





ST PETER AND ST PAUL'S CHURCH



Church communities may not be as large or as influential these days as they once were, but in a society where people prefer to act as individuals Church leaders are seen often as Community Representatives – and that is part of what I do as Rector in Ewhurst – I represent a small but significant group of people who identify themselves in some way with Church and Parish, and hopefully others accept that and allow me to represent them too, in a broader way.

Some years ago a previous Government felt that it was important to 'listen to' communities more carefully, and in particular, to engage with 'faith groups'. I think their fear was that we faith leaders were 'radicalising' our youth. Which sounds a little extreme in a Ewhurst context, but anyway it led to local Government seeking ways of speaking specifically with faith leaders.

Not all Councils take this seriously, but Waverley Borough have gone to considerable length over the last few years to develop a quarterly gathering of faith leaders of all flavours from around the Borough in a setting where we can hear from and engage with Council Officers. I was invited to represent the Cranleigh Deanery of the Church of England on that body. Now it all sounds a bit – worthy I guess; Vicars and Rabbis and Imams sitting around discussing the merits of faith, but in fact it's not at all like that. The purpose of the Waverley Faith Forum is not to provide a cosy huddle for interfaith love ins, but it allows the Council Officers to hear from and disseminate important information through community representatives.

Our recent meetings have included leaders from the Bahai's, the Christian Science church, The Church of England, the United Reformed Church, Farnham Free Church and The Islamabad Community, as well as, interestingly, The Farnham Humanists!

At our Autumn meeting we heard from the Police and from Waverley's Planning Officers about the Gypsy and Travelling Community in our area, how the Council works to meet their needs and the challenges they bring, and how we as a

community might understand such communication better should we come into contact with them.

This week we heard from Waverley's Housing Services Manager about Government Welfare Reform and its potential impact on our community. We were able to ask questions about housing benefits and quiz Council Officers about homelessness in the Borough. Equally we get the opportunity to raise local issues – while not discussing individual cases.

Next month, for the first time, this meeting will go 'on the road' from Godalming Council Offices to visit one of the communities represented – they hope to do this in 2 of our 4 meetings each year and have asked me to host this first one in Ewhurst. It gives me a chance to show them something of our special part of the Borough and I'm looking forward to it.

One almost incidental aspect of this meeting is that we do get to know leaders of other faith groups locally, and understand their unique challenges and perspectives.

I suspect that none of us there went into our respective work with a view to becoming Community Leaders; I became a priest because I felt called to share the love of God with others, and I guess that we all have a similar story to tell regardless of our faith (I have no idea about the humanist!)

What comes through the meetings is that we all, as people of faith, share a sense that God cares for all people and the communities in which they gather. God will be in the very human stories of suffering and pain and the responses we make as a community – of hospitality, support and love and care for one another in both good and hard times. I became a priest in order to represent our community to God, and God to our community - but a word with Council can sometimes help too.

Church Stewardship - what does it mean?

Stewardship means to take care of something held in trust for another person.

In our village, we hold our church building and the work that we do in trust for future generations. Some of us may just want to know there is a church in the Village where our children and grandchildren can be baptised, married and finally buried.

Others may want to be able to experience more than just a lovely old building that is there for special occasions; they may want to play an active part in a church community that has worshipped here for over 900 years. Throughout that time our Parish Church has played an important part in village life, working to care for and bring together everyone in the village. All of this requires a commitment to Stewardship from all of us who want to see the church and its place in the community live on.

You can play your part in the Stewardship of our church in a variety of ways. One is by giving money for the upkeep of the church buildings and its surroundings. Another is by supporting the work that the church does, either with money, or giving your time and talents. Help like this, as the need arises, is always appreciated; the church could not exist without these gifts of money, time and talents.

In order to safeguard the church's future, we need to plan ahead. This is much easier if we know in advance, how much money we have coming in. Regular giving, known as Planned Giving, helps this. Planned Giving is agreeing to give the church a set amount of money (decided by you) each month/quarter/year. This makes managing the church's future less of a lottery.

