ST PETER AND ST PAUL'S CHURCH



I was reminded the other day about "tradition" in context of the church. It got me thinking about why we do certain things at certain times and why there is often resistance to change. There's nothing wrong with tradition – nor is there anything wrong with change. It's just that the two are often incompatible. We should not forget that many things now regarded as "traditional" were once "radical".

It was reported that some time ago The Queen commented to a long standing church member that he must have seen a lot of changes in his time. His reply (allegedly) was "Yes, ma'am – and I have opposed every one of them". We live in changing times but every generation can say the same thing. It does seem to be true however that the world is changing faster now than it was in the past.

I recall that when I first came to Ewhurst Church in the early eighties, no woman was permitted to assist at the communion, let alone preside at a communion service. Nowadays, such discrimination would be regarded as unthinkable. Women priests and even bishops are now accepted by most as a normal part of the Church of England. Who would have thought that just one generation ago?

Forty years ago almost all our services were based on a prayer book originally written over 400 years earlier. There was debate about the introduction of the then radical Alternative Service Book which we began to use for a couple of services each month. The majority of services still used the old prayer book. Since then, the alternative services have themselves been superseded by Common Worship which is now the basis for most main services not only in this parish but also in the wider Anglican church.

Looking back into history, at the time of the introduction of the Book of Common Prayer, I imagine that there were those who were horrified at the thought of having to use language that the ordinary people could understand – previously most services had been in Latin. The poetic language of the prayer book is something with which I and most of my contemporaries grew up. Times have changed and if we want more people to come to church and get to know God we have to conduct our praise in a way that is meaningful to them. They are the future of the church. Other traditions are changing also. For over 800 years, the church in Ewhurst has been the centre of worship for the parish. Now our parish contains two parish churches – St Peter and St Paul Ewhurst and St John the Baptist Okewood – together with a "daughter" church at Forest Green. The traditional pattern of services may well change in all three churches so that we can utilise our combined ministry – both ordained and lay – in a way that makes best use of our resources. And last, but certainly no means least, a new rector will bring his or her talents and ideas to take forward the ministry in our new parish of Ewhurst with Okewood and Forest Green within this ever changing world.

I pray that we work together to embrace these changes, even if they feel uncomfortable at times, whilst hanging onto the one tradition that will not change - that is our worship of God.

Churchwardens' Report

As you have probably heard, we became the parish of Ewhurst with Okewood and Forest Green on 1st Januray 2018, so a new era begins for our church and village. However, there will not be much noticeable change for a while as, with the churches of Okewood and Forest Green, we have yet to appoint a Rector to lead the new parish. The advertisement for a new rector has been sent to the Diocese and hopefully interviews will be held at the end of February/early March. Once an appointment is made, there is usually a three month "changeover" period for the new rector, so we are unlikely to have anyone in post before June/July. The new Rector will reside at Ewhurst Rectory which has been re-decorated in readiness and the hedges reduced to make the Rectory as welcoming as possible.

The churchwardens are continuing to work out details as to how the churches will come together but for now, services will continue as they are. We have been able to continue our ministry thanks to the commitment of_our own 'team' with the support_of Rev'd Rosemary Mason and the Cranleigh Clergy Team.

There are two important church meetings that everyone in the village is invited to attend:

• The Final Parochial Church Meeting of Ewhurst Parish will be held on Tuesday 6th March at 7.30pm for 8pm in the Wilson Room.

This will be a final review of the work of Ewhurst PCC up to the end of 2017.

We plan to celebrate all it has achieved this year.

• An Inaugural Parochial Church Meeting of Ewhurst with Okewood and Forest Green will be held on Tuesday 20th March at 7pm for 8pm in the Wilson Room.

We will use the first hour for people from the three churches to get to know each other with the formal meeting starting at 8 pm.

The main purpose of this meeting is to elect the new PCC members and churchwardens who will lead the new parish. If you are already on Ewhurst Church Electoral Roll you are automatically able to vote. If you are not on the Roll, you need to apply before **Sunday 4th March**. Forms for this will be at the back of the church early in February, as well as Nomination Forms for the posts mentioned.

More information about this will be on the pew sheet and the church website.

Last, but not least, Jackie and I would like to thank everyone who helps with the many jobs associated with the smooth running of our church and the opportunities it offers to our village community.

Our lovely old church is very special but it is the people who are part of it that give it life.



This means the most vulnerable workers are suffering.

Help us fill a container for orphans in Africa

Ewhurst residents, Andy and Penny Curwell are regular visitors to Malawi which is said to be the poorest country in Africa. They support the work of Kondanani, an orphanage and children's rehabilitation clinic that is making a huge difference in the community around Blantyre. The Curwells are trustees of Kondanani UK and will soon be sending a container of much-needed supplies to Africa.

