




how they might be able to contribute to our Parish. We have plans for our future, and we need your help.

Freedom is a powerful word.


RUPERT HARDING REFLECTS ON THE BIGGEST IDEA ON THE PLANET

Generally, freedom means "not being enslaved". However, we all experience this in some form. In democracies, we can speak freely, stand up for ourselves and act with free will. However, we are often enslaved to fame, fortune, careers, creating, in our reality, little choice.

Freedom to act brings consequences that we retain responsibility for. However, during covid-19 lockdown, is this a time to consider the changes we can make to our lives and identify how we want to live in the future: for ourselves, our family, our community and environment, and our God.

Interestingly, early Christians never saw freedom as an opportunity to chase their own dreams.


"For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another." *Galatians 5:13*.



JO MCINNES AND FRIENDS TURN ADVERSITY TO THEIR ADVANTAGE

I started Marathon training back in January, hoping to support Cancer Research in memory of my dad, Stuart Nottage and to get a bit fitter!!

But then, the London Marathon got cancelled. Cue a rollercoaster of tears and emotion, but come the eve of what should have been the greatest run of my life, instead of scoffing pasta and feeling very sick, I was writing twenty three achievement certificates for the most amazing people.

In the week of the cancellation, I had the idea to set up "The 2.6 Incredible Crew" and undertake the 2.6 challenge to support the charities that are losing out during the epidemic. Within days, a team of twenty three friends were joining me in the challenge.

They took on the funniest challenges:

wearing 26 pieces of clothing, eating 26 dry crackers, singing baby shark 26 times while shooting 26 hoops, doing 26 Tik-Tok dances, cleaning 26 windows, and more. Not only this, some of the team ran/walked 6.2 or 2.6 miles and in total we completed the distance of three marathons... as a team!

As if this wasn't enough, we raised \pounds 2,760 in a week for Cancer Research UK, which blows my mind.

I don't have the words to say how I feel or what this "crew" means to me, and all those amazing people that sponsored us, but they certainly changed the lockdown experience for me.

This is a positive time in my life. One I will never forget due to the amazing Ewhurst Spirit, which my dad had been part of for the last 40 years!

A lthough a Londoner born and bred I have been lucky enough to live in the Surrey Hills area for over 40 years.

I'm sure that, like me, others on their daily walks have noticed how abundant and beautiful the wild flowers are this year. Perhaps it was the prolonged period of wet weather from last October to February this year but to me the bluebells have never been better.


Until recently my knowledge of wild flowers has been sadly lacking until one day recently I came across a mobile phone app called Picture This (there are other similar apps!), which can identify any plant or tree from its leaf or blossom.

As well as the usually unpronounceable botanical name, the app tells me the other charming common or country names for each species.

Below you will see a selection of 14 wild flowers which you could find within minutes of your own homes on grass verges and in woodland or copse. I wonder how many you could identify?

Make this business work? Pigs might fly!

SIMON FRASER BRINGS US THE INSPIRING STORY OF PELHAM PUPPETS

J ust before the lockdown, we cleared out our loft. During the process, I came across my collection of Pelham puppets from the 1970s. Here's the history of this short-lived and, briefly,

extremely successful, company.

Bob Pelham was born in 1919 and served in Germany during World War II. While there he started making what he called "wonky donkeys" – springy articulated animals that wriggled about on a plinth. So popular were they, he decided to make them professionally after the war.

grateful when his father sold one of his cars and gave Bob the money. "If you make this business work," he said, "pigs will fly." Bob made a flying pig the new company's logo.

> Bob's puppets were almost entirely recycled. He scavenged scrapyards and adapted anything he could find, including Government Surplus supplies. He once bought 186,000 wooden toggles for £15 (£590) which he cut in half and shaped to create feet.

Success was slow but when Hamley's let him set up a demonstration stand, things took off. By 1954, Bob was

He named the company Wonky Toys and all went well until a larger company claimed they had the rights to the design. Faced with a lawsuit he couldn't afford to fight, Bob stopped production and decided to make string puppets for children instead. Unfortunately, all his money was invested in Wonky Toys, so he was

employing 170 people and making 200 puppets a week.

Despite a disastrous fire in October 1961, the company grew rapidly. By the mid-1960s, they were making over 225,000 puppets a year including numerous licensed characters —59

It's made for playing in groups and there's nothing like burning through a few rounds of "Big Mon" or "Sally Goodin" with some skilled pickers.



S tray kitten Ollie arrived at my Aunt's Cranleigh home - from just where we never knew.


He lived with her, shy but much spoiled and pampered, until she died eight years later.

But he has given so much love to us and his recovery from being lost has inspired my own journey - to never give up or lose hope.





