

#### FROM THE RECTOR ....

In response to President Trump's call for a wall between the USA and Mexico, Pope Francis said, "A person who thinks only about building walls, wherever they may be, and not building bridges, is not Christian. This is not in the Gospel." I like that. And only two weeks ago I was preaching on the "unity of the body", a passage from Paul's letter to the Corinthians. It's all about combatting division:

"The human body has many parts, but the many parts make up one whole body. So it is with the body of Christ. Some of us are Jews, some are Gentiles, some are slaves, and some are free. But we have all been baptised into one body by one Spirit, and we all share the same Spirit."

That bit about Jews and Gentiles for us could read: "Some of us are Ewhurstians, some Okewood folk, and some are from Forest Green." But today, we are one parish: one community. And I hope we can be increasingly bound together with one spirit.

Unity is what our new logo is all about (see fig 1). It is made up of two trinities (see fig 2). The earthly trinity of our three communities is - in my vision at least - united with the heavenly trinity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. When these two come together graphically, a wonderful flower shape emerges. For me that symbolises the growth and hope that the unity of our parish will bring to our community. And I love that, though united, you can still see the three individual churches represented by three colours. Rest assured, unity will never mean uniformity.

Of course a logo is just a symbol. And very much a symbol of intent. But I hope you take away from this explanation of its creation that we can do amazing things as a united parish - working together, serving one another, and, of course, walking in union with Jesus Christ.



#### Churchwardens' Report, St Peter and St Paul, Ewhurst

As usual the Christmas celebrations at the church were well attended with many people using the varied services to come into the church. The Christmas season started with a mindful Advent celebration looking at the meaning of Advent. Magical candlelit moments were next with children engrossed in making their Christingles after learning what they meant. The traditional Nine Lessons and Carols followed with reading contributions from a range of village organisations and singing by both choir and congregation. Mince pies and mulled wine in the Wilson Room gave a lovely ending to the evening.

Approaching Christmas itself, the church was host to the celebrations of Ewhurst C of E Infant school of both Christmas itself and what the children had achieved during the Autumn Term. Christmas Eve was made special by the Carols round the Crib, with the church packed with families, many bringing along three generations to celebrate this special time.

Midnight Communion was a more reflective service with the communion taken at Midnight re-enforcing the birth of Christ. Communion on Christmas Day was very much a family event with a new view of the Nativity through the realms of chocolate bars — a Galaxy will never seem quite the same! The Wise men eventually arrived at the Crib for Epiphany, their arrival celebrated with a seasonal evensong.

These Christmas celebrations were enhanced by having the Crib, the Christmas trees, extra candles and the Advent ring as well as lovely flower arrangements. So many people worked behind the scenes to make these Christmas celebrations as special as possible and we pass on our thanks to them. Special thanks go to Val Henry and all the members of the choirs who not only sang the Christmas messages in the church but also at several venues around the parish including three pubs - perhaps that is what kept them smiling!

Since Christmas, there has been time to check on what needs doing around the church and the churchyard and we are again grateful for those who have kept this side of the church operational, even when the boilers have been challenging.

This also gives the Ministry Team time to reflect on how services across the parish operate as a whole. This will be a topic for their discussions over the month before the next part of our Christian journey through Lent and Easter.

#### **Roof Repair Project Update**

#### **GOOD NEWS!!**

We have completed the initial surveys and tendering process and now secured the majority of the funding needed to carry out the repairs to the Chancel and pay for the educational community work we are required to do. The repairs to the South Transept and Nave roofs will have to be moved into a second phase at a later date. Since the December News and Views we have received the following major Grants:

- The Heritage Lottery Fund approved our second-round application in January and has given £180,200
- The National Churches Trust in conjunction with the Surrey Churches Preservation Society has given £7,500
- The Wolfson Foundation in conjunction with ChurchCare has given £7,000

We are very grateful to these organisations but also appreciate our more "local" donations such as those from Ewhurst History Society, Ewhurst Secret Gardens and Ellens Green Memorial Hall Trust. Many of you are still donating to our Save a Slab appeal and supporting our Fund Raising events, which also increases our funds. However, we still have shortfall of about £13,000 so we continue to need your support to get the work fully funded. Fund Raising events planned to help the Project this year are shown below, so please put the dates in your diaries!