Please think carefully if you could be part of the Planned Giving scheme – it does make a real difference to how the church can continue and develop. The scheme is completely confidential and under your control.



This year's international focus is work for reconciliation between Christians and Muslims in Nigeria.

"I am all too aware of the effects of violence between historically distinct communities that, sadly, have also become estranged through religion," confirms Bishop Christopher. "I ask for your prayers for the people and communities most affected.

"Nor should we forget our own local communities supported by the Bishop of Guildford's Foundation. But Lent Call is not all about giving. It is about our keeping of Lent together as a diocese in the traditional way, an annual call to repentance, made real by praying and fasting as well as giving."

Internationally, your donations will be used by Bishop Justin Welby, our next Archbishop of Canterbury, who has done so much to foster reconciliation between divided communities in Nigeria, where ethnic and religious hatred has led to intolerance and violence. Our money will support local community projects and build bridges of friendship across ethnic and religious boundaries. Projects will also be identified in consultation with our link dioceses in the Church of Nigeria

#### The Royal Maundy

Holy Week is a crowded schedule of services for Christians and the week begins with our commemoration of Christ's entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. St John makes clear in his gospel that Jesus was controlling events and knew what was to happen. During the last week of his life on earth, Jesus taught his disciples by clear examples and tried to make them understand his message. One of the important events was when he washed the disciples' feet, including those of Judas Iscariot. Usually this service was the duty of the lowest servants and so it was a graphic demonstration of humility and service. It was followed by Jesus' instruction "a new commandment I give you: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another".

I have had two contrasting experiences of foot washing. The first is quickly told. It was during my training placement at Bramley when on Maundy Thursday I found it impossible to keep a straight face because of the sensitivity of the soles of my feet. The second occasion was during a service of Holy Communion held on the evening before I was Ordained. Bishop Ian, who would lead the service the following day, copied Jesus' example by wrapping a towel around his waist and washing each Ordinand's feet. This simple but very moving and meaningful act had an enormous impact on me. It will stay with me always as a reminder that all Christians are called to service and acts of humility for everyone.

In England the instruction, or *mandatum*, to love one another has been commemorated at least since 1213 when King John ceremonially washed the feet of 13 poor men and gave each 13 pence while visiting Rochester. Traditionally gifts were given as well but over the years they were replaced by additional money. In the 15<sup>th</sup> century, Henry IV began the practice of relating the number of recipients to the monarch's age. Records indicate that James II was the last king to wash feet of the poor in 1685 and William III stopped attending the service in 1699. It was not until 1932 that King George V revived the involvement of the monarch in the Royal Maundy. Today the service is held in a different church each year and our Queen distributes the small silver coins (legally the Queen's Maundy Money). Like all our coinage, these

have a portrait of the Queen on one side, but it is the same likeness that was prepared for the first coins that were issued in 1953. All the recipients are pensioners who are chosen from the various Christian churches in the locality of the church (usually a Cathedral) hosting the service. We are told that the Queen views this service as an important part of her devotional life.

The Maundy Thursday service is such a part of Holy Week in the UK that it came as a surprise to me to discover similar services have been held elsewhere. During a brief holiday in Vienna, Jennie and I visited the Hofburg Palace and saw examples of the many treasures the Habsburg family have collected. In one cabinet there is a small gold bowl and jug. They were used by the Emperor to continue the centuries old tradition of washing the feet of poor men and women, who were given money and other gifts. There are pictures dating from the end of 19th century of a ceremony conducted by Franz Joseph and the account gives and interesting insight into the occasion and its organisation. Twelve men and twelve women were chosen, their ages ranged from 88 to 92. They were medically examined and thoroughly cleaned before being dressed uniformly in black. The ceremony consisted of a procession to church and a public banquet of four courses. The food was not eaten then but shared out into painted wooden tubs that were taken home. The feet of each person was washed by the Emperor, assisted by at least two priests, and they were given gifts. They received 30 silver coins in a white leather pouch, a jug filled with white wine and a beaker of green stoneware. Then they were driven home in a court carriage. In Austria the ritual continues as needy people are given symbolic gifts of money.

