
A New Editor for News and Views

Bethlehem: Meeting point or starting point?

One of the joys of Parish Ministry for me is the variety of people whom I meet, in School, the Café, the Parent and Toddler Group, Rainbows, in the Old Rectory or the Glebe Centre, the meetings we have and of course when people come to the Services and we are together as a community of people with God. So this season of Advent which looks forward in hope to Christmas and is a time of waiting together is, I think, my favourite time of year.

Beginning on Advent Sunday our Crib figures of Mary, Joseph and the donkey begin their journey around the village to those who offer hospitality as 'Innkeepers' and with our Advent Carol Service begin our journey towards Christmas. Next we have the Christingle Service and School Candle lit Service, the Service of Nine Lessons and Carols all marking off the weeks as we move towards Christmas and the coming of the Christ Child, God in human form. These events begin each new year of the Church with the expectation and hope of New Life in the birth of a baby. The year develops with hearing week by week, of the life and teaching of Jesus as we journey on.

The particular place where Jesus was born was defined by the simple act of compassion and hospitality of the Innkeeper, and his stable became the place where many people met Jesus. They had travelled to the place where Jesus was born; Mary and Joseph of course, then the Shepherds, and later the Three Wise Men.

Each of these people had received their own message from God, Mary met an Angel, Joseph met God in his dream, the Shepherds heard and saw Angels, the Wise Men followed their knowledge of the Stars and ancient prophecies.

As I write this, the clocks have recently gone back, the evenings are darker and I realise that we are well into autumn even if the temperature could persuade us that it's September not the end of October. This is a time of year when I'm told we have the best light for photography and certainly the autumn colours have a special magic. It is not only in England where the colours are photogenic. Unni and I have just returned from three weeks in Virginia with my cousins and there the "fall season" is one in which the natural colours are particularly brilliant. However they too have had some unseasonal weather. In Williamsburg in the middle of October, the temperature was in the low 80s (that's the high 20sC for younger readers). It's now nearer 50F or 10C.

America's fall season also heralds an outpouring of interest in things supernatural. Halloween is an important commercial festival with shops and houses trying to outdo each other with displays of ghosts and pumpkins. In Virginia there are even council organised trick-or-treat parades. Halloween is associated with the powers of darkness and is often linked with the devil or Satan. The souls of the dead were supposed to revisit their homes on this day and the ancient Celtic festival that took place on October 31st acquired sinister significance, with ghosts, witches, goblins, black cats, fairies and demons of all kinds said to be roaming about. It was the time to placate the supernatural powers controlling the processes of nature.

Because it is also the day before All Saints Day, the two festivals became linked. The devil or Satan was believed by some to have been cast out before the Christian celebration of All Saints Day. Whatever its history, the powers of darkness are indeed put aside with the light and guidance given to us by the Christian saints. That is why our church celebrated the Light of Christ at the end of October as a Christian alternative to Halloween.

And, talking of darkness and light, by the time you read this the nights will be even darker and we will be closer to that special celebration in the middle of our winter, the Birth of Jesus.

As the days get shorter and the nights longer, there appears in the shops a multitude of coloured lights – not to mention brightly coloured cards, wrapping paper and lots of sparkly gifts. Even in the streets, decorative lights are going up. We will be only a few weeks away from one of the

two most important festivals in the Christian calendar - the celebration of the birth of Christ (the other is Easter in case you were wondering). Unfortunately, the reason we celebrate Christmas seems to get lost in the commercialism of a mid-winter holiday. Of course it is a good excuse for families to get together and exchange gifts and an opportunity to send good wishes to those family and friends who we only see from time to time – if at all. Of course it is great fun for the children to receive gifts from Father Christmas. But let us not forget why we are celebrating. Over 2000 years ago in a distant land, there was born a little baby named Jesus who was sent to this world, to us, to be a light that we can follow. A light to lighten our way – whether it is in the middle of winter or the height of summer. Let's enjoy the fun and the presents and all the joy of Christmas but let us not forget that little baby and all that He did for us.

NORMAN MANNING

Norman Manning was born on 5th March 1925 in Ealing, West London to Ivy and Arthur. Norman attended Ealing Central School where he became a talented chorister who sang a solo once at St. Paul's Cathedral.

On leaving school, Norman was apprenticed as an instrument maker at Evershed and Vignoles in the field of electrical mechanical instruments made for the Navy. As a teenager, Norman was in The Home Guard and when off duty he spent many hours cycling around Britain and Europe. His other love was distance running with Thames Valley Harriers and even carried the Olympic Torch prior to the 1948 Olympic Games. By that time, Norman had joined the Coldstream Guards and was posted to Palestine and even carried out duties at Buckingham Palace.