"Malawi has a population of 12 million people, of which 1-million are orphans," says Andy, "There is tremendous need, some of which can be easily met by collecting items that we no longer use. So, we appeal to our neighbours in Surrey for children's clothing, bicycles and toys. Kondanani is also building a paediatric community hospital and needs medical and dental equipment and supplies."

Kondanani was founded in Malawi in 1998, by Annie Chikhwaza who has become known as 'Mother of Malawi' for providing 'an Oasis of Love in a nation of orphans'. Her biography of the same title, by Al Gibson is available on Amazon. The Curwells also have copies for those who would like to read Annie's remarkable story. She started with one little baby, living with HIV/ AIDs and now has over 180 children in her care. Once attacked and left for dead, she has created a place of life and hope out of a situation of death and despair.

RING IN THE NEW

A coach party from the village visited the John Taylor & Co bellfoundry in Loughborough last week to see their two new church bells being cast. This is the only bellfoundry left in UK and is the largest in the world. It was a fascinating experience and rather like going back in time as the foundry was built in 1859 and has had limited modernisation. The two new bells will weigh approximately 200 Kg and 300 Kg and will replace the two oldest bells which date back to the 15th century and are amongst the oldest in Surrey. The old bells will be hung in the bell tower as relics. The bell restoration project to replace the two oldest bells and restore the other six bells at the Norman church of St Peter & St Paul in Ewhurst has received great support from the village and has raised over £50,000, with half coming from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

One of the new bells is dedicated to the memory of Douglas May who was a very prominent and much loved bellringer in Ewhurst and the Guildford district. His widow, Jackie May, went on the trip to witness the bell being cast.

Work to remove the bells started on the 29th January and there will be no clock chimes until mid-March whilst the bells are taken out and restored. Volunteers have been cleaning the tower and repainting the bell frame in preparation and will assist with the removal and rehanging.

All the eight bells will be taken to the foundry for restoration and will be returned on Friday 9th March, along with the new bells. The returning ten bells will be placed in the church for visitors to view over the weekend and then work commences on the 12th March to rehang them. There will be a combined Mothering Sunday and Bell Dedication service at 10.30am on Sunday 11th March with the Right Reverend Jo Wells, Bishop of Dorking, in attendance. There will be celebratory drinks and snacks afterwards. Everybody is welcome so please do come along and see them.

LOCAL HISTORY CORNER, by Janet Balchin Ewhurst Church Bells

This summer Ewhurst will have two new bells to replace the 5 and the 6, which are two of the oldest bells in Surrey, from before the Reformation. They date from the 15^{th} century and were cast at the Wokingham Foundry, which was in operation from 1350 - 1495. Both bells bear the 'lion's head' stamp and one, the 6, also has the shield of Roger Landen, who was mentioned in Eton College Accounts for 1448.

Ewhurst church is dedicated to St Peter and St Paul, but there does not appear to be any reference to St Paul in pre-Reformation records, only St Peter. One bell, the 5, is dedicated to Saint Peter and inscribed '*Sancte Petre Or*' and the other to Saint John, '*Sacte Iohannis ora pro nobis*'. (St John pray for us)

The earliest reference to the bells is found in the will of John Tyknar who died in 1532 and left 1 shilling for the repair of the bells of Ewhurst.

In 1552, during the reign of Edward VI, commissioners were appointed to make inventories of all manner of 'goodes, plate, juells, vestyments, bells and other ornyments within every paryshe belonging or in any wyse apperteying to any churche, chapell, brotherhed, gylde or fraternytye within this our realme of Englond'. The return for Ewhurst shows the church to be quite poor. There was no silver plate; the cross and candlesticks were made of lattyn (an alloy similar to brass) and several items were described as 'old'. But the first item listed is "iiij [four] bells in the steple." These would be the two Wokingham bells and two others.

The two heaviest bells, 8 cwt and 11 cwt (the tenor), were cast in 1671 by William Eldridge of Chertsey and both bear the inscription 'WILLIAM ELDRIDGE MADE MEE 1671'. The Eldridge family had been in business with the Wokingham foundry in the 16th century and then set up a foundry in Chertsey at the beginning of the 17th century.

In 1836 alarming cracks appeared in the walls of the church and it was found necessary to carry out underpinning work to the tower. Work progressed through the summer of 1837, but in the middle of June disaster struck. The rector, Rev Charles Augustus Steuart later recorded *"By the middle of June 1837 the said works were in a forward state, but the tower and spire then fell and carried away the roofs of the N. Transept & Chancel and a great part of the summer of the summer*

Walls." Presumably the bells had been removed from the tower prior to starting the work or they would have been destroyed in the collapse. Plans for a new tower and chancel were drawn up by the architect, Robert Ebbels, and the rebuilding and repairs were completed in 1838. Then, in 1839, two new bells cast by Thomas Mears at the Whitechapel Foundry were hung in the newly rebuilt tower.