Our visit showed that we do not have a monopoly on this particular Maundy Thursday service. In various forms it is celebrated throughout the Christian world and is a reminder of the sacrifice that Jesus made for us all during Holy Week. He was humble and submissive to God's plan even though it cost him enormous suffering. He did not place himself above others, but showed that he was servant to everyone. Paul wrote in his letter to the Philippians "and being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross". This is example we are called to follow. #### **Ewhurst Baptist Church**

2013, a new year and a change for us all here at the Baptist Church. I took up my position as a "Minister in Training" of the church here in Ewhurst in September 2010 and have since been living a dual-life, one half being here in Ewhurst and the other at Spurgeon's College in South Norwood, London where I have been benefiting from the formal side of my training.

In June of this year my three years of training come to a close and I am set free from college! This being the case the Baptist Church here in Ewhurst and I have been considering what happens next; do I remain in Ewhurst after my training or do I go to minister elsewhere in the UK.

Changing jobs in ministry is not like changing jobs in more secular roles as it does involve both the church and the minister seeking to discern what God's will is for them both. One listens to those around us, one listens to God in worship, prayer and through holy scripture and these together over time give us a clearer understanding of the way in which we should go. For me the matter was resolved when one day last November when, after much prayer, I became profoundly aware that I actually belong here in Ewhurst, it was the right place for me to live and minister in. Though I was convinced from that point, I then needed to wait and see whether the wider church, both deacons and congregation came to the same understanding.

Well, on Sunday January 20th the church met and voted on whether to call me to remain as their minister. The outcome of that meeting was a very resounding "Yes" which was a great encouragement to us all.

You may know that during my training period I have continued to live in my own house in Farncombe (Godalming) but now our hope and intention is that in the late Summer we will be able to take up residence in the village itself, though the details as to how this will work in practice still need to be worked out.

Jackie and I are looking forward to living in the village and locally to the church. We shall endeavour to ensure the church remains focused on its local community, which we believe it is there to serve.

So I just thought I would take this opportunity to share our good news, looking forward to the prospect of continuing to minister amongst everyone here in this community around and about Ewhurst.

Although the Church's message is timeless, the ways in which it expresses it to every generation need not be. I personally believe that an awareness of the spiritual dimension of all of our lives is very significant when considering the well-being of all that we are as human beings. So here at Ewhurst Baptist Church we will continue to seek ways of ensuring that we present the Good News of Jesus Christ in ways that the men, women and children of Ewhurst can benefit from in 2013 and beyond.

The Ewhurst Playground Project was formed in 2012 to raise funds to build a challenging, exciting and fun playscape where children can unwind, be creative and make friends. With the generous help of the Parish council, many Village organisations and the Carnival Committee, along with many personal donations we have upgraded nearly one third of the play area already and it's been a pleasure to watch children and families enjoying the new play equipment.

## News from Ewhurst Parish Council



This winter the Parish Council have not been idle. It has taken a great deal of patience this year to finalise the Precept for the Parish which is the small charge added to your council Tax Bill to finance the up keep of the Village. This year it has been a particularly onerous task as central government were altering their share of funding of local government which in turn affected what financial support local government were able to offer us. Whilst our precept from you has increased slightly our overall funding has decreased. Richard Cleaves, our Chairman, redrafted his figures many times before final information was received mid January from our Borough council.

At our recent Parish Council meeting we were fortunate to have two speakers. The first speaker was invited by our Planning Councillor Valerie Dixon Henry; Lizzie Utley a Rural Affordable Housing Enabler was able to enlighten us as to what function she performed within Surrey Community Action. She facilitates a survey within a community of resident's thoughts on Rural Housing. The second speaker a resident of Larkfield, Steve Wells, who took us through the work that had been carried out on Larkfield Pond in the autumn. The Parish Council along with a lot of other organisations had provided some funding for this project and all at the meeting agreed it was money well spent. The project is not complete yet as a wildlife information board is to be erected near the pond.