On leaving the army he began working as a technician with CEGB Laboratories in Leatherhead . Norman married Edna, the love of his life, and the couple moved to Ewhurst in the early 70's to Rose Cottage on Deblins Green. In 1971 Norman and Edna welcomed Richard into their world. Richard was born with Downs



Syndrome and in recent years has been diagnosed also with Aspergers.

In Ewhurst Norman was a faithful member of the Church, both St. Peter and St. Paul and also the Baptist Church; a set builder for the Ewhurst Players; a member of the History Society.

Norman was moved into care in Godalming before being transferred to Godstone to be closer to Richard. Sadly at the end of September he developed pneumonia and died in East Surrey Hospital on 29th September 2014. I, and many others, will miss him greatly.

We are fortunate in this village to have two churches, which though different in certain respects of tradition, share a desire for a joint witness to the Christian gospel, a message of peace, hope and joy not just for Christmas but for three hundred and sixty-five days of the year.

In relation to this joint witness I would particularly bring your attention to the Village Christmas Lunch which is for all village residents, particularly those who would otherwise spend Christmas on their own. If you know of neighbours or friends who would benefit from an invite please do bring it to their attention.

Christmas is known as the season of "peace and goodwill" coming from the angels who announced the news of the birth of Jesus to working men, shepherds, tending their sheep in the fields one dark night. The message the angels declared is one of "good news" and "great joy" for "all people". ^(Luke2:10)

We can probably relate to the news of the birth of a child being one of good news at which the parents and family often feel a sense of great joy as they are struck with amazement at the wonder and frailty of new life. And a new life is good news to a family; that family can see the potential of future generations, the joy of seeing a child grow up through the good and bad times and hopefully into fruitful adult hood. But the difference with the birth of Jesus was that it wasn't just good news of great joy for Mary and Joseph but instead for "all people". Such a statement includes not just a family but extends through you and I into our community, nation and our wonderfully beautiful but oh so troubled and fragile world.

In the birth of Jesus a saviour was born, one foretold in ancient writings who would become the way to God for all people. The Christian message, the gospel is good news of great joy to all people because it heralds the coming of this person who is able to reconnect our broken humanity to the living God. Something we cannot do for ourselves but which we can receive by accepting Jesus through faith, simply put, just trusting that God is good to His word.

This is surely good news of great joy, that we can live in a relationship of faith with God even in our present existence. That we can stop trying to be so controlling, by fooling ourselves that we are in charge. We don't need to be forever looking for something solid and dependable in what is fundamentally the ephemeral nature of this world.

This is good news of great joy for all people and that includes you and me. This message is simply received by faith, faith in God's word, faith in who Jesus was and is, not by our particular religious observance, our dances or dirges. The Christian's faith is not in the Church, it is in Christ Jesus its Lord and Saviour.

I hope and pray that we all might step closer this Christmas in our insight of the Christian hope in our own lives and families this Christmas time.

From all at Ewhurst Baptist Church, we wish you a joyful Christmas.

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



In Our Midst ~ Capt Colin M C Stewart

Master Mariner, R.N.R., L.V.O.

Colin and Rosemary came to Ewhurst in 1978 from America via Yorkshire. He has served our community in both school and church having spent twenty years on the Board of Governors at Ewhurst Infant School and even longer on the PCC with the last seventeen years as one of our two churchwardens. His wisdom and pragmatism come from, in his words, "Forty years as a sailor who never had help on hand". All this comes after what would seem to most people as two full time careers.



Born in Buckinghamshire, Colin describes himself as something of a services gypsy. His father was a career officer in an administrative capacity with RAF medical services at home and abroad. After being injured on active service in Sicily he was eventually repatriated at end of war to work for the Air Ministry. Among other places, the family lived at RAF camps Halton and Benson and Colin was educated at Amersham and London. In spite of his interest in flying, his father dissuaded him from thoughts of entering the RAF as a pilot since, with missiles being introduced, he thought the future of fighter pilots was likely to be limited. After considering flying with the Navy, a sub-mariner uncle suggested that he might look at a career in the Merchant Navy whilst also taking a commission with the Royal Naval Reserves with the chance to have some flying. A choice of a long-term career in either Navy would then be possible at a later date.