- Gift Day Sat 29 June
- Big Day Out Sat 20 July
- Ewhurst Rocks Sat 20 July

#### Details of all these events are in this magazine and on the church website

We hope to begin the actual repair work in August this year but we have to wait for the fledgling swifts to fly their nests in the Chancel before the scaffolding can go up and work begin! During the summer we will be further developing our educational work – so you may see more school groups around the church than usual and be asked to have a go yourselves!

#### Registering on the New Church Electoral Roll

There is to be a **NEW** Church Electoral Roll this year so **EVERYBODY** has to reapply. The forms to do this will be at the back of each church with instructions on what to do.

You can also apply by downloading the form on the website and returning it either to one of the churches or to the Parish Office.

The deadline for the return of ALL forms is Friday 15 March 2019.

Note: If you wish to be nominated as a member of the PCC or vote for a person to be a member of the PCC, you must be registered on the NEW Church Electoral Roll.

## Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) for the parish of Ewhurst with Okewood and Forest Green on Sunday 7 April

This will be held at St John the Baptist Church, Okewood , following immediately after the 10.30am service. At this meeting, new Churchwardens, Parochial Church Council (PCC) members and Sidespeople will be elected. There are also reports about different aspects of the parish, including the Financial Report. Anyone from the parish can come to this meeting but only members of the Church Electoral Roll can vote for PCC members or Sidespeople. Additionally, members of the Local Authority Electoral Roll who live in this parish are eligible to vote for churchwardens.

After the meeting, everyone is invited to The Ark, next to the church, for a Bring and Share lunch.

Information on how to nominate PCC members, Churhwardens & Sidespeople is shown below:

#### **Nominations for Members of the PCC**

#### These should be made between Mon 18 March - 12 noon Fri 5 April.

There will be four vacancies this year due to four members of the PCC standing down by rota. Two will represent Ewhurst and two shared by Okewood and Forest Green. If you wish to nominate or second someone, you and the person nominated must be on the NEW Church Electoral Roll. You must check that the person you nominate is willing to be nominated.

Forms for this will be at the back of each church from 18 March and should be completed by the above deadline. They will also be available online on the church website. If a vote is needed this will be at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) on Sunday 7 April.

#### **Nominations for Churchwardens**

#### These should be made between Mon 18 March – 12noon Friday 5 April.

There are 3 vacancies this year due to Churchwardens standing down. Two are from Ewhurst and one from Okewood and Forest Green.

If you wish to nominate or second someone, you and the person nominated must be on the NEW Church Electoral Roll. You must check that the person you nominate is willing to be nominated.

Forms for this will be at the back of each church from 18 March and should be completed by the above deadline. They will also be available on line on the church website If a vote is needed this will be at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) on Sunday 7 April.

#### **Election of Sidespeople**

This takes place annually.

If you are already a sidesperson, you need not re-apply but please let the Parish Office know by Monday 1 April if you wish to resign.

If you would like to become a sidesperson at any of the churches, please contact the Parish Office before Monday 1 April so your election can be considered at the APCM.

Traidcraft is NOT the same as Fair Trade goods that are sold in the supermarkets. These Fair Trade goods only help large scale producers, not the small and most vulnerable farmers and traders. Since Fair Trade goods have been available in supermarkets, the income from Traidcraft sales has declined as people do not realise the difference. This means the most vulnerable workers are suffering.

Traidcraft runs projects developing people's potential to trade their way out of poverty in their own countries. Traidcraft also lobbies big business and government for fundamental changes to the way trade works so that it benefits the poor. Traidcraft believe that this is the "Best of Fair".