Councillor Ruth Reed has noticed the poor state of the telephone and post boxes throughout the Parish and you may have noticed unusual activity around the telephone boxes when the BT assessor was recording the work needed to be done to bring these boxes up to scratch. The work is to be carried out in the spring and will involve re glazing, painting or just a good wash. Similarly although yet to be confirmed, it is hoped the post boxes will be given a spring clean. On the subject of cleaning the state of the road signs have been mentioned to Surrey Highways whose responsibility it is to ensure they are clearly visible.

The Village Hall is continuing to prove a popular venue for residents and is used for performances by the Ewhurst Players. It has caused some disquiet amongst the residents of Mount Close in that the audiences park along their road rather than in the village car parks. The Parish Council has noticed that there is some long term parking of residents in the Village Hall Car park and would ask that if it is necessary to use extra parking away from individuals homes by residents that they use the Recreation Ground Car Park where car park space is not at such a premium.

You will shortly see posters around the village asking for your help with maintaining the rights of way. Councillor Chris Lyth is to manage this scheme for the village and anyone interested should contact the Clerk <a href="mailto:clerk.epc@btinternet.com">clerk.epc@btinternet.com</a> 01483 267646.

Councillor Victoria Helstrip chairing our Playground Committee has received quotes for the next phase of renewing and updating the playground. She is now looking for funding for this project and plans a fashion show next month which we hope will be well attended. This will be well advertised nearer the time.

Councillor Rob Matthews has arranged the planting of a tree at Deblin's Green which was the suggestion of a resident to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. The tree is an Amellanchier Lamarkii and it was chosen by the residents of Deblin's Green as one resident had an example in their garden which all thought appropriate. Ewhurst Horticultural Society arranged some funding for it and a plaque is to be put at its base.

Concerning Broadband, at a meeting with Alan Young, Openreach and BT + two representatives from SCC, we heard that as Cranleigh (& Ewhurst) has been a commercial development from Openreach, the chances of getting further monetary assistance for our outlying subscribers is currently nil.

This is because of the EU State Aid Provisions that prevent public money being spent on areas which have already benefited from private investment. There is a further challenge in the European Court, but iunlikely to be in the near future.

Meanwhile, this does not mean that the outliers will be ignored because constantly improving technology is enabling up to 15Mbps broadband to be pushed further down the copper wires and therefore there is still hope - if necessary, we may have to raise some matched funding from those who require the service in order to enable it. When Openreach first connected us to fibre, the fastest speed available was 40 Mbps and within weeks this was raised to 80 Mbps for example. They are now trialling up to 10 Gbps!

The myth long propagated about capacity was also put to rest - there is no reason why every subscriber in Ewhurst should not be connected to "Fibre Broadband" if they should so wish. The Cabinets that we have are all upgradable to cope with the total number of subscribers in the village and surrounding areas.

It is worth stressing that the scale of the problem with outliers is not yet fully identified and cannot be until more outliers have applied to upgrade.

Finally we hope to see as many of you as possible at the Annual Parish Meeting to be held in the Village Hall on Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> April 7.30pm. There will be drinks and nibbles after a brief talk by the Chairman and a series of speakers from the community.

The children never the less have been very busy visiting places of interest that support their class Topic. It is always great fun going on a school trip and through first hand experiences deepening knowledge around a particular subject or interest. Young children learn best through this kinaesthetic approach.

### In Our Midst Mrs Dinah Couchman

### From 5-IT to Rumbeams via a Thames Barge

Sitting talking to Dinah in her sunroom, on one of the few sunny mornings of this winter, it is difficult to believe that she was born in the same year that the Titanic sank and two years before the start of the First War. Indeed one of her first memories is of her brother aged 18 going off to war. He never returned.