In the early 1950s the Shell Oil Company operated a fleet larger than P&O, Cunard and several other smaller carriers put together. Furthermore these ships were used not just as carriers in their own right, but were a utility for the main business of oil and gas production and all that that involved. After a successful interview Colin was indentured as a cadet to the ship operating company within the Shell Group UK, to follow the four year training course based at the King Edward VII Nautical College in London. He also maintained a connection with the Royal Naval Reserves.

It was clear that Cadet Stewart had exactly the aptitude and work ethic necessary for this life. Training comprised a total of three years at sea with the remainder on shore and on passing out he was awarded the company sextant as top cadet of the three thousand cadets that year. The career structure and man management at Shell was excellent Colin says. He was brought ashore for assessment at every rank .

from a cadet going to the Schoolboys Own Exhibition as part of the Shell team to specific projects set at both second and chief officer ranks. Performance in these projects indicated whether a person had the potential for higher management positions within the shore-based company and it was clear that Colin was such a person. At the age of 30 he was selected for fast track promotion to master and as a result was appointed to his first command at the age of thirty three, five years ahead of the average at thirty eight. To do this however, he had to commit to reduce his activities with the RNR as the company did not like officers having to spend long periods training with the Navy. At 35, after the required two years command experience at sea, he joined the company at head office in London's Shell Centre, the headquarters of both technical and commercial marine activity worldwide.

And so began more than twenty years of frenetic work as a principal manager of a fleet of ships in Shell. The newly emerging oil facility in Nigeria was his first posting followed by projects all over the world in which Shell had an interest. When seconded to operating companies he would often be the only senior mariner on the spot and the sole representative of the company. I have a little knowledge about almost everywhere but a detailed knowledge of almost nowhere he says. Projects involving operating helicopters with oil tankers, buying and operating hovercraft in Singapore Harbour and, in his final four years, as Director responsible for Port Operations and Projects Worldwide were some of things he mentioned about his working life. In this last position he calculated that he spent 123 days of one year in foreign travel.

This demanding schedule came to an end with retirement from Shell in 1994 and allowed him to begin what I am calling his second career. Years before, he was flattered to be asked to join Corporation of Trinity House, the navigational authority of the UK, and accepting this he had become one of 350 "Younger Brothers" of the Corporation, all of master mariner rank or equivalent. In 1993 he had the honour to be appointed an "Elder Brother", one of thirty one chosen to act as advisors, presided over by the Master who in Colin's time was the Duke of Edinburgh, the present Master being the Princess Royal. Colin's first position was to commission and run a Cadet Scholarship Scheme and in seven years, 200 top cadets were awarded sponsorships. It was very rewarding work he says.

At seventy, Colin was required to retire his position as Senior Warden, and was honoured by the Queen with the Lieutenant of the Victorian Order in the 2006 Birthday Honours list for his direct services to her husband as Assistant of the Corporation of Trinity House. These days the time commitment is not so great but he still maintains an office at Trinity House as a Member of the Court and is a trustee of the


the Dreadnought Seamen's Hospital in Walmer, Kent. The Court meets four



times a year and he has supported the Master on official duties at various ceremonies. In October this year, as every year, he very much enjoyed the annual Seafarers Service at St Paul's Cathedral followed by a Trinity House reception at the Guildhall where the Lord Mayor received them with the Princess Royal in attendance.

After such a high profile and full working life we are indeed fortunate that Colin continues to give of his time and expertise to life in Ewhurst.

LOCAL HISTORY CORNER by Janet Balchin

Ewhurst in the Great War – on-line war diary

To mark the 100th anniversary of the First World War, I am researching what happened in Ewhurst and how it affected local people. I shall be reporting events chronologically in the form of monthly 'Bulletins' which will be posted on the new Ewhurst History Society website - www.ewhursthistory.com This article summarises events from the first four months of the war.



Ewhurst in the Great War 1914—1918

On Wednesday 29th July 1914, the 34th Ewhurst Cottager's Flower, Fruit and Vegetable Show, was held at High Edser. One of the highlights of the village year, this was always an event to look forward to, but in July 1914 it would have been overshadowed by the worsening international situation.

Less than a week later, on the 4th August, War was declared and the village and its inhabitants were plunged into the turmoil of events that changed the course of history.

Reserve soldiers were immediately recalled to join their units. Among the Ewhurst men who were recalled were William Rose, Frederick Aylwin and Frank Sellings.