#### HOLY TRINITY CHURCH, FOREST GREEN

The very sad facts behind the creation of our lovely church. It all happened over 125 years ago and the following is from Okewood Parish Magazine, January 1897.

"The last week of January was a time of important change for the Forest Green end of our parish – the St Barnabas Mission Room being used for the last time as a Church on Sunday, January 24<sup>th</sup>; when the snow lay so thick upon the ground that many were prevented from gathering for the last time in the little church that had become so dear to them.

"The following Saturday, January 30<sup>th</sup>, was the day fixed by the Bishop of Southampton for the dedication of the beautiful new Church of Holy Trinity which Mr and Mrs CE Hensley have built as a memorial to their son Everard, tragically killed in a shooting accident at the age of 17.



"The service began with the singing of Psalm 122 after which Bishop

solemnly pronounced the Dedication of

the Church. Evening Prayer followed with appropriate hymns being sung by the choir and congregation very heartily; and then the Bishop gave an address upon the words "Come unto me". He urged us to new zeal and energy, fostered by the sense of ownership and responsibility in the new House of God, and yet not to forget the rock from whence it was hewn - the mother church of which it remained a part, and with

which it must ever work with the sincerest loyalty. Lastly he reminded us that this was a memorial church and that the invitation "Come unto me" bade us to lean all our weight upon that article of our faith, 'I believe in the Communion of Saints'.

"The new church has been very prettily designed, and although simple in character and modest in dimensions, it has an air of homeliness and attractiveness about it which is distinctly marked. It is of the early English style with apse and lancet windows, and is of red brick with Bath stone facings. The floor is laid with wooden blocks, and in the heating and other arrangements the comfort of the worshippers has been carefully studied. In the chancel are five stained glass windows, in medieval style, representing Christ the Light of the World, the Virgin Mother and Child, and the Christian virtues: Faith, Hope and Charity.

"Notwithstanding the inclement weather, the church which has seating for 120 people, was crowded on the occasion of the dedication service."

#### SHOCKING GUN FATALITY NEAR HOLMBURY.

The induction and ordination service was conducted by Rev Dr Tony Rich, Ewhurst Baptist Church moderator.



#### **Richard Cleaves BEM**

1957 - 2019



Ewhurst village has lost a very special person who in his quiet and modest way gave so much to the community. He will be greatly missed.

Richard's life was greatly changed in 1980 when as a young man he was involved in a serious accident which confined him to a wheelchair. Some time later he and Jane, his wife, moved to the village of Ewhurst where his family were already living.

With his love of the village and his interest in its needs he agreed in 1996 to be co-opted on to the Parish

Council. At the following Election in 1999, he agreed to take on the chairmanship of the council, a position he held for 20 years.

When he became Chairman he was keen to bring in more modern working practices. He gave each Parish Councillor responsibility for a particular area of work, their own portfolio. All paperwork and administration was computerised. Richard wanted the Council to go forward with a positive and active future, no time wasting or bureaucracy. With diplomacy and negotiation, patience and tolerance, Richard oversaw and accomplished a great deal of work.

With his enthusiasm and encouragement and a council who were right behind him the new EYSC was built, there were improvements and refurbishments to the village Hall, the bowls club, football pitches and tennis courts, the recreation ground ... and a brand new playground for the children. At the same time he devoted hours to supporting the Ewhurst Charity, Citizens Advice, the Hoppa bus service and so many other organisations that affected village life.

He often put his head above the parapet on village issues. So he often got sniped at but he never complained or bore grudges because all his efforts were solely aimed at benefiting the village as a whole, never himself. I don't think he realised quite how much he had achieved as chairman of the Council. If he received a compliment he usually brushed it aside. So it was very appropriate when he was awarded the BEM in public recognition of all he had done for the village. We shall miss his guiding hand but give thanks for the privilege of having known this remarkable man in our community. We should also thank Jane for allowing us to take so much of his time.