She was brought up with her two sisters in Shrewsbury and after what she describes as a quite uneventful school career she gained admission to the Royal Academy of Music in London to study the piano. This led to a teach-



ing job at the Edgebaston High School together with very interesting work at the BBC studios. Radio was in its infancy and 5-IT Birmingham, as it was known, had been second only to London in broadcasting to the nation. "Very amateur it was" she says. A porter let you through a door into a narrow passageway and up some stairs to the studios which were over a motor showroom. Everyone did a bit of everything. Not only did she play the piano and sing but read plays, took part in discussions and helped with any of the live programmes going out. She most enjoyed her work with Children's Hour where she accompanied the singing and on one occasion even did some whistling! All this finished in 1939 when programming was moved to Bristol.

Moving to London she married her first husband, a doctor, who tragically died when his ship, HMS Hood, was torpedoed off Scotland in 1941 with the loss of 1,415 men. Determined to keep busy, she joined the WRNS and had what she describes as five very interesting and active years. As a Second Officer she travelled widely throughout the country in charge of companies of women working to "free a man for the fleet" as the slogan went. Soon after the end of the war, Dinah married Arthur Couchman and they moved to a Thames barge moored near Faversham in Kent. Many of these large boats were taken by exservicemen and there was plenty of space on board to bring up her two daughters while Arthur travelled to work in London. By 1958 they felt the need to set down more permanent roots and to find good schools for the girls.

Rumbeams Farm, Ewhurst Green was the perfect place. Like many of us, once she had moved to Ewhurst, Dinah has never wanted to live anywhere else.

Rumbeams is a beautiful farmhouse built of Ewhurst stone and overlooking the Green and cricket pitch. At that time the farm consisted of over 150 acres of good pasture and Arthur installed a manager to run the farm whilst he continued to travel to London. They built up a considerable Jersey herd and sheep were also brought in to graze during the winter. For many years Dinah had regular customers coming to the house for the free range eggs which were in constant demand. Much of the everyday needs were provided by shops in Ewhurst. There were three general stores, local milk deliveries, at least two bakers and of course Miss Pam's shop where the children would run across the road from the school to buy their sweets. Dinah quickly joined Cranleigh Choral Society and involved herself in charity work, Save the Children, the RNLI, and with the Reverend Benson's wife, started a social group which brought people in from far and wide. It was the first of its kind and still continues today as the Monday Club held in the Glebe Centre. Arthur will be remembered by many for the work he did for the church as treasurer to the PCC which he continued for many years.

Eventually much of the farm land was sold off and some of it, after a second change of ownership, has a new life as the Hurtwood Park Polo Club. Nowadays Dinah enjoys the view from her windows across the garden and fields where the sun shines all through the day. She continues to play the piano with two friends from Cranleigh who make up the trio with cello and violin. Regular Scrabble games with her Ewhurst friends keep the mind active. Her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday has recently given her celebrity status and the party at the Polo Club brought her second daughter and grandson and their families from Australia, which meant both daughters, the five grandchildren and the great-grand children were all together. "I think everyone had a good time" she says, "and it was lovely to see the family and Ewhurst friends all together exchanging stories and memories". Dinah is certainly an inspiration to us all.

# LOCAL HISTORY CORNER by Janet Balchin

# Baynards and the Head of Sir Thomas More.

A recent episode of the TV programme 'Restoration Man' featured Longhurst Lodge, one of the old lodges to Baynards Park. The building had been empty and derelict for over 40 years when Nick and Vanessa took it on and they have spent over two years painstakingly restoring it to its former glory.

Baynards Park lies to the south of Ewhurst village. The house burnt down in 1979, but the home farm and around 20 estate cottages still survive. Baynards house was in Ewhurst parish,



but part of the park and some of the cottages, including Longhurst Lodge, are in Cranleigh parish. There is a boundary stone in the garden of the Longhurst Lodge with 'CP' for 'Cranleigh Parish' on one side and 'EP' for 'Ewhurst Parish' on the other'.

The earliest reference to Baynards is in 1447, when William Sydney was granted a license to empark 800 acres at Baynards. In the early 16<sup>th</sup> century it was owned by the Bray family.

