Red Cross.