### LOCAL HISTORY CORNER, by Janet Balchin

As this will be the first edition of News and Views to be delivered to houses in Forest Green, Walliswood and Oakwood Hill, since the formation of the new parish, it seems like a good time to revisit the history of the church. This article will look at the early history, and future editions will focus on the later history and then look at the history of the churches in Forest Green and Okewood.

### The History of Ewhurst Church

#### Part I - Ewhurst before the Reformation

Ewhurst church is not mentioned in the Domesday Book of 1086, but it is likely that it was built fairly soon after the Conquest. After the Battle of Hastings in 1066, the new Norman lords were ordered to do acts of penance, and many built and endowed monasteries and churches.

The nave is the oldest surviving part of the building, possibly dating from the late  $11^{th}$  or early  $12^{th}$  century. The first church consisted of a nave 36ft by 19ft 6in and a chancel (now the crossing) approximately 18ft square. The nave would have had high unglazed windows and the main entrance would have been the south door. The door as it exists today is puzzling. Whilst described by Ian Nairn as "the best piece of Norman decoration in Surrey", on closer inspection the doorway would appear to be not all it seems and has been altered, possibly during the works of 1837/8. The simple Romanesque font is also early and dates from the  $12^{th}$  century.

The first documentary reference is found in a Papal Bull of 1179, which includes the church of *luherst* in a list of property of Merton. Later records showed that the church paid a pension to Merton Priory who also held the advowson (the right to present the Rector). This right was challenged by William de Braose, Lord of the Manor of Gomshall, in 1206, but the dispute was settled in favour of the Priory who held it until their dissolution in 1538.

In the early 13<sup>th</sup> century the church was extended with a new chancel, and transepts to the north and south. The original chancel then became the crossing with a tower over it. This gave the church its cruciform plan, which still exists today and has not been lost through the addition of side aisles. The interior would have been plastered and painted. Discoveries in 1931 revealed a recess under the east window of the south transept, with 13<sup>th</sup> century decoration in a zigzag pattern. The recess has been retained, but the decoration has been lost. From the 13<sup>th</sup> century we can begin to trace the names of rectors of Ewhurst, with the earliest reference being in 1223 to Dionisius [Dennis]. In 1291 Pope

Nicholas IV ordered that the value of all churches should be assessed in the *Taxatio Eccesiastica*. (This was not the value of the actual building, but the value of the income from the benefice). Ewhurst was valued at 25 marcs (£16. 13s. 4d) and it was recorded that it paid a pension of £2 to Merton Priory.

The church is dedicated to St Peter and St Paul, but there are very few historical references to the dedication and early references only mention St Peter, the earliest being a mention of William de Mortimer, parson of St Peter's church, *Yweherst*, in 1271.

An insight into what Ewhurst church was like before the Reformation can be found in wills of the period. People left money (often in the form of livestock) to the church for the burning of lamps, candles and tapers before images of the saints and to pay priests to say masses for their souls. Important local people were sometimes buried within the church.

The high altar was in the chancel and separated from the body of the church by a rood screen. Rood is the old English word for the cross and the image of Christ crucified. Lady Uvedale of Baynards, who died in 1489, left 20s to the rood light at Ewhurst church and also the same amount to Cranleigh church.

In addition to the high altar there were side altars, the most important being devoted to 'Our Lady'. In Ewhurst there was an altar devoted to 'Our Lady' in the south transept, referred to as the south chancel. Walter Athyll, who died in 1524, requested to be buried in the south chancel before the image [statue] of Our Lady. He left a cow worth 8s to keep a wax taper before the rood, and another for a taper before the image of Our Lady in the south chancel.