Heroes of the sea

JOSHUA ROOT TELLS HOW HE BECAME AN INSPIRED SUPPORTER OF THE RNLI

M orning in a town called Aldborough, Suffolk, the day before the Aldborough carnival, a weekend of fun and community. A mayday call from a fisherman woke the lifeboat crew in the early hours. He reported a dingy one kilometre adrift offshore with no one aboard. The station launched its all-weather Mersey lifeboat and smaller inflatable D-class lifeboat in response.

After two hours at sea, lifeboats from neighbouring stations Southwold, Lowestoft and Harwich also joined the search. An RAF Sea King helicopter was scrambled to assist, and coastguard teams searched the coastline. The teams carried on in shifts through the night with more emergency services present. But after 46 hours at sea, nine lifeboats and two helicopters were stepped down. The search for survivors was called off.

Two days later police saw two teenage boys tying up a dingy that matched the one from the search. Upon questioning, they admitted doing it as a joke, not realising how serious it had got.

This meant the lifeboat demonstration (the highlight of the carnival) had to be suspended leaving eager supporters, like me, on the beach feeling disappointed. But this rescue inspired my passion for this charity. To realise that these people are volunteers, relying on public donations to fuel and maintain their boats is breathtaking. They are willing to put their lives on the line 365 days a year to save others. And that's what sparked my passion for the RNLI.

I really miss Sunday worship sessions. But to stave off the potential feelings of isolation, how about a bit of mid-week practice and, at the same time, indulge in another passion, some folk music? 

JOHN WHITE INVESTIGATES THE PARISH LINES OF THE PAST


M aps are a passion of mine. I know that sounds rather nerdish but it is thanks to a talented South African geography teacher who sparked my interest in what maps can show us. He taught me how to 'read' a map to envisage the ground in 3D as opposed to the 2D representation on a flat printed surface.

I later became interested in historical maps to show how an area has developed over the years and



particularly how boundaries have changed over the course of time.

Did you know that part of the Willinghurst estate in Shamley Green (Fig 1, where Sir Harry and Lady Secombe lived) was in Ewhurst ecclesiastical parish until the early 1990s? The old Windmill and the Windmill Pub were part of Cranleigh ecclesiastical parish until 1993 before



transferring to Ewhurst. The area now known as Holmbury St Mary was divided between no less than six different civil parishes (one of which is shown in Fig. 2) until 1878. Okewood was part of Wotton until 1880. It's all shown in black and white on Ordnance Survey maps.

Until recently, a visit to a county archive was necessary to inspect historical maps (unless you could afford to purchase them) and now it's so much easier – it's all on the internet and mostly free. That is particularly useful if you are confined to barracks for fear of catching something rather nasty. Now, where was I...?



Doodle Bugs vs The Royal Observer Corps

MIKE BRADY CELEBRATES SMART DEFENCE AGAINST A TERRIFYING WEAPON



T he V1 flying bomb (pictured above), sometimes referred to as the "Doodlebug" or "buzz bomb", was the forerunner of the modern Cruise missile used by the British and American Military in todays conflicts. The German army first launched the V-1s against London on 13 June 1944, one week after (and prompted by) the successful Allied landings in France.

The missile carried a 1900 lb warhead over a distance of 200+ miles and had a distinct engine noise. If the engine suddenly cut out, as the missile flew over, you knew that it was going to hit the ground nearby and explode. If you were wise, you quickly took cover and prayed that it was not going to be near you. The German Army had originally planned to fire V1's at London at the rate of 500 per day.

The Royal Observer Corps was originally formed in 1925 as part of the air defence system. It would consist of 50,000 part-time volunteers operating from posts located approx- -61

Update on restoration at St Peter & St Paul

57— imately 8 miles apart and linked by telephone to various centres, (our nearest being No. 2 Group in Denne Road, Horsham). Their task would be to visually track hostiles once they had crossed the coast and were now behind the Radar screen.

In 1941, the Corps, during the Battle of Britain, became known as the "eyes and

ears" of the RAF and was granted the title "Royal" by King George VI for its excellent service in guiding Fighter Command's Spitfires and Hurricanes onto many unfriendly Germans acting in a very hostile manner.

By 1944, the Corps had become uniformed and highly effective in its allotted task and defences generally had become very effective, with a belt of anti-aircraft guns now located on the coast. Behind this would be clear airspace for Fighter Command to roam freely without the risk of "blue on blue" friendly fire incidents.

The first V1 attack took place one week after D-Day on 13th June when they were seen by an Royal Observer Command post at Dymchurch. Their coordinates were passed onto the centre at Horsham. All transmitted messages regarding the V1s were prefixed with the priority code word "Diver"

The attacks by the V1's would continue until march 1945. Of the 6,725 V1s launched against England, 2,420 fell on London killing 6,000 civilians, injuring a further 18,000 and causing considerable damage. However, the anti-aircraft guns would destroy 1,859 V1s and Fighter Command would account for a further 1,771.