In the first few days of the war, thousands of horses were requisitioned. Although the Surrey Advertiser carried general reports of horses being taken, I have not been able to find any specific Ewhurst examples, but as a farming community this must have hit the parish hard.

Lord Kitchener was appointed Secretary of State for War 6th August and the next day, 7th August called for men aged 19 - 30 to volunteer. The Parish was swift in its response to the call and a meeting was arranged for the evening of the same day. This was before the advent of radio, let alone TV or the Internet, but word travelled quickly in the close knit community. The following day, the Surrey Advertiser reported - "In view of the Country's need in the present state of war, a meeting was convened at Ewhurst Church Hall last evening for men over 17 years of age."

A recruiting station was opened in the sub branch of the Capital and Counties Bank premises opposite the school [now Mount Cottage] and the first batch of recruits left the village on Wednesday 2nd September. The School log book records - "*The registers were marked this afternoon five minutes earlier, and all classes were taken out by their respective teachers until 1.50 to give a send-off to the local recruits who left the village in a body today.*"

The 1911 census for Ewhurst suggests that by 1914 there were probably around 96 men aged 19 - 30 living in the parish. By October 1914, 78 men with

Ewhurst connections were listed as serving in the Parish Magazine, and the list was pinned to the church door. It should be noted that some of these men on the list would have been older than 30 and some had Ewhurst 'connections' rather than actual residency, but never the less it represents a very large proportion at such an early stage in the war. The Surrey Advertiser reported on Saturday September 19th 1914 - "BRAVO EWHURST – The last batch of recruits left the village on Monday for Guildford. So great has been the response to the appeals of the recruiters that it is said that there are now no eligible men left in the village."

Villagers rallied round to help in whatever way they could. The Surrey Advertiser reported that "A largely well attended meeting was held at the Ewhurst Church Hall on Tuesday, [11th August] when nearly everyone present promised to assist in making garments for the troops. Working parties will meet twice a week at the Church Hall."

Working parties in villages and towns across the country were also organised by the Red Cross and in Ewhurst their efforts were co-ordinated by George Johnston of Garlands. The Parish Magazine reported that "An earnest appeal was made to Mr G Johnston by Captain C Bennett (of Westlands) for assistance to his men of the 4th East Surrey Regt. has most kindly been responded to. He said that the recruits were very short of shirts and socks. Mr Johnston has been able to send the following garments: 56 shirts, 53 pairs of socks, 8 vests, and 8 pants, total 125 articles."


It was realized that the outbreak of war would cause severe hardship to many. On 7th August 1914, H.R.H. the Prince of Wales made an urgent appeal in The Times calling for a National Relief Fund and the Surrey Advertiser reported that "The Ewhurst Band gave a performance on Saturday night when a collection was made for the Prince of Wales Fund raising £6."

The village also started a local relief fund. A meeting of the Ewhurst War Relief Fund was held at the Church Hall on August 29th and it was resolved that 5/- would be paid weekly to the families of serving men during the War.

Large numbers of Belgian refuges came to Surrey and the several families were put up in Ewhurst; the Bellot and Bageard families from Brussels were staying at Woodland; the Josson family at Lilyshaw; the Guissen family, from Malines, were at Long Copse; and the Cuypers, also from Malines were at Magalee. The children were registered at the village school.

On the 26th September 1914, Frederick Aylwin became the first Ewhurst man to die in the fighting. Frederick, a former regular, had been working as a barman at the Bulls Head at the outbreak of war. As a Reserve with the South Wales Borderers, he had been immediately mobilised and had arrived in France on 13th August. He had been involved in the attack and retreat from Mons and in September was fighting in the Battle of the Aisne, when he was Killed in Action. His body was not recovered.

Ewhurst suffered two more casualties in the First Battle of Ypres. On the 2nd contd

November Rifleman Charles George Barnett of the King's Royal Rifle Corps was reported Killed in Action on the Menin Road; and Private Timothy Benjamin Woodley of the Border Regiment, who had been wounded, succumbed to his wounds on the 29th November, at Wimereux hospital. Of the 72 names on the list pinned to the church door, three had fallen in the first four months of the war.

At Christmas, gifts were received from the United States for the children of men who were listed as killed or missing, and for the Belgian refugee children. The Canadian Government sent potatoes and flour, of which Ewhurst's share was three sacks of potatoes and one (98lbs) of flour. Local people also contributed gifts including Mr Sadler, a farmer from Ellens Green, who gave potatoes and apples for distribution. The Church Christmas day offerings were used to pay for a Christmas lunch for the Belgian families.