One hundred years later, the peal was increased to eight with the addition of two new trebles, a gift from Arthur Shaw Wills, of High Wykehurst, in memory of his wife Hilda. Arthur Wills was related to the Bristol tobacco company family, but had actually made his career as a civil engineer. The two new bells were cast by John Taylor of Loughborough, in 1938 and the two 1839 bells were recast at the same time.

Bell ringing has long been a popular pastime but from the end of the 19th century became more organised and The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers was founded in 1891. The first peal was rung at Ewhurst in 1906, but the first to be rung by an entirely local band took place in 1913. This band included a lady ringer, Fanny Whittington.

Peals were also rung for special occasions such as weddings. On 5th September 1912 the Ewhurst band rang for the wedding of their fellow band member John Luff. Peels were also rung on Armistice Day 1918, VE Day and VJ Day 1945.

EWHURST LEAP

Ewhurst LEAP ("Local Environment Action People") are a small group of villagers that enjoy meeting roughly once a month on a Saturday morning to improve the environment around the civil parish. Our website www.<u>EwhurstLEAP.org.uk</u> lists some of the things we do, and the blog on the website describes our latest 'outings'.

In the last few years we have started working on the pond opposite the Village Hall. Until a few years ago the area was overgrown and needed some help, so with the agreement of the Parish Council, who own it, we stepped in to tidy it up.

We knew we had to take care to minimise any disturbance to wildlife in and around the pond, especially Great Crested Newts, a protected species found in many other local ponds and very likely to use this one too. After taking advice LEAP now performs a yearly tidy up in early autumn, after any newts that have used the pond over the summer have left. To minimise unwanted brambles and tree saplings, all the surroundings are cut back as the wildflowers have finished flowering (except the Michaelmas Daisies, which we leave until later into the



autumn). We also borrow the Cranleigh Conservation Volunteers' waders to get in the deep end! This is to remove the sedge and other water plants to leave more open water.

There are many animals using wildlife ponds at all times of the year so we were advised to clear only one third of the pond in

any one year, but in practice we only manage about a quarter on a four year rotation. As you can imagine this generates a lot of 'green' material to be disposed of. We leave it on the pond bank at the back (away from the road) for a month to let any creatures return to the pond, then take it to a nearby compost heap.

Because of the risk of spreading unwanted or invasive species, pond material is considered contaminated waste and the local councils are unable to take it.

After leaving it for a year the pond is somewhat overgrown and we do it all over



again. Considering the improvement this has made, it is not bad work for a small band of people in just two mornings!



The taking over of The Glebe Centre by the Parish Council, rather than being run by Waverley Borough Council, is in progress. This meeting will be to set up a Committee to oversee its use and in particular act as booking Clerk. EWHURST PARISH COUNCIL

The Waverley Borough Local Plan Part 1: Strategic Policies and Sites, (focuses on the local issues and priorities; where development should be located) and which will guide and direct new development in the Borough for the period up to 2032 was formally adopted by the Council on Tuesday 20 February. The adoption of the new up-to-date Plan should bring greater certainty to decision making and lessen the risk of appeals. Henning is doing his best with the Neighbourhood Plan and to be honest we are probably further on than any other Parish except Farnham and that's not working out too well.

We think that our position as a Parish Council is to oppose *any large* development until the NP is adopted and development occurs where the villagers want it. To that end we've been relatively successful:

- Penlan turned down at Committee and at Appeal,
- Gadbridge Lane refused at Committee,
- Firethorn refused at Committee,
- Backward Point refused at Committee but subsequently allowed by an Inspector who is *completely independent*,
- Chanrossa. Application for 23 houses refused. Second application for 18 houses approved by Officers *under Delegated Powers*. Subsequently the developer went to Appeal on the 23 houses. Awaiting Appeal decision,
- Bulls Head (original app.) refused at Committee. Amended application forthcoming,
- Pennings refused at Committee and at Appeal


Of course we have further battles to fight on all of these but we are putting up good arguments and our success rate at Waverley planning committees *where we can influence the decision makers to most effect* is exceptional, especially if you compare us to Cranleigh for example. Also, bear in mind that we don't enjoy the protection that Green Belt designation offers in the vast majority of our Parish. So it would be incorrect for the community to think that we are sitting on our hands and letting this happen. We are working hard and will continue to do so.

We encourage villagers to **attend Parish Council and/or Planning Meetings** to voice *their* concerns and offer support as small numbers have started to do. Very few people bother to voice their feelings on the Waverley Planning web site and as a result Waverley planning committees get the impression that we don't really care what they would impose on us. We need, therefore, to concentrate our fire on Firethorn and The Bulls Head for now, followed by Gadbridge Lane and Penlan. More information at http://planning360.waverley.gov.uk/planning.