Nicholas Sawyer's will, dated 1517 and proved 1521/2, makes reference to a third altar, probably in the north transept, dedicated to St Nicholas. He requested burial in the church before the altar of St Nicholas and gave a cow to keep a taper burning before the altar of St Nicholas every festival day and every time divine service was said. His widow, Alice, who died in 1521, was also to be buried in the church and gave an altar cloth to the chapel. She also left 6d to the high altar and 6d to the rood light and £1 in bread to the poor.

Prayers and masses were said for the dead. Some of these masses were conducted by the incumbent priest, but there were also freelance priests who were engaged to say masses as and when required. Walter Athyll left instructions in 1524 for twenty priests to sing and say mass at his burial "if they can be got and if not the next day"; and after one month thirty priests were to say and sing four trentalls [30 masses said consecutively] of which two were to

be in Ewhurst church and two in Oakwood chapel.

People also left money to the church for repairs. John Tyknar left 1s for the repair of the bells in 1531, and Thomas Sawyer left 6s.8d for the repair of the steeple in 1536.

As result of the presentation of the draft **Neighbourhood Plan**, various comments had been made by members of the public and members of Council and it had been agreed that members of the Council should meet with a working group to review the comments.

The document produced as a result of the review will go back to the steering group, who will make the necessary alterations to the draft Neighbourhood Plan.

James Garside, the Neighbourhood Plan expert consultant, will check through the wording of the report on site selection and revisit all the proposed sites as well as updating the SEA (strategic environmental assessment and sustainability appraisal) document.

The draft Neighbourhood Plan will then be returned to the Parish Council. With their agreement, the process will then be started towards Regulation 14 - the Village Consultation.

At present, neither the draft Neighbourhood Plan nor the HLAA or SEA are available on the website. When the draft Neighbourhood Plan is ready for Regulation 14, they will be put on the website so that the public are fully aware.

### In Our Midst — George Yates An Active Life on Many Different Stages

George and Julie brought their family to Ewhurst in 1976 when George took the post of inspector-advisor for Special Educational Needs with Surrey Education Department. Since then his wide interests and activities in the village have made him familiar to us all in many different ways - his magic shows and stage performances, the village school, the Parish Council and the Ewhurst Charity to name but a few. And there are the other totally different jobs he did during and after his work with Surrey.



George was the first war baby to be born in the small Lancashire town of Padiham after the declaration of war in 1939. He grew up there with the chimneys and mills of the Lancashire cotton belt clearly visible to the South and to the North there was Pendle Hill, of witches fame, and the Pennines stretching to the Lakes and Scotland beyond. Here he discovered a love of the outdoor life and walking in particular, but also a love of performing on stage. At seven, he did simple card tricks on stage at his primary school and when a little older, joined local salesman Tom Rigby who took his hypnotism and magic show to factory workers and children's parties. George would do ten minutes on stage while Tom changed between acts. He bought a book to learn about hypnotism but it was banned by his lay preacher father and so he exchanged it for one on yoga, beginning for him a lasting interest in the different aspects of human behaviour and beliefs.

After A levels at Accrington Grammar School, he gained a place at St John's Training College in York but first spent some time teaching, at the age of 18, in the tough docks area of Salford and choosing to live cheaply above a pub in the main street. He also wanted to get more experience performing magic, so the following Summer took a waiting job with full board at Gunton Hall near Lowestoft with one night a week performing and perfecting his tricks. After two years at St John's Training College in York, he came South for the first time to teach at Sheephatch School in Tilford. This was a local authority boarding school and attractive to George as the job came with full board and a little room of his own at the end of one of the dormitories. Both boys and girls were sent there, taken out of their normal schools to experience some time in the countryside and to take part in a more free environment where normal lessons were

followed every afternoon by outdoor games, clubs and societies. As the youngest male member of staff, he looked after the P.E. in the school and after two years was seconded to Chester College for a P.E. diploma course. It was here that he met Julie who lived locally. At this point George admits the coursework was not always a priority. Attendance at the jazz club was often preferred to learning how to referee basketball games and the like and his tutor was persuaded that the practice of yoga would be a relevant subject for his thesis in P.E. An easier option for him with his previous interest.