In 1588 the estate was acquired by George More, son of Sir William More of Losely [no relation to Sir Thomas More] and he rebuilt Baynards House in the style of his family home. During the 17<sup>th</sup> century the estate passed through several owners including Richard Evelyn, brother of John Evelyn the diarist and by the 18<sup>th</sup> century it was part of the large estate owned by Sir Richard Onslow of Knowle in Cranleigh.

Then, in 1832 it was purchased by Rev. Thomas Thurlow, second son of the Bishop of Durham, who commissioned Thomas Rickman to restore and enlarge it. Under the Thurlows it became the most important house in the parish. The 1851 Census shows the Thurlows to have 13 live-in servants and employ 37 men on the estate, many of whom would have lived in the estate cottages with families of their own.

One of the historical notes picked up by the TV programme was the story that Sir Thomas More's favourite daughter Margaret, known as 'Meg', had bought his head to Baynards after his execution.

Sir Thomas More was Lord Chancellor to Henry VIII. However he opposed the Kings separation from the Catholic Church and was imprisoned in 1534 when he refused to take the Oath of Supremacy and the oath required by the First Succession Act. In 1535, he was convicted of treason and beheaded. After his execution his headless body was buried in the Church of St. Peter ad Vincula in the Tower of London. As a traitor, his head was placed on a spike on Tower Bridge for one month. His daughter, Margaret was able to obtain the head,

probably by bribing the bridge guards, and was said to have taken it to Baynards.

Margret Roper was an exceptionally intelligent woman and devoted to her father. She has been described as probably most learned woman of sixteenth century England. She had married William Roper in 1521. On her death in 1544 she was buried in the Roper family vault at St Dunstan's in Canterbury and her father's head was later interred there too.

What the programme did not explain was how Baynards was connected to the story. There do not seem to be any historical references to the head of Sir Thomas More being taken to Baynards. The first published mention is in Brayley's History of Surrey published in 1841. Margaret and William Roper had five children and their daughter Elizabeth married Sir Edward Bray who owned Baynards in the 1530s. The Ropers lived in Canterbury, but their daughter's home at Baynards may have been considered a safer place. Also this would have been the medieval Baynards house. The Tudor house was not built until 1588, some 43 years after More's death in 1535.

Since the programme has been aired the owners have found a well in the garden. Their next project is to restore the magnificent entrance gates which, like the lodge, are grade II listed and so we can look forward to a follow-up programme in the future.



# INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT EASTER EGGS!

Despite the fact that most of us associate Easter with chocolate eggs, it is actually hens' eggs that are the traditional food of Easter Sunday.



According to Christian tradition, Lent begins on Shrove Tuesday, or Pancake Day as we know it today. In past times, Shrovetide celebrations lasted for four days, beginning on the Saturday when eggs were given as gifts to children. 'Egg Saturday' was followed by Shrove Sunday, Collop Monday and finally Shrove Tuesday, when the remaining fat and eggs were used up to make pancakes.

During Lent the eating of animal products, including eggs, was strictly forbidden. However, hens continued to lay throughout the fast, resulting in a large stock for Easter Sunday.

The custom of exchanging decorative eggs was prevalent in many of the world's ancient civilizations. Eggs were regarded as a symbol of the universe or a creation of God. They also represented fertility, resurrection and new life.

In some parts of Europe, scarlet Easter eggs are planted in the fields and vineyards to protect crops from thunder and hail.

Easter egg throwing was a popular pastime in medieval times. The event was held in church, with the priest throwing a hard boiled egg to one of the choirboys. The boys would toss the egg between them and whoever held the egg when the clock struck 12 was the winner and could keep the egg.

Egg tapping is an Easter game in which two players face each other, holding a hard boiled egg in their hands with one end showing. The aim is to crack the opponent's egg without damaging your own.

Pace-egging is a traditional Easter game dating back hundreds of years. In the UK, it is usually played by rolling hard-boiled, decorated eggs down grassy hills. Pace-egging competitions are held across the country during Easter.