In Our Midst - Dick Elms Dedicated Craftsman

Dick and his business partner John have been trading in the village for 42 years. As Roser and Elms they have run their joinery workshops in Williams Close in such a quiet and unobtrusive way that many people will not know they are there. Apart from the occasional problem with parked cars by the entrance, it is a very convenient place to work and lorries bringing in the raw materials and taking the finished products away can come and go without notice. Time to put them on the map.



The Elms family have been in the area for a very long time. Dick's wife, Jenny, has found them recorded in Cranleigh in the seventeenth century and in Ewhurst soon after. Both Dick and his father were born in Peaslake, his grandfather had moved there from Holmbury in 1906 and like their father, he and his older brother attended Peaslake School. Dick particularly remembers lunchtimes in the canteen across the road with its roaring fire and where you had to slide down a slippery grass bank to get there. Great fun, but a big improvement when the steps were put in.

All the men in his family were practical. His grandfather had been a bricklayer, his uncle a plumber and his father was an engineer toolmaker at a works in Shalford. After finishing secondary school in Chilworth, Dick followed his brother to work as a carpenter. He started with a five year apprenticeship at F W Woods at Little London above Shere, which considering its rural situation, was a large concern with about thirty people covering all the building trades. It was here that he first worked with John Roser's father, Jeff, who subsequently set up his own business at South Holmwood near Dorking and when his five year period finished, Dick joined him there. At 16, he had bought a motorbike and soon had a car at 17 so travelling around was not a problem. In the evenings he and his friends would tour the local youth clubs to meet all the girls. He met Jenny at Albury where she lived with her family at Brook near Little London in a cottage of the farm where her father worked. The farmer also ran the shop next door but that has long gone.

With an eye to buying a house and getting married, Dick took the opportunity to

earn more money working as a self-employed fitter on the large housing development in Cranleigh which was to become Hitherwood. With his friend Peter Tugwell from Peaslake, they made a good second fixing team, fitting the kitchens, hanging all the doors and fixing the skirting boards and architraving. Each house would take 3 or 4 days to finish and in this way they could earn £50 - £60 a week. A lot of money in those days. At 22 he had bought a house from Mr Weller on Ewhurst Green and after nearly a year doing it up he and Jenny were married and moved in there. At the same time Dick finished on the sites and rejoined Jeff Roser and John, now in Dorking. He had known John since school days at Tillingbourne and after a few years they decided to have a go on their own as a partnership. Their chance came in 1976 when they were attending the closing down sale of stock at Bicknell's builders yard in Williams Close. Dick asked what they intended to do with the property and son Brian Bicknell agreed to rent it to them on a seven year lease, after which time they were able to buy it outright.

Originally Bicknell's yard went through to their offices in Mapledrakes Road and opposite Joe Edwards' garage which was a useful place to buy bags of cement and other bits and pieces. Over the years Dick and John have extended the original single workshop by converting the old garage at the side and adding another workspace at the back. They have also gradually replaced the machinery with more modern gear and now Dick says, only one morticer dates from the original Bicknell stock. New machines are so expensive to buy that in order to make it pay, businesses have to specialise, producing just the one product over and over. There are plenty doing this and it is to these that the developers turn when fitting out new housing estates. They have always preferred to cover every aspect of woodwork in the trade, making everything and anything as required, cupboards, windows, staircases, and their ability to do this and make patterns to match the existing gives them the edge over the competition and great satisfaction on completion. Their customer base is divided about equally between the smaller building firms and private individuals, many coming via personal recommendation. When a tree fell through a large garage annex in Peaslake, to rebuild it, they were able to make and replace everything, the roof, the flooring, windows and fittings. For the same owner they gutted and refurbished a converted barn on his property in Cornwall. The roof was taken off leaving just the four walls; a new roof was cut and fixed then the joinery was made in Ewhurst then fitted on site. A very successful and satisfying result.

Global trade and the internet have had a large impact on the business. Customers are able to do their research thoroughly and they come with a very clear idea of what is available, what they want and exactly how much they expect to pay for it. In order to compete, prices have to be reduced to an absolute minimum and the finished product must be similar to what is available from the mainly foreign imports. For example, in the past they made just the wooden window frame and glaziers fitted the glass on site; now windows must be supplied already fitted with double glazed units and fully primed or with finish coat. At present there are still plenty of people looking for the products they make and the skills which they have.

In the early 1980s, Dick and Jenny moved with their son Barry to their present home, a smallholding in Walliswood, and with Jenny's parents' live-in help they were able to run it as a small farm with cattle and chickens. Now they are happy that Barry and his own family live nearby and he and John's son Robert continue to work with their fathers in the business as they have done since leaving school. We can hope then, that, even in these uncertain times, the name of Roser & Elms will continue to be part of the village.