He returned to Surrey, to Grafham Grange, a school near Cranleigh which still operates today. Here they provide residential care for children with a wide range of emotional and behavioural difficulties. George loved the interesting and challenging work there and it was a great learning experience but eventually he moved back to Julie in the North. He joined another residential special school near Market Drayton before moving to the post of deputy head at Clywd Hall School in North Wales. By this time they were married and were delighted to buy their first home on the side of a mountain in the Dee Valley. It was exciting to be in the mountains and to enjoy the outdoor life and George took courses in mountaineering, canoeing and rock climbing and even a judo course in Blackpool. These skills are essential if you are to engage youngsters in the outdoors and he was able to use them extensively then and later.

Still only in his mid twenties, George had made rapid progress. He was always willing and able to move to somewhere different and at 27 he was appointed head of a small school in Knutsford, Cheshire, which served as a reception centre for children taken into care. During his time there, he studied for a year at Liverpool University for a Diploma in Special Education and while on this course he was asked, and agreed, to stand in as head of a girls boarding school on the Wirral. His extensive experience meant that his next move was into the Surrey inspectorate and this time he was able to bring the whole family down, moving into a house in the Glebe. It was a time of change in Special Education and he took great satisfaction in helping to implement new practices and policies. He enjoyed a close relationship with the heads and attended interviews for staff, and chaired all the case conferences for children in every one of the forty-odd specialist schools. He also helped in the integration of these children into the By the late 1980s, the introduction of the National Curriculum meant he gradually lost much of this hands-on work and those creative aspects of the curriculum which he felt were so important and so, in 1989, he decided to take early retirement and move on to other things. Remarkably, along with everything else he did, George had found time to enhance his salary with

occasional work in the evenings. While at the Knutsford school, he trained as an insurance adviser and he continued this in Ewhurst, working with Legal & General based in Guildford and doing much of his training in the old Clavadel Hotel. While they were renovating their present bungalow in the Lower Breache Road, they lived on site with a caravan for the girls and a tent at the back with a long telephone line to the house for his work with clients. Once retired from education, he worked first in marketing for an American pharmaceutical company and then with Age Concern, training staff in the promotion and marketing of their insurance products. After a year or two, he became a national trainer, and worked with a colleague developing training material and delivering the training around the country.

George staged his magic shows throughout his working life. As an inspector, his performances in the special schools were very popular and must surely have had a great impact. His membership of the Magic Circle confirms his expertise and in recent years, working with an ex-colleague friend, he has entertained and raised thousands of pounds for charities and adult groups. There are already two more shows booked locally in the coming months. His other stage presence has been with the Ewhurst Players. He has taken many cameo stage parts but his preference is with directing and he fondly remembers directing their first musical "Oliver" and will be interested to see the imminent repeat performance. He has also been chairman of the Players - and chairman of the Parish Council, the Carnival Committee, the Bowls Club and for ten years chairman of the Ewhurst Charity. Of all these commitments, he is most pleased with his involvement in saving the village school from closure and gives credit to Sue Handley who spearheaded the whole process against the Surrey County Council.

George and Julie's shared interest in walking has taken them all over the world. They have enjoyed many guided walks, particularly in the countries of the Far East, away from the tourist sites, and spending time living in the villages. At home, Julie was able to continue her interest in animals and farming on their smallholding, for many years raising lambs from their flock of ewes. She combined this with her work at Dobbies flower shop, where she was known by everyone in the area and also helped with some Special Needs work at St Nicholas' School. For thirteen years she was Brown Owl for the Ewhurst Brownies. More recently, George admits that his piano lessons were not a success but now he enjoys his twice weekly art classes and painting in his beloved countryside. An active life indeed.






